Background

ISS: Victim Survey 2007 aimed at collecting information on people's opinions about:

- General Thinking / Beliefs on Crime
- Personal Safety
- Individual and community response to crime
- Experience as a witness of killings
- Victim Support and Other Interventions
- Citizen Interaction / Social Cohesion
- Police
- Courts
- Corruption
- Experiences of crime

The study covered all 9 provinces in South Africa and a total of 4 500 interviews were conducted across the study locations.

Unpacking overall organisation vs. research objectives

Organisation objectives

As one of Africa's leading human security research institutions the ISS is focused on ensuring it:

- **Engages the international debate** on human security, informing the debate with an **African perspective**
- **Builds capacity** at a senior level (within both governmental and non-governmental agencies) through assistance in terms of policy development and implementation monitoring

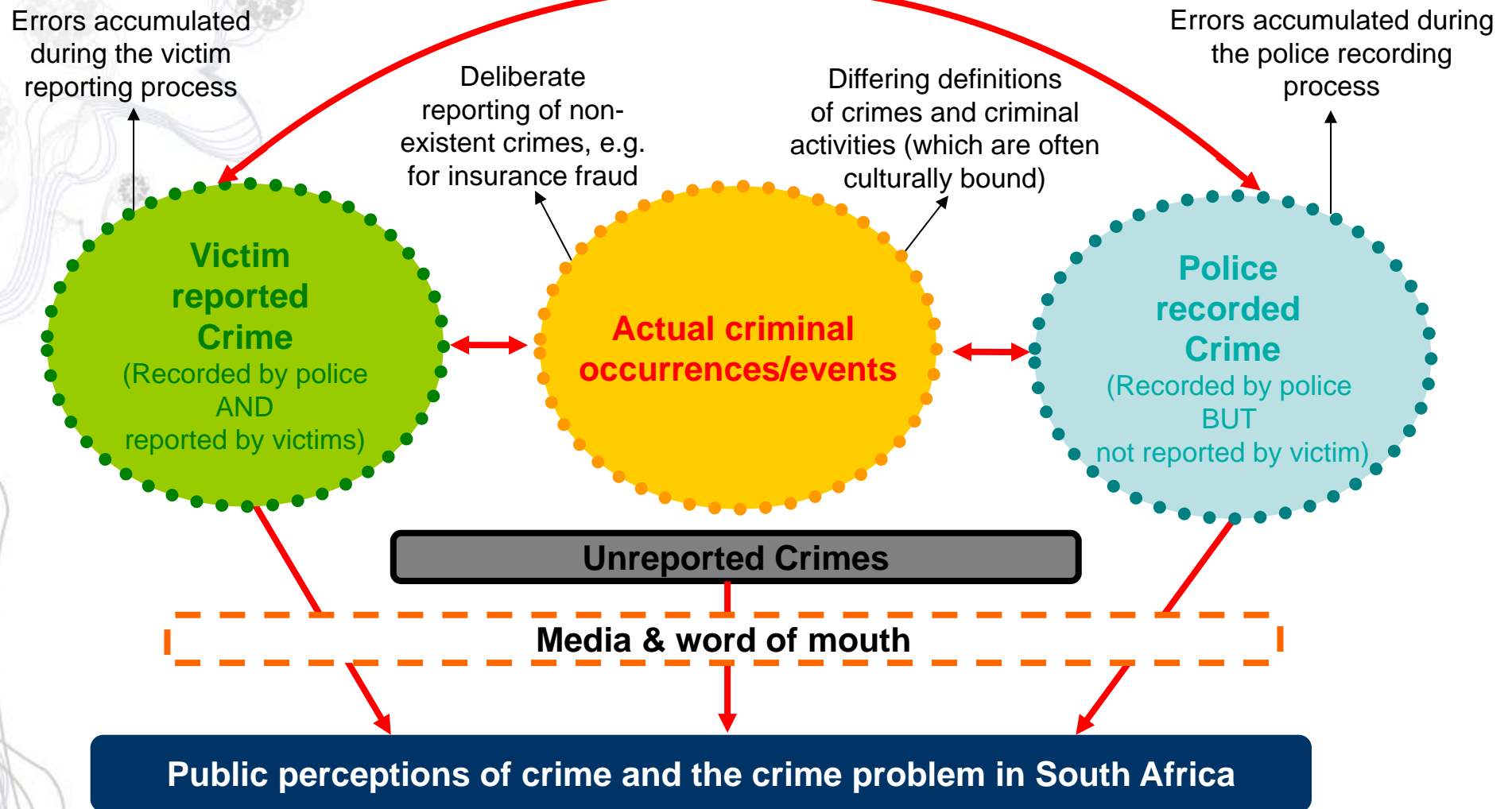
Project objectives

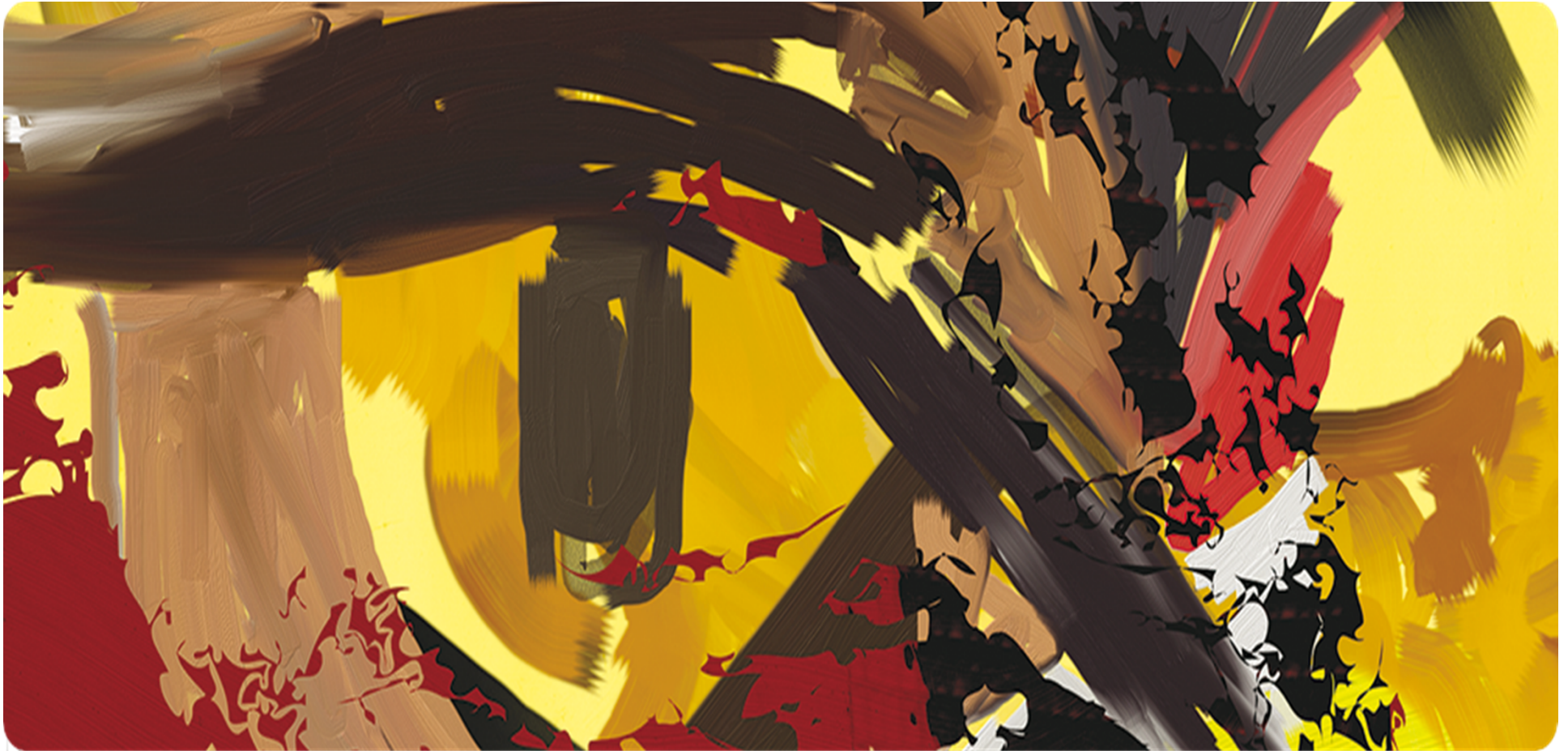
To successfully **develop an accurate and realistic understanding of South Africa's crime levels**, thus creating a foundation for effective, informed and impactful policies and programmes for policy makers, researchers and the public at large

Research objectives

To collect data from South African adults on **levels of victimisation** according to specific crime type and **better understand these crime experiences**, enhance understandings of the **nature of these crimes**, uncover and assess **public perception of crime, safety and the criminal justice system** as a whole.

Field Design

Data Collection Technique:

A face-to-face personal interviewing technique was used in respondents' homes using a probability sampling method.

Respondents:

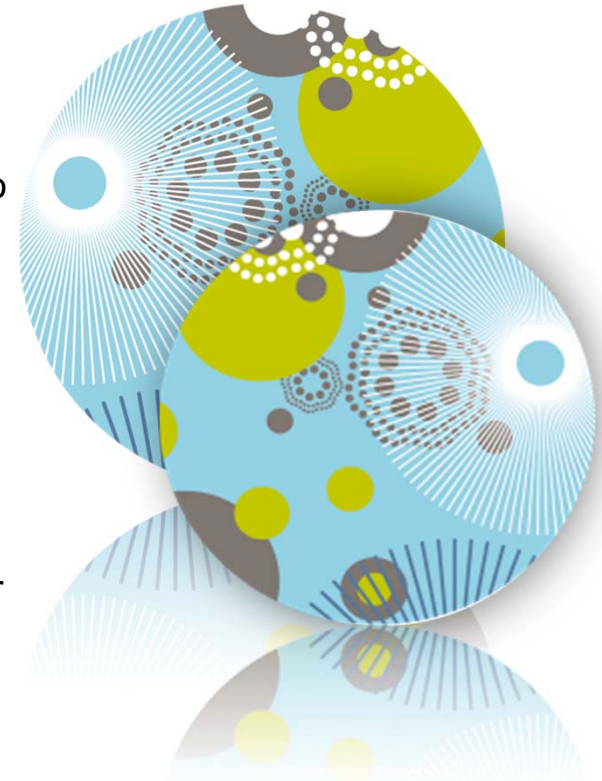
The survey was based on a representative sample of the population; both male and female respondents aged 16 years and above and who are residents in South Africa.

Briefing/Training:

The project was briefed into field on 5 October 2007. All the relevant field and data processing people attended the briefing. A teleconference was also held in the same meeting with all branch managers.

During the briefing sessions [this cuts across all the study locations], the following points were fully explained and discussed amongst other relevant points:

- The project objectives and background to the study
- Sampling methodologies to be adopted
- Definitions crimes
- Procedure on questionnaire's administration
- The questionnaire



Field Design

Mock Sessions and Trial Calls:

At the end of the briefing sessions each interviewer conducted a mock interview. The mock interviews were checked by Robyn Pharoah on behalf of the ISS, the quality control and editing departments. This was followed by a feedback session to all interviewers.

Questionnaire Translation:

In order to facilitate the quality of field operations, the questionnaire was translated Afrikaans, Zulu, Xhosa, South Sotho, Tswana and North Sotho (Pedi).

Actual Fieldwork Duration:

The fieldwork took place from 15 October 2007 to 23 November 2007.

Sampling procedure:

Selection of respondents for the project followed a probability sampling procedure

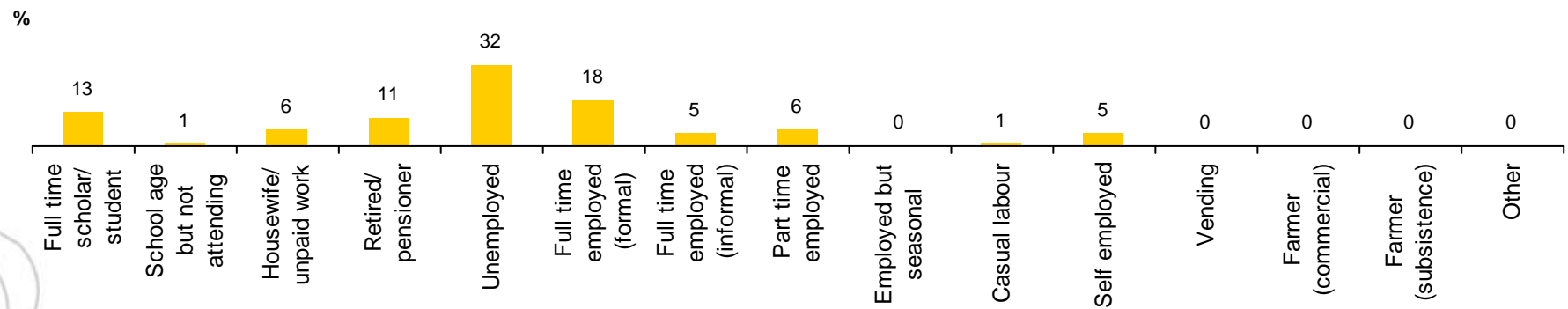

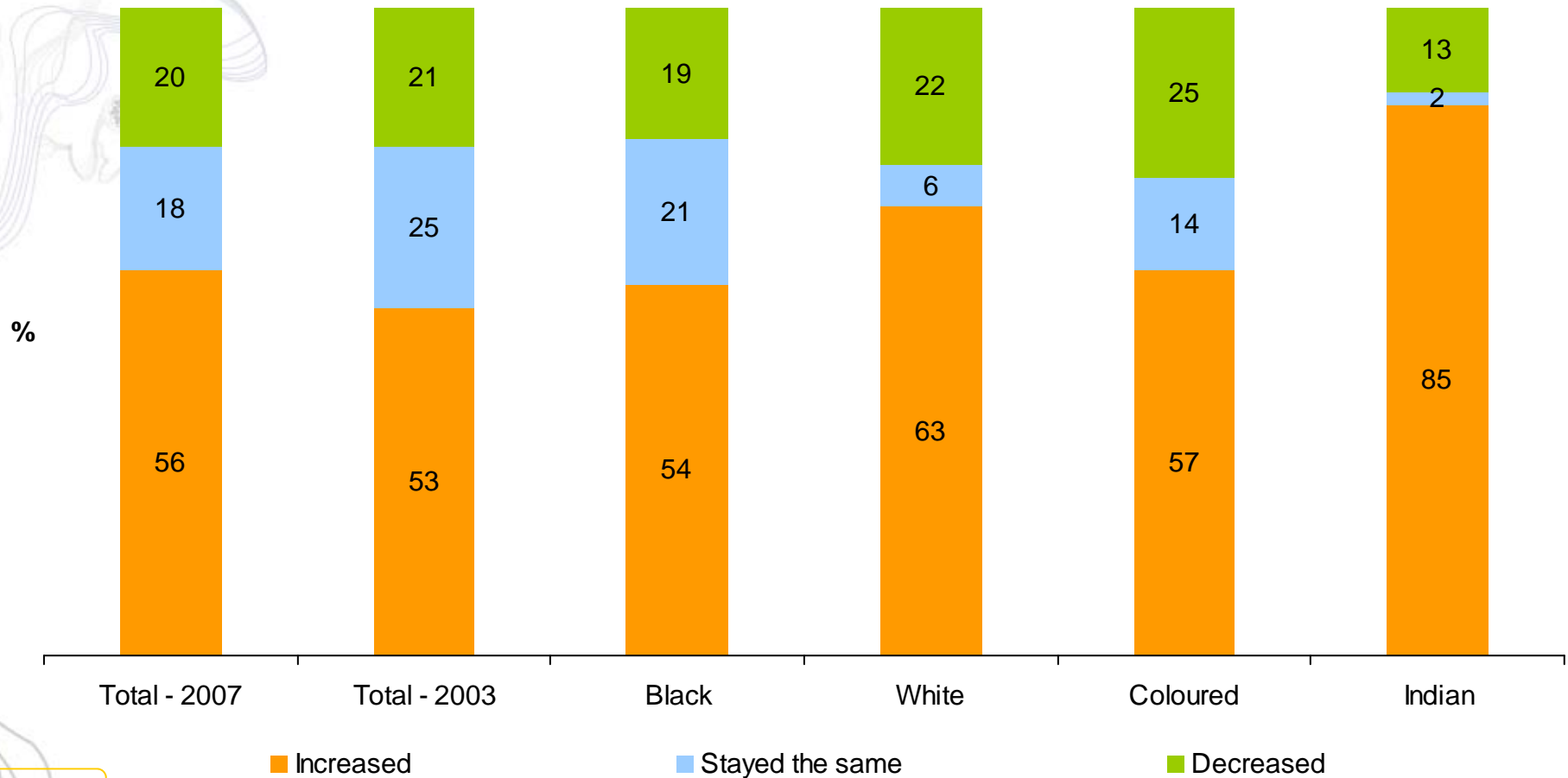

Do you think crime has increased, decreased or stayed the same in your area in the last 4 years (Oct 2003-2007)?



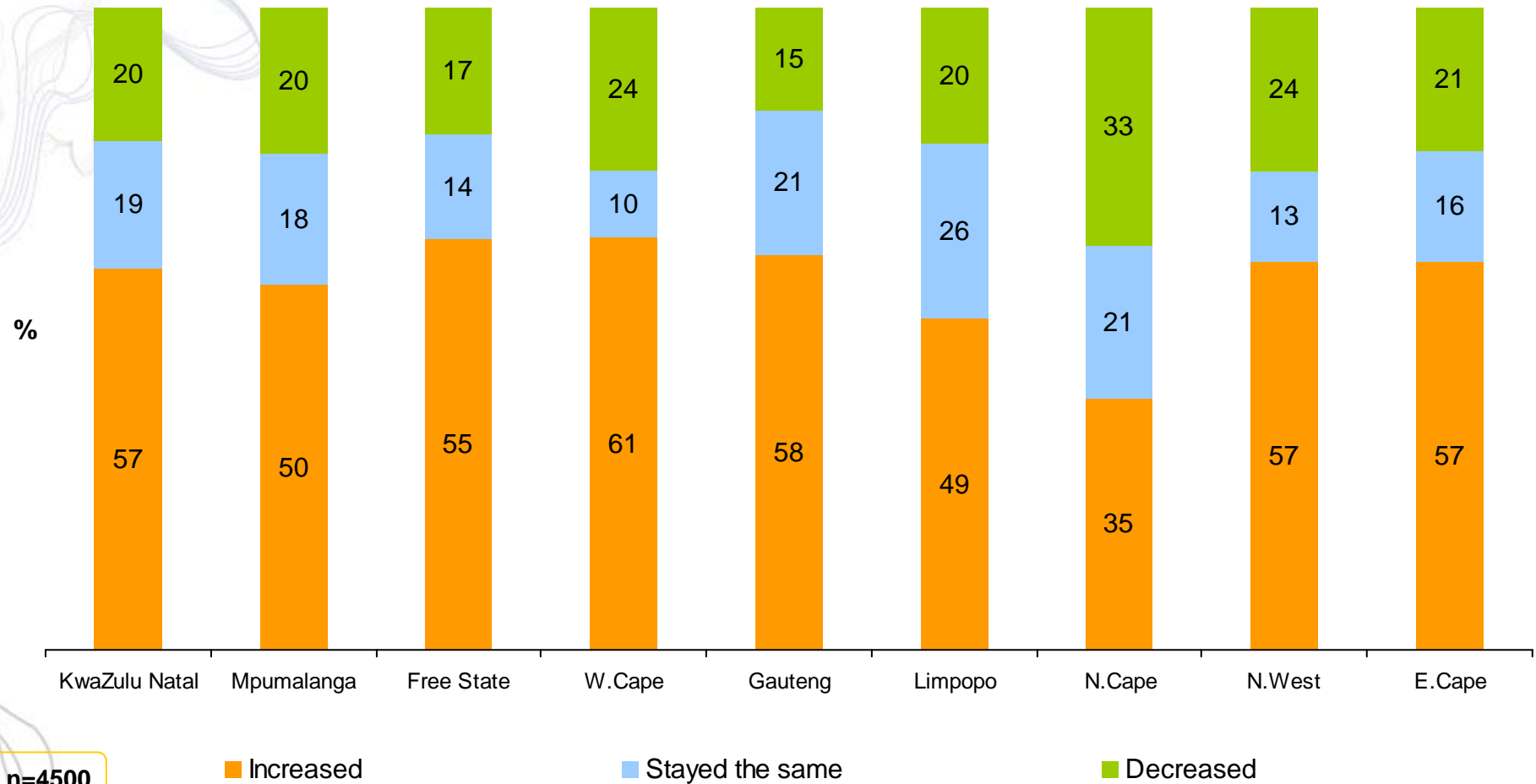

The feeling among the majority of South Africans is that there has been a rise in crime over the past 4 years. This sense is particularly marked among Indians. Coloureds are most likely to regard the levels of crime to have dropped over this period.

Do you think crime has increased, decreased or stayed the same in your area in the last 4 years (Oct 2003-2007)?

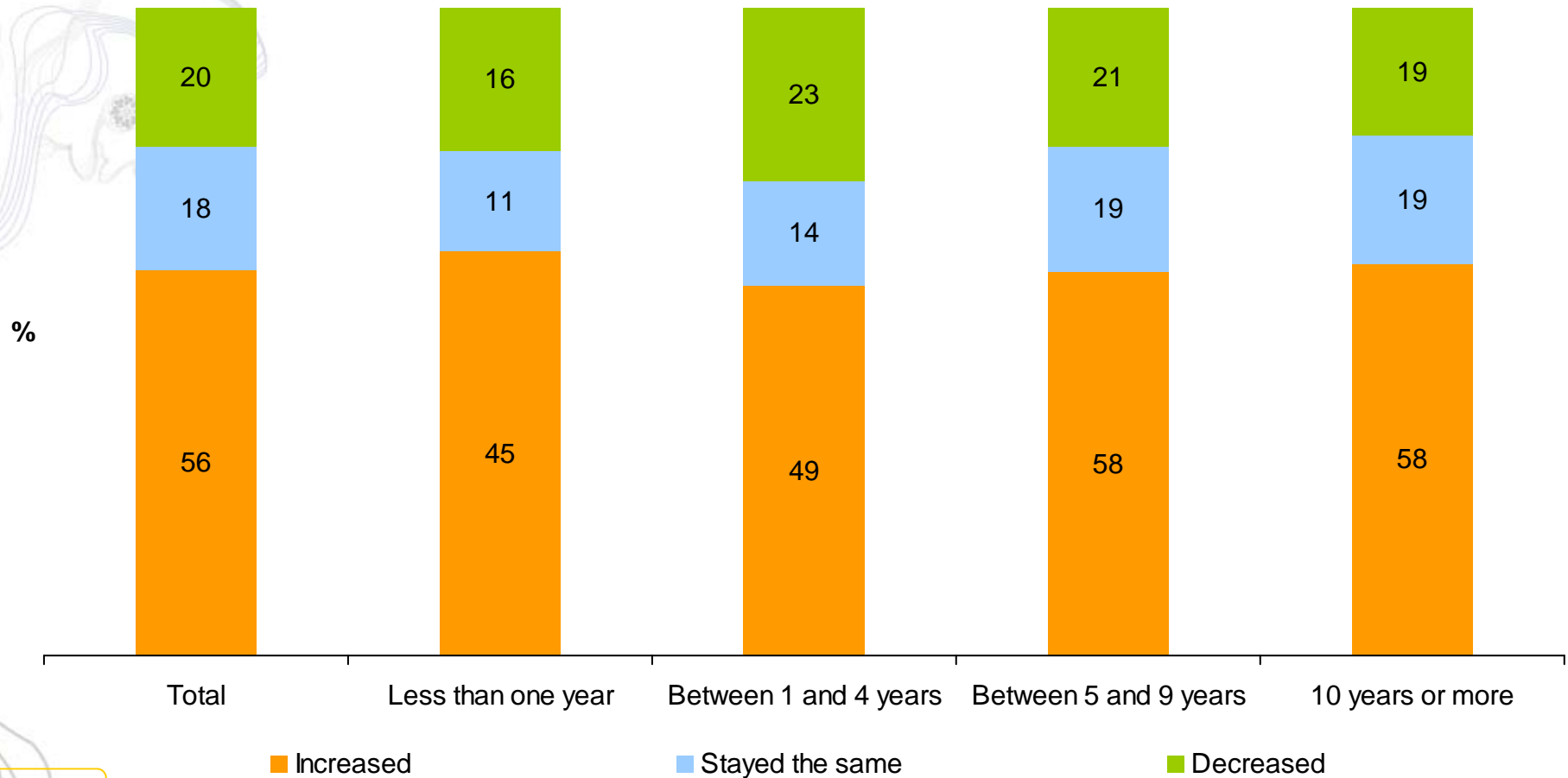


Residents in the Western Cape are most likely to regard crime as having increased in the past 4 years, while respondents in the Free State are evenly divided as to whether crime has increased or decreased.

Examined by length of residence in the area



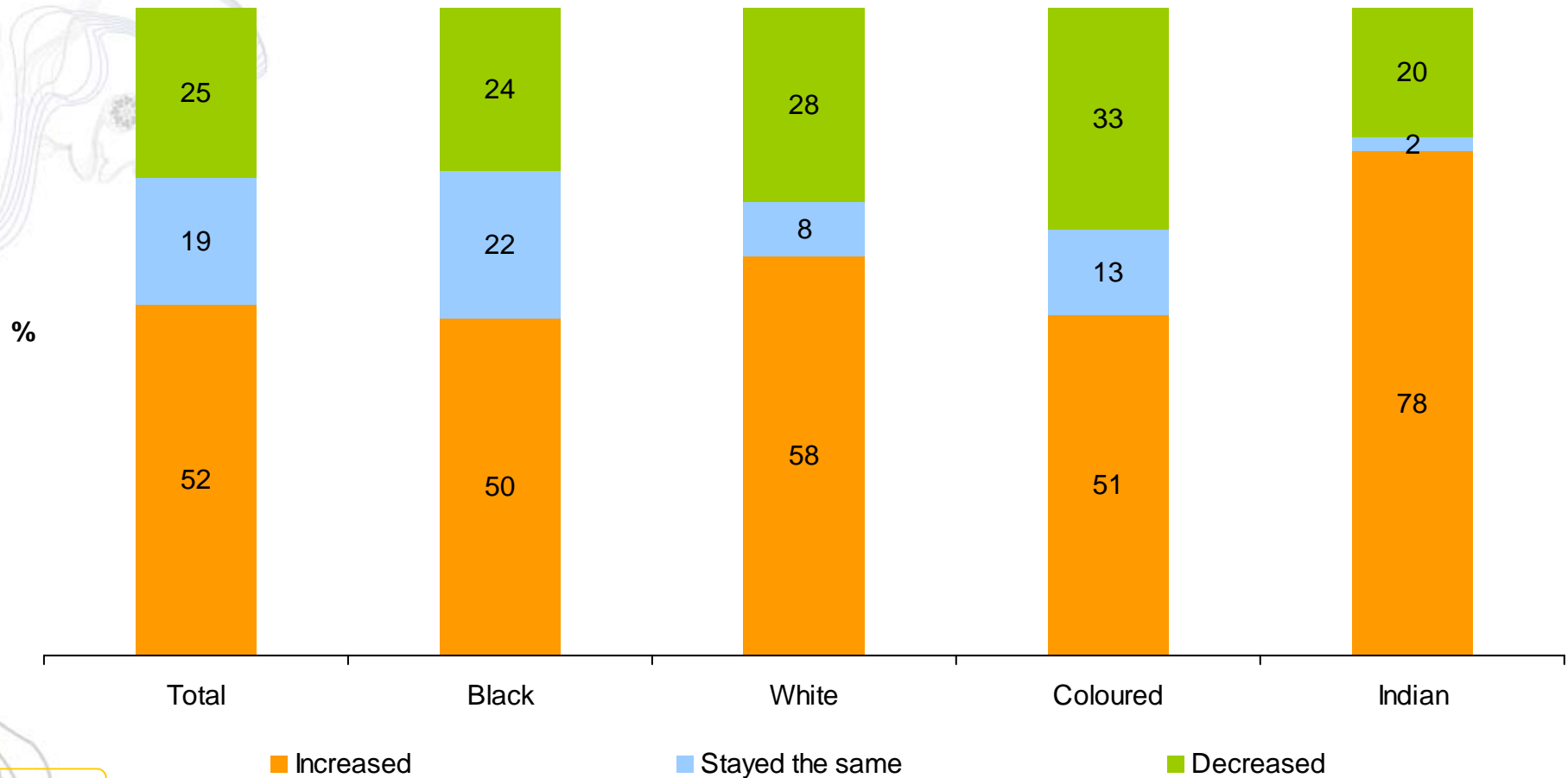
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There appears to be a link between length of residency in an area and perceptions regarding crime. Longer term residents are more likely to hold a more pessimistic view about the current crime situation.

Do you think crime has increased, decreased or stayed the same in your area in the last 12 months (Oct 2006-2007)?



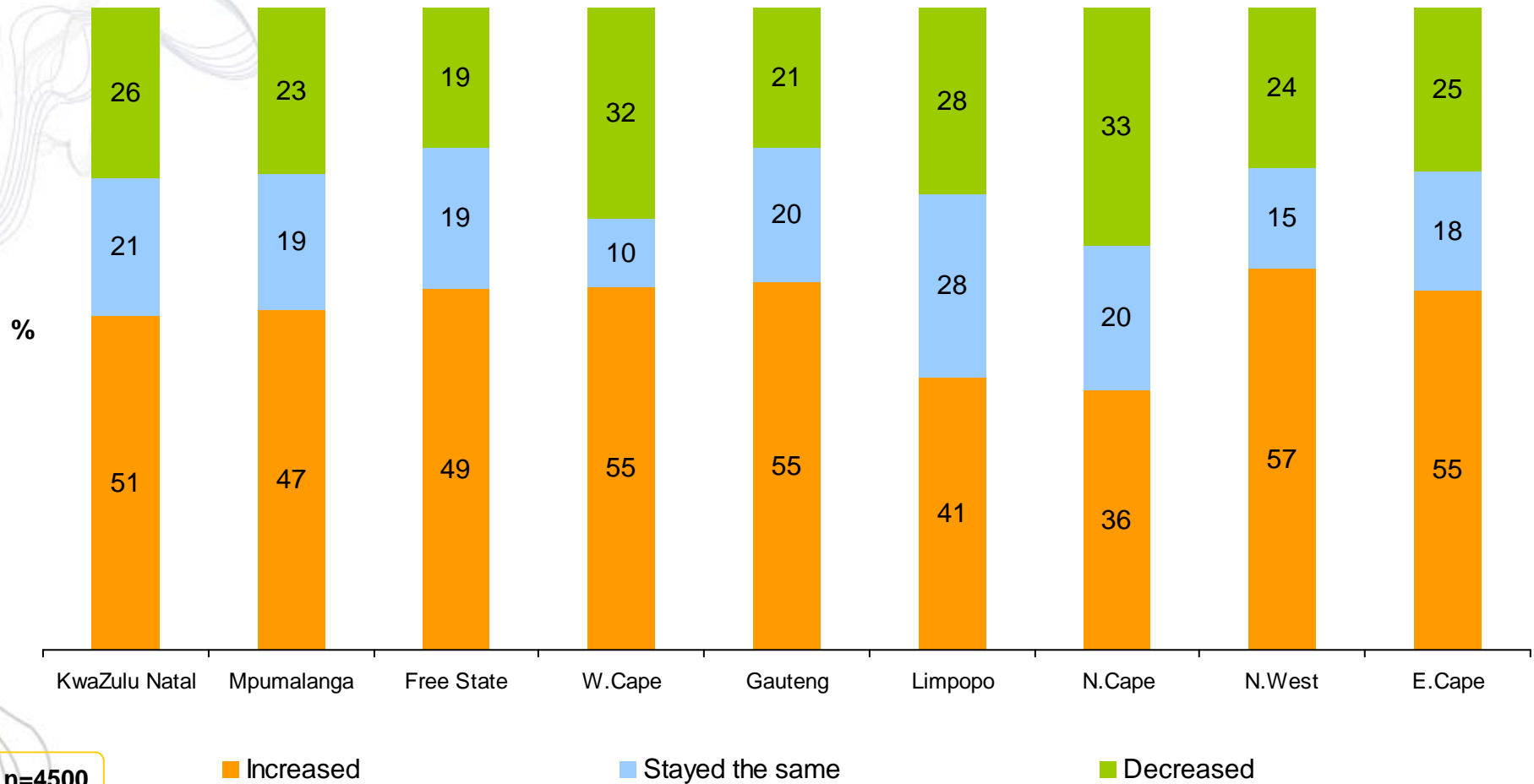
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The perception that crime is on the increase is again most apparent among Indians, although South Africans are slightly less likely to regard there as having been an increase in the past year than in the past 4 years.

Do you think crime has increased, decreased or stayed the same in your area in the last 12 months (Oct 2006-2007)?

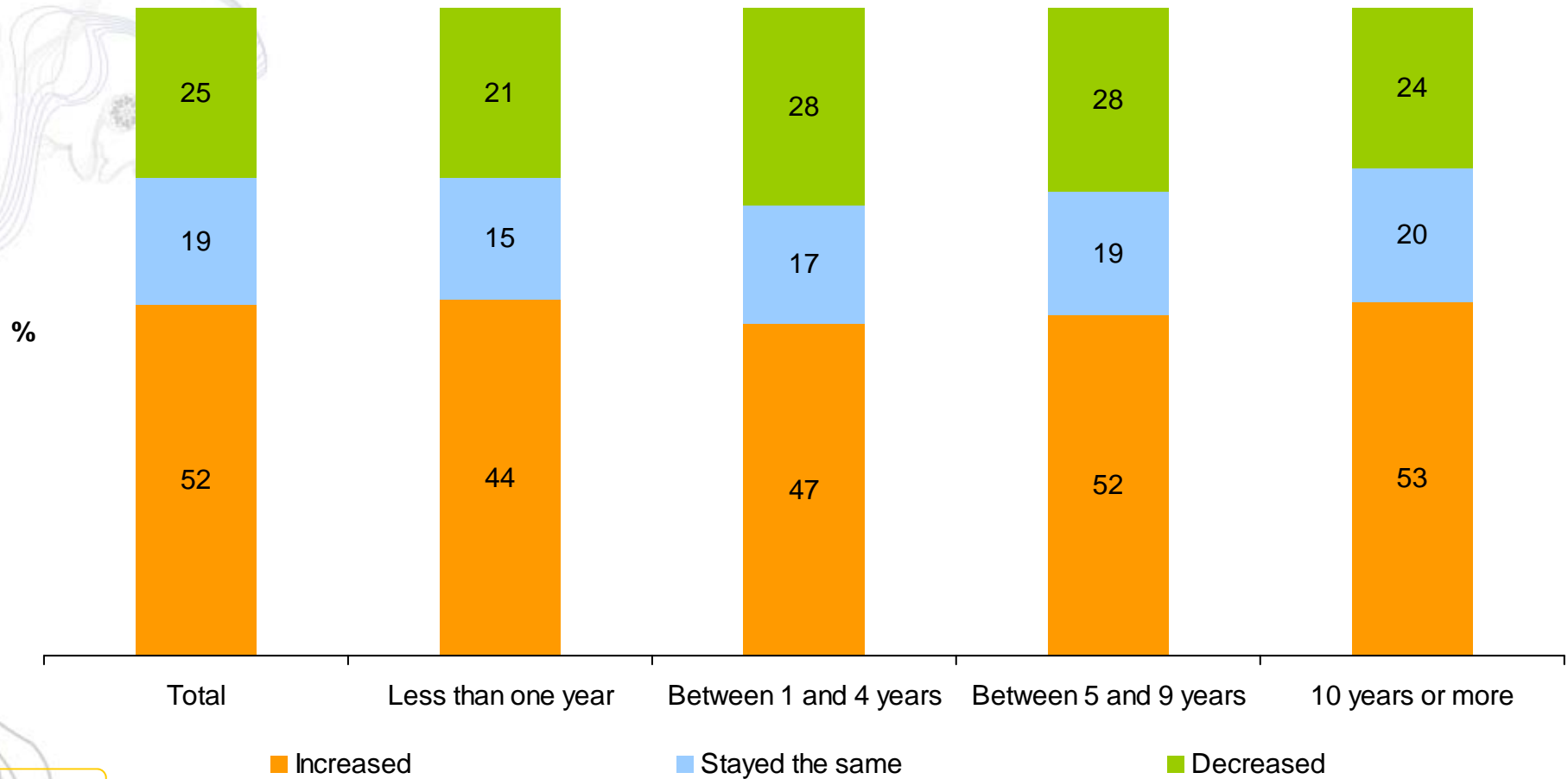


Residents of Mpumalanga are most likely to regard crime as having increased over the past year. Although Western Cape residents are most likely to consider crime as having risen over the past 4 years, respondents in this region (along with those in the Free State) are most likely to regard it as having declined over the past 12 months.

Do you think crime has increased, decreased or stayed the same in your area in the last 12 months (Oct 2006-2007)?

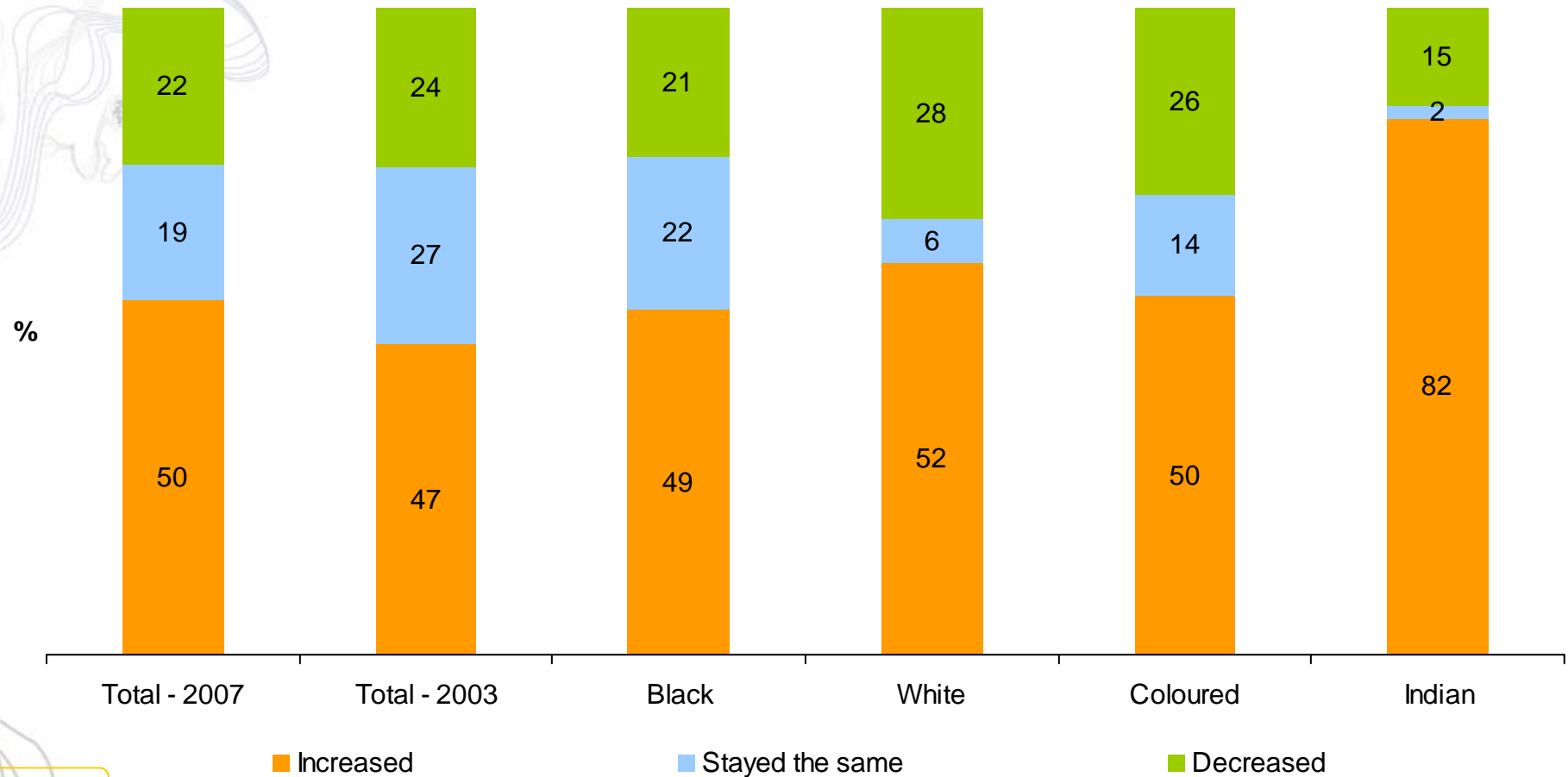


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The link between long term residents in an area and current negative crime perceptions is reinforced here.

Do you think violent crime has increased, decreased or stayed the same in your area in the last 4 years (Oct 2003-2007)?

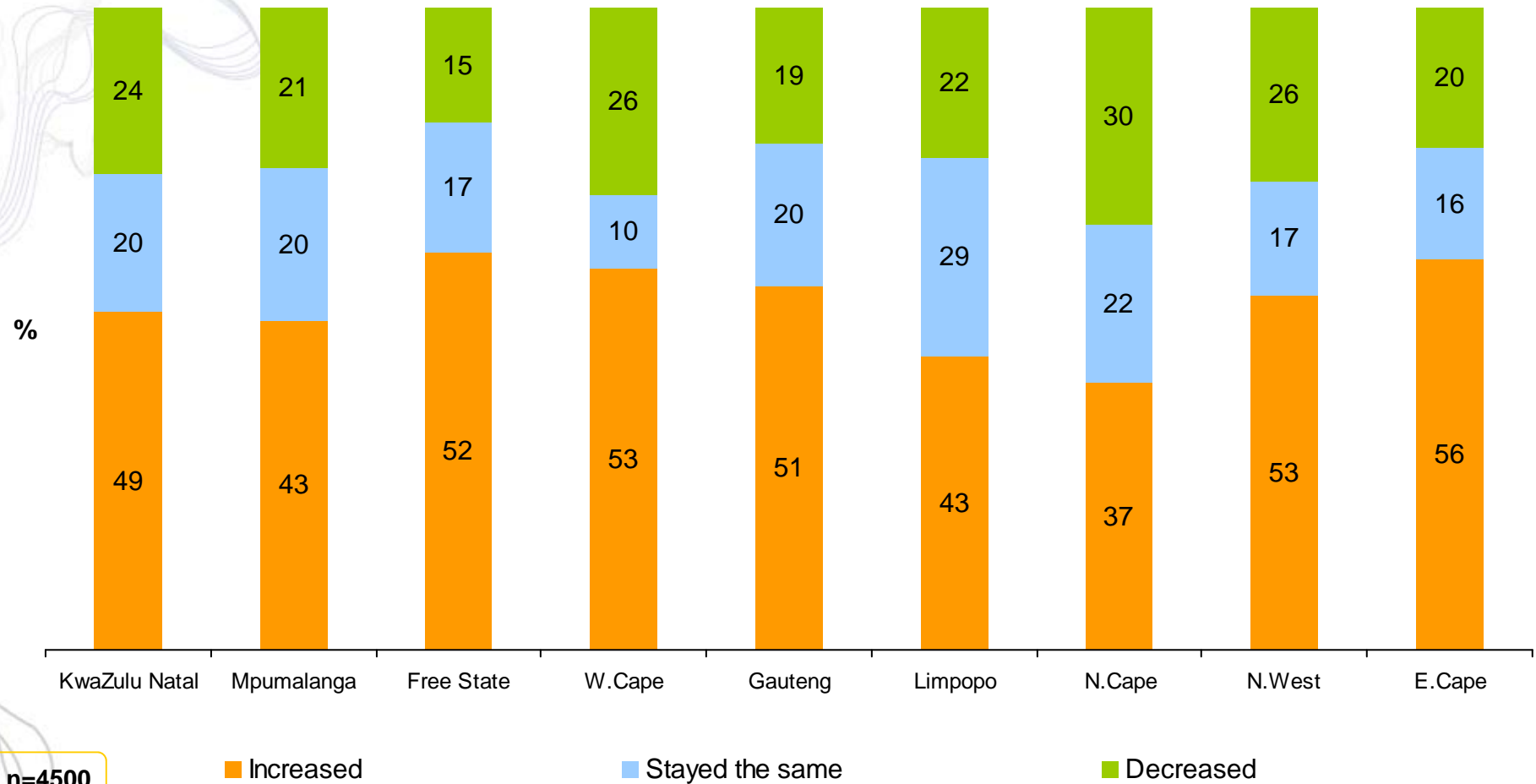


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Note again the startling results among Indian respondents when compared to the other population groups. Is this group more vulnerable and susceptible to criminal attacks than others, or is this just a perception? One possible explanation could be the wealthier Indian community's proximity in some cases to more marginal, poorer communities, perhaps making them more exposed to criminal activities.

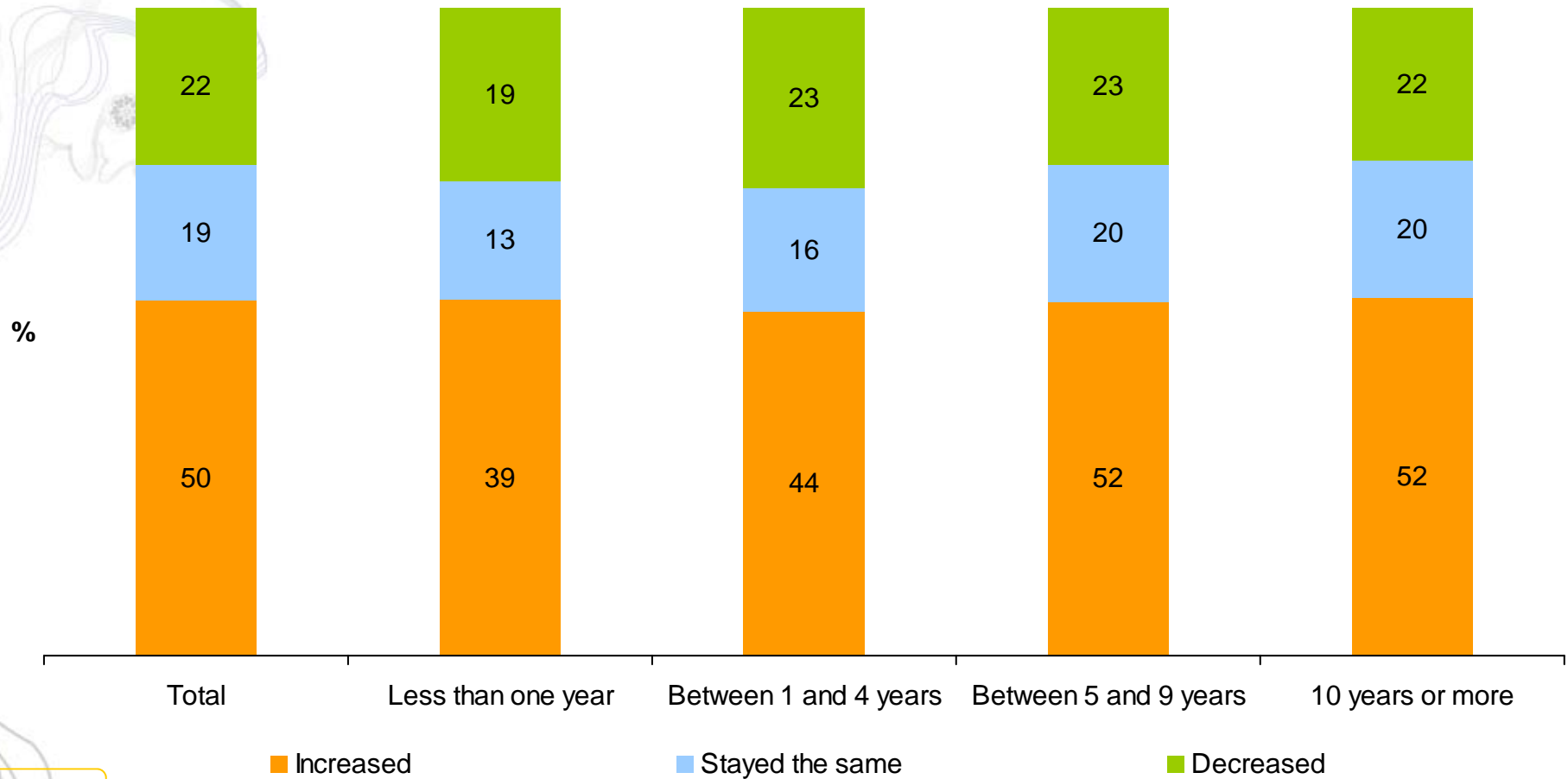
Do you think violent crime has increased, decreased or stayed the same in your area in the last 4 years (Oct 2003-2007)?

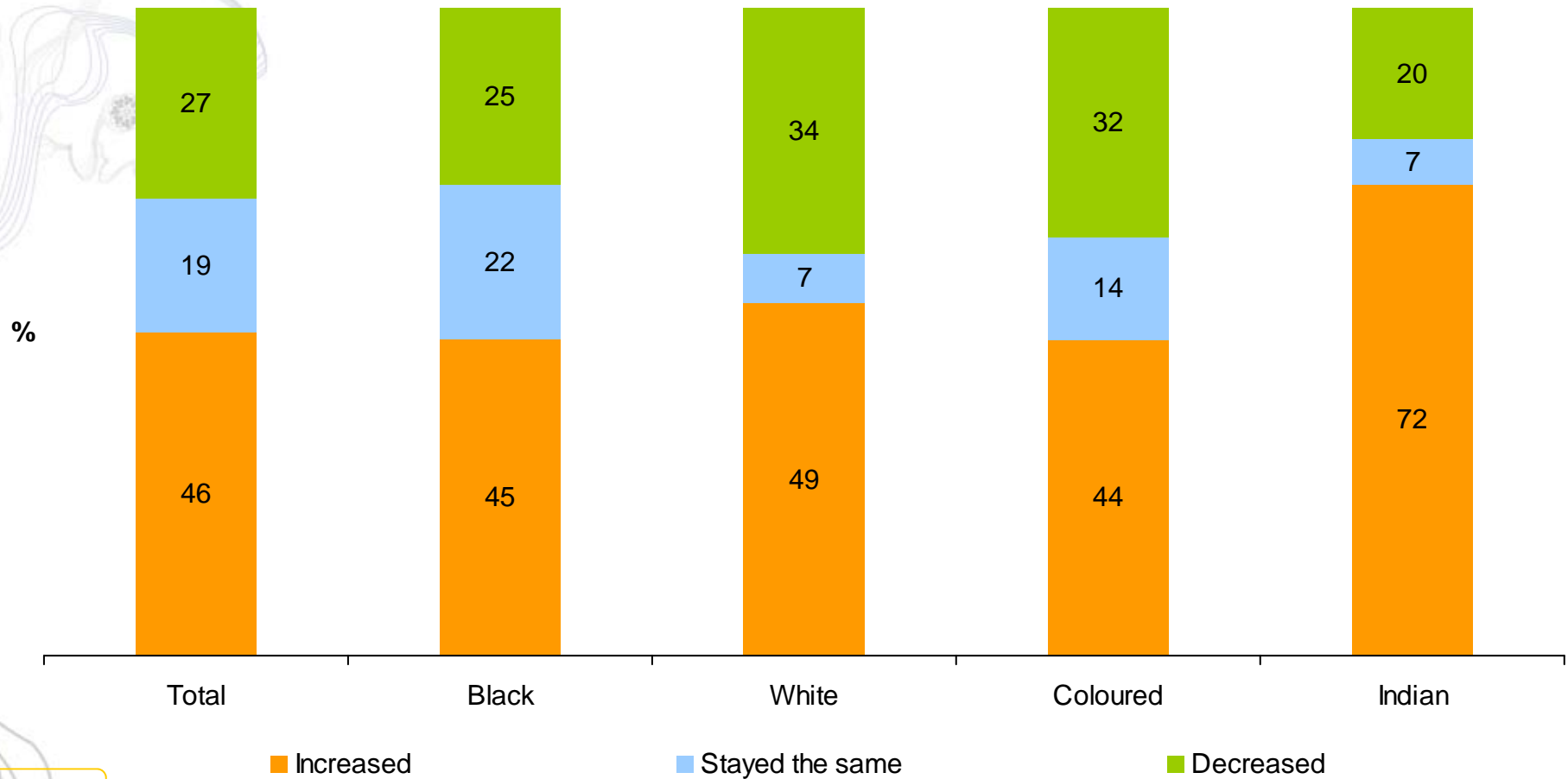
Do you think violent crime has increased, decreased or stayed the same in your area in the last 4 years (Oct 2003-2007)?

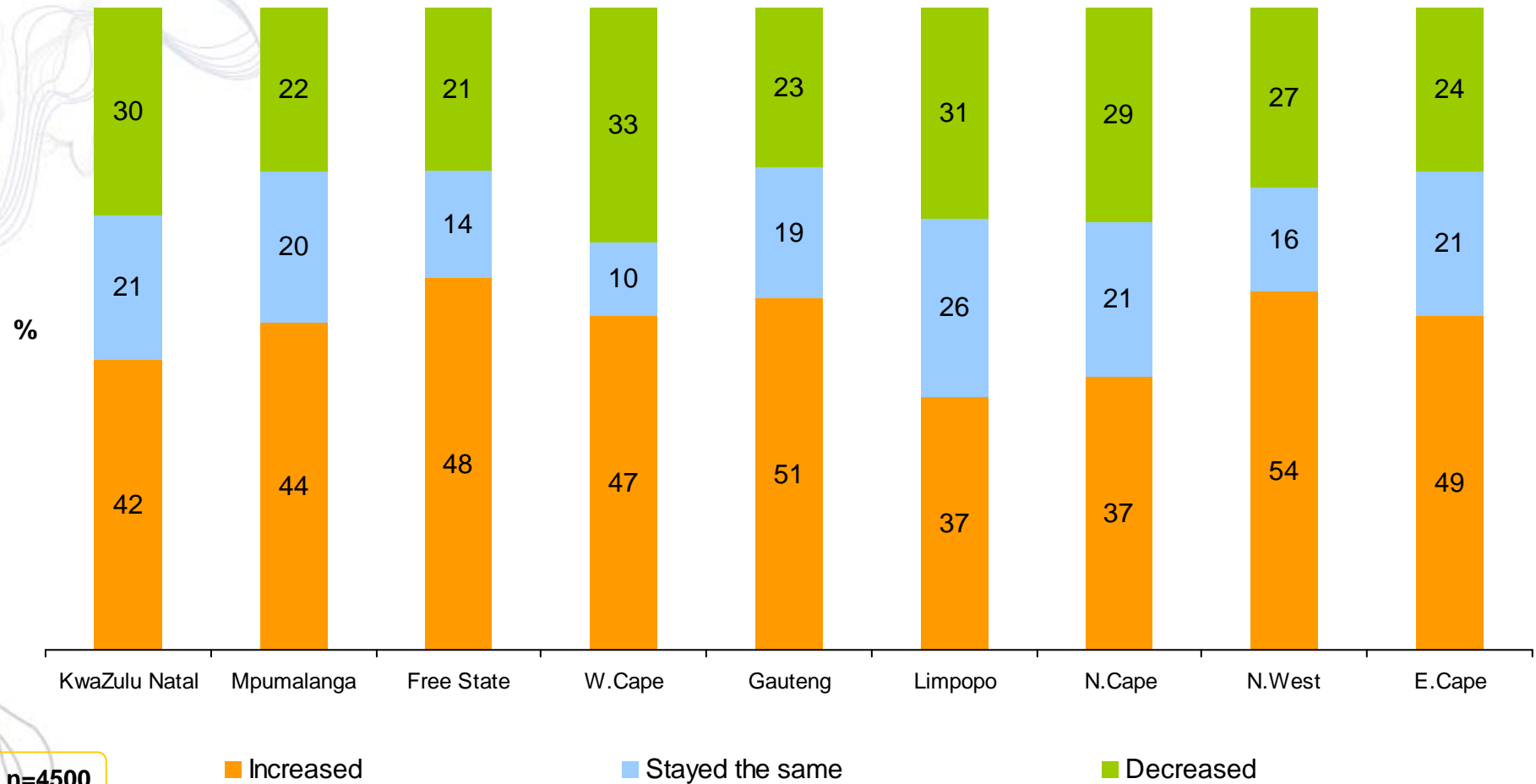
Do you think violent crime has increased, decreased or stayed the same in your area in the last 12 months (Oct 2006-2007)?

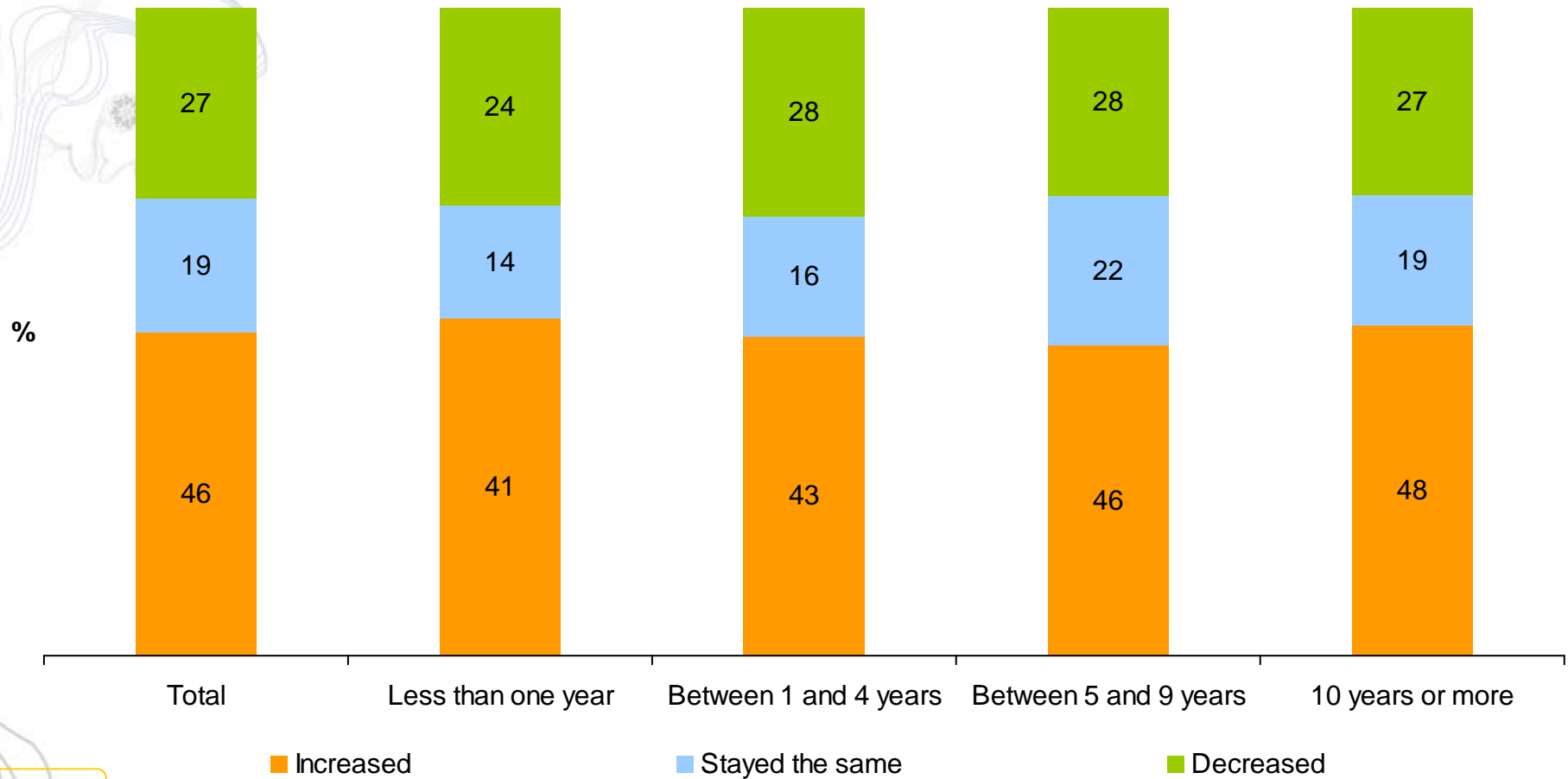

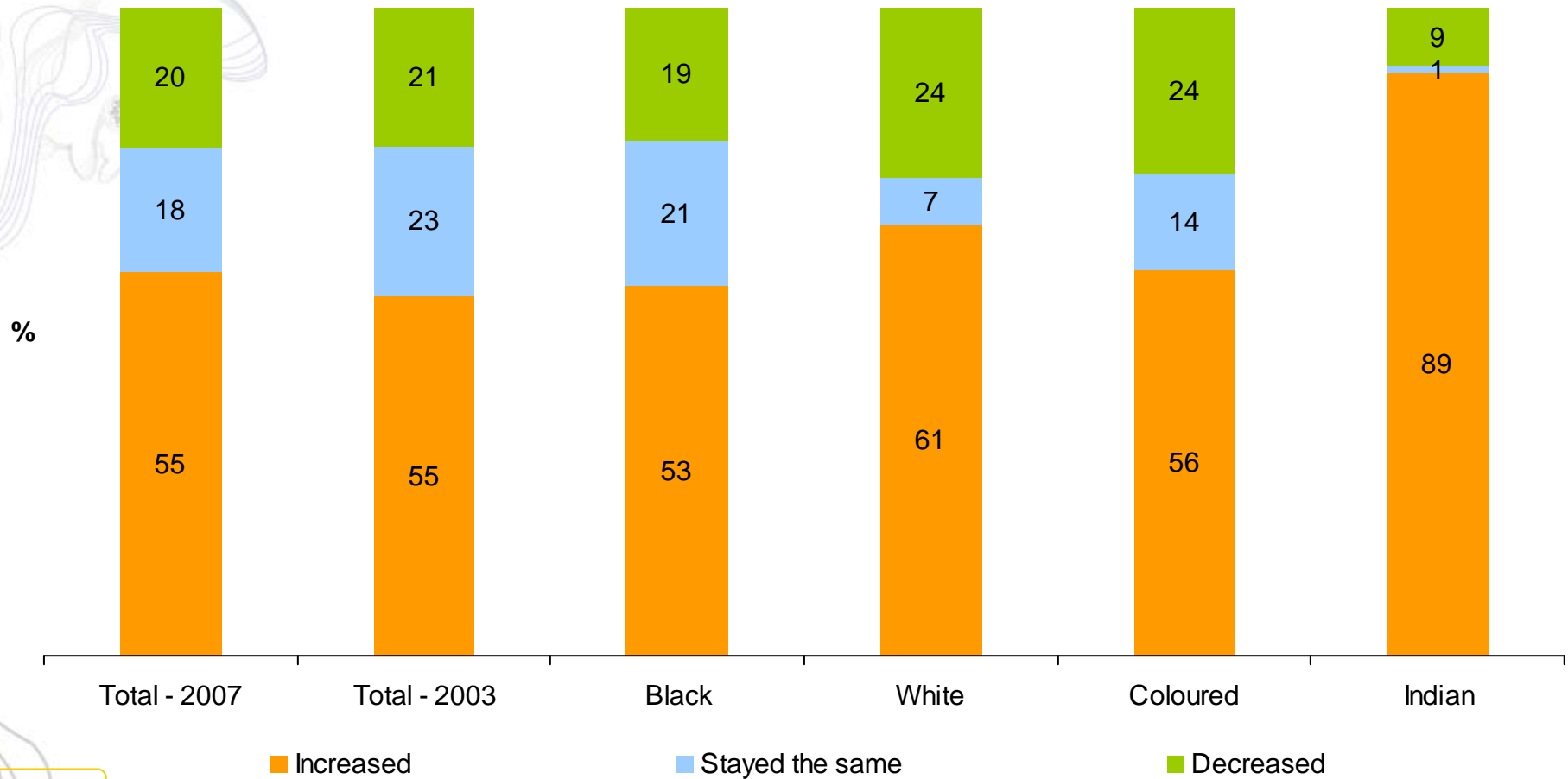
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The results continue to reflect a more positive outlook among newcomers to a residential area.

Do you think property crime has increased, decreased or stayed the same in your area in the last 4 years (Oct 2003-2007)?

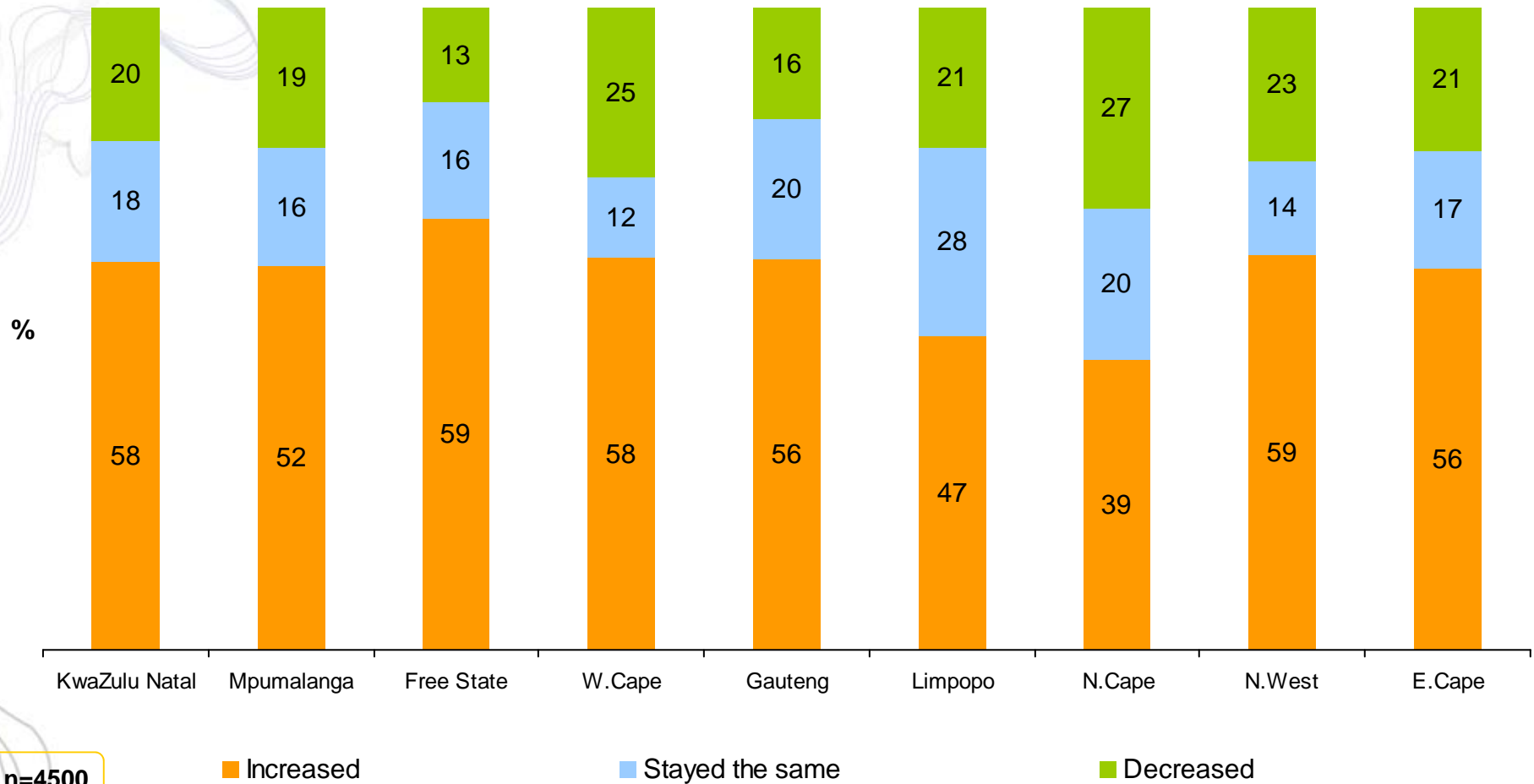


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The question on property crime in the past 4 years recorded the highest negative response among Indian respondents.

Do you think property crime has increased, decreased or stayed the same in your area in the last 4 years (Oct 2003-2007)?

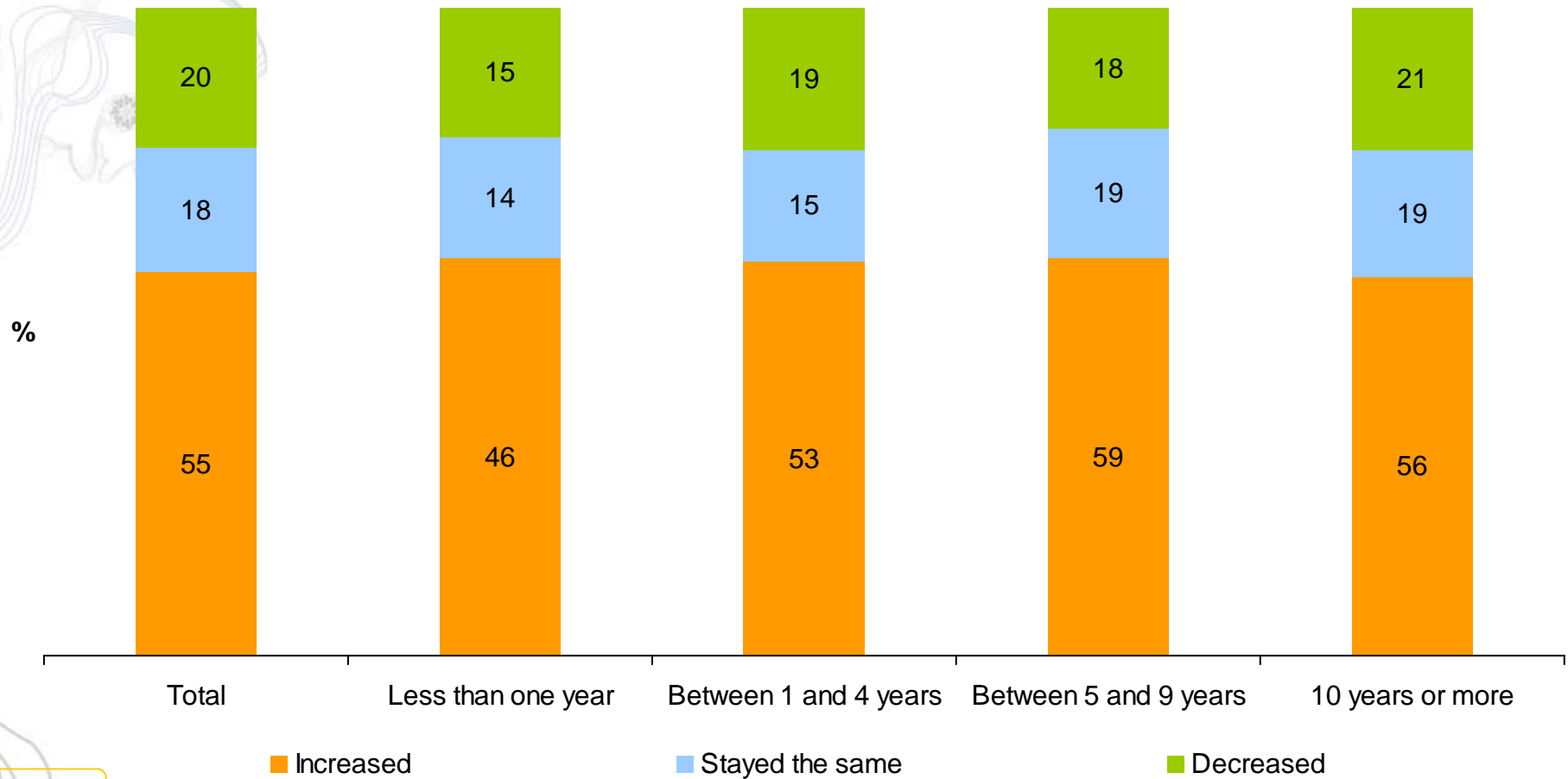

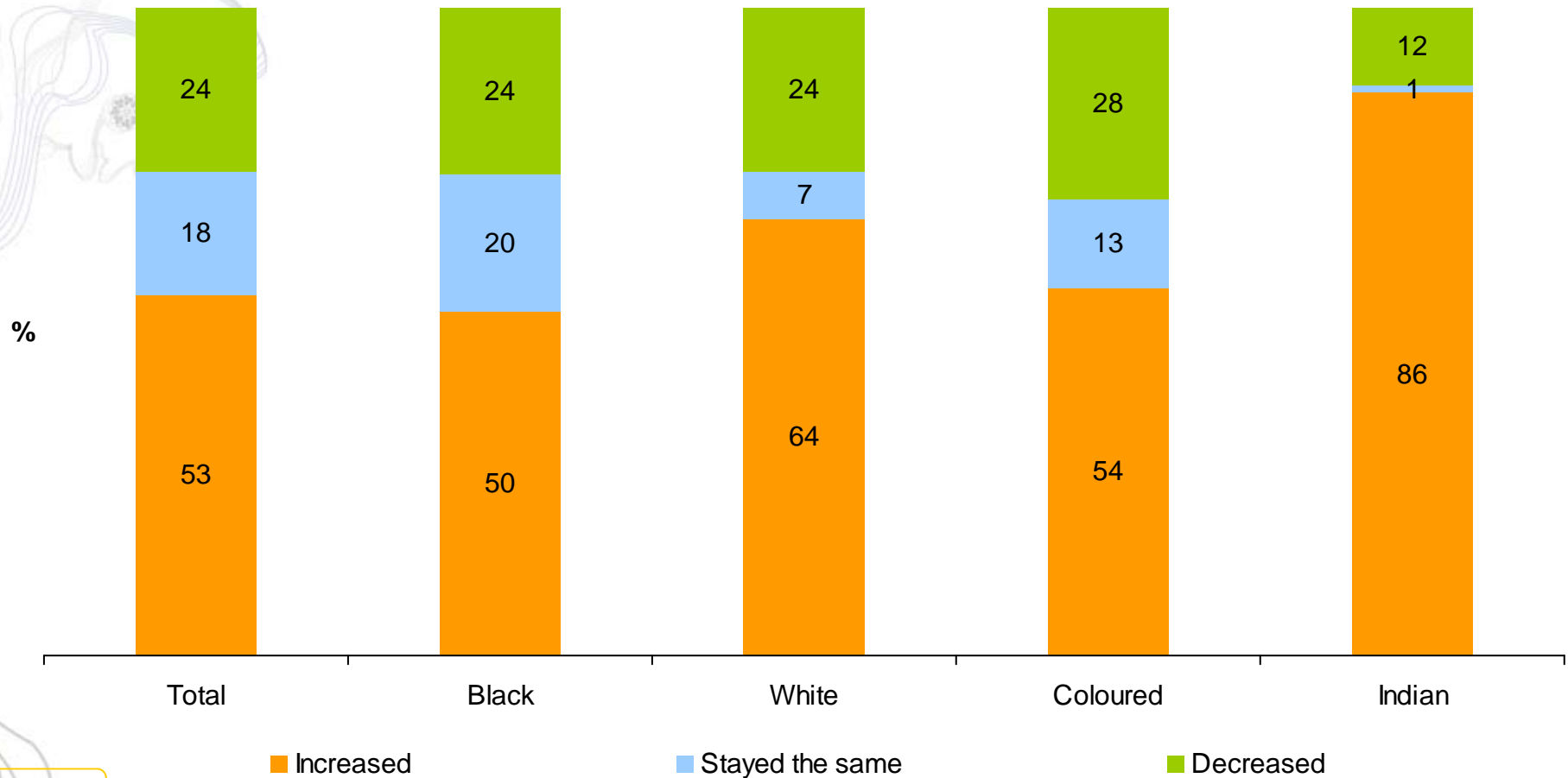
Do you think property crime has increased, decreased or stayed the same in your area in the last 4 years (Oct 2003-2007)?

Do you think property crime has increased, decreased or stayed the same in your area in the last 12 months (Oct 2006-2007)?

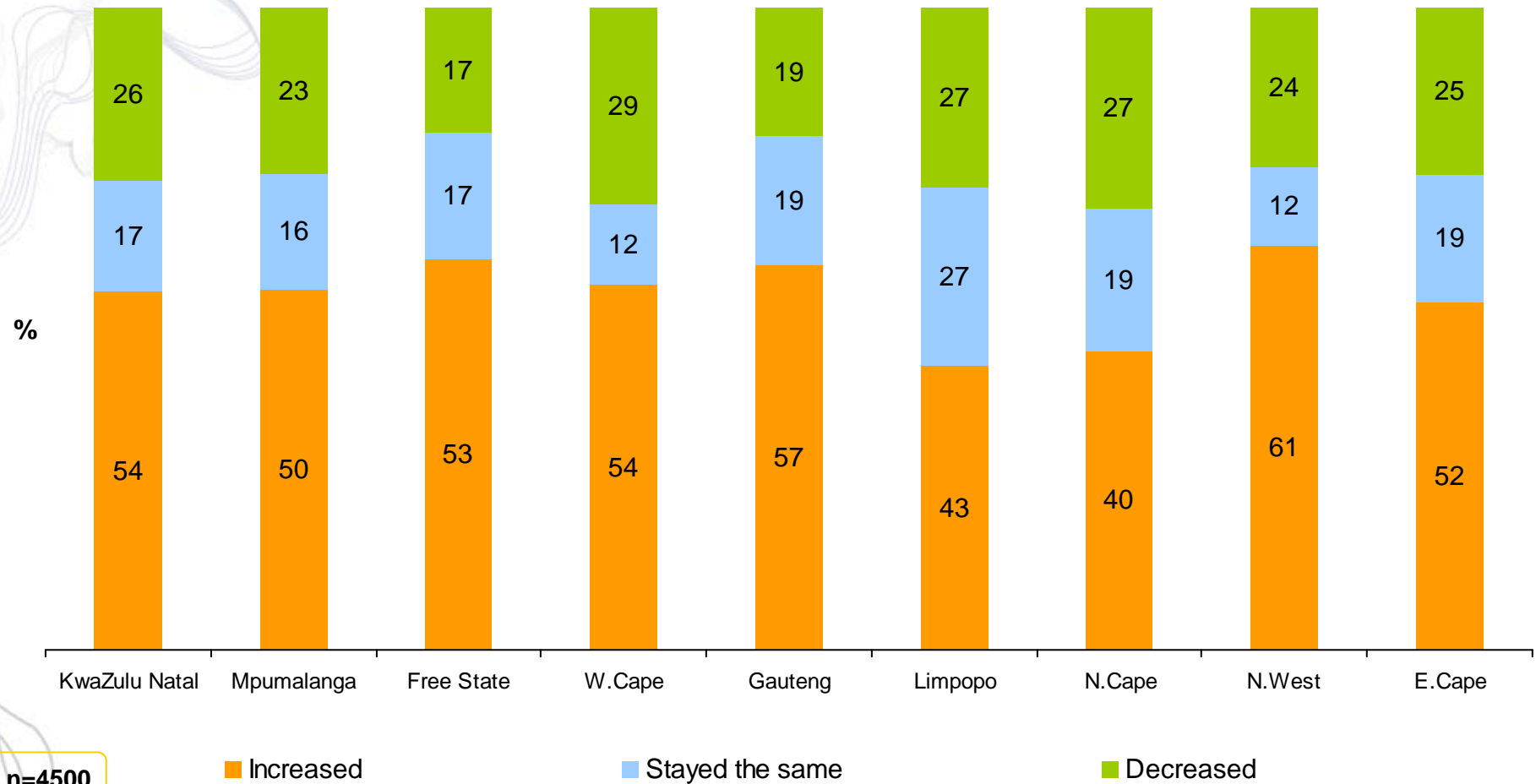


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As in the case of crime generally, coloureds are most likely to regard property crime to have declined over the past year.

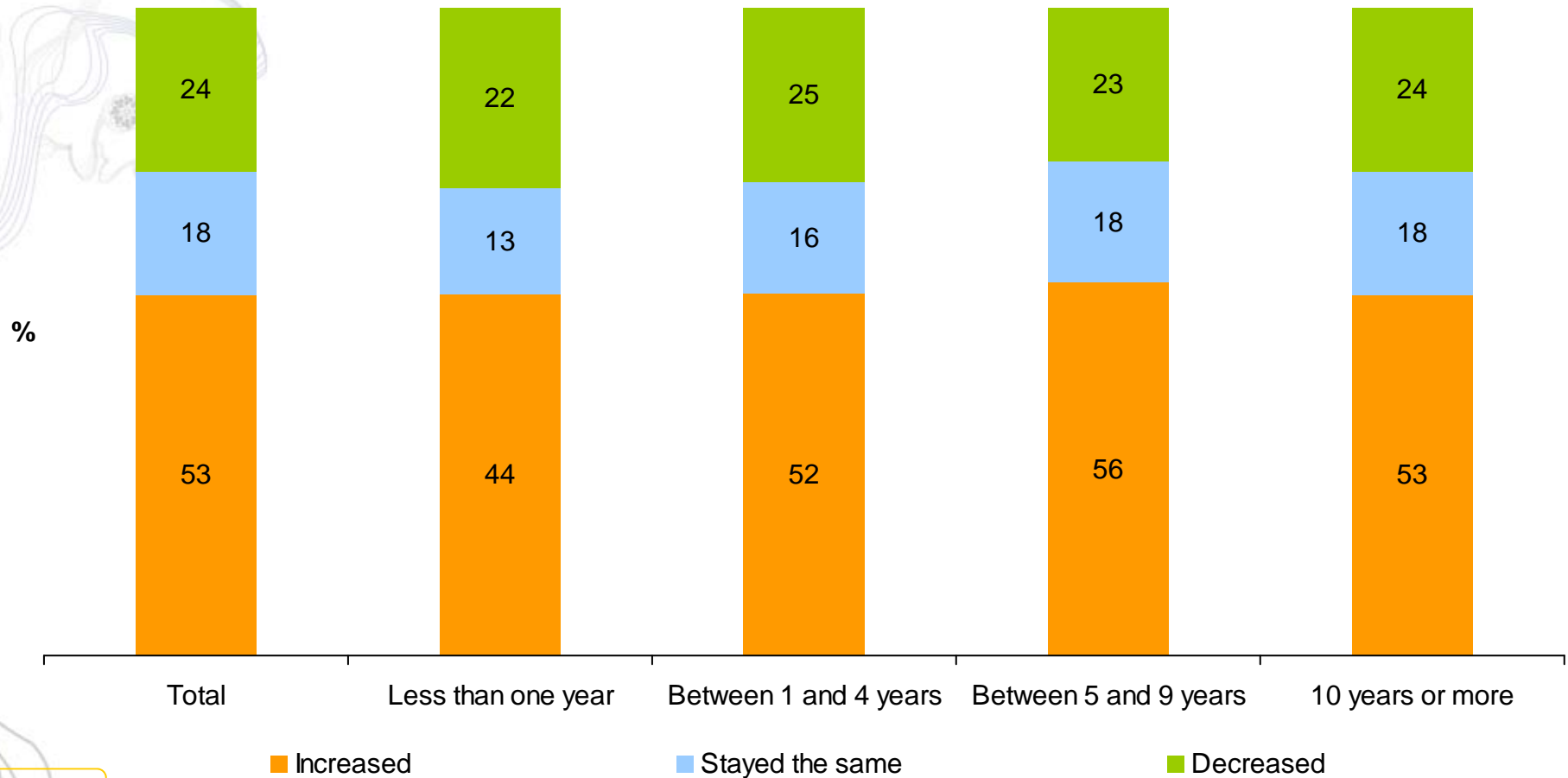
Do you think property crime has increased, decreased or stayed the same in your area in the last 12 months (Oct 2006-2007)?

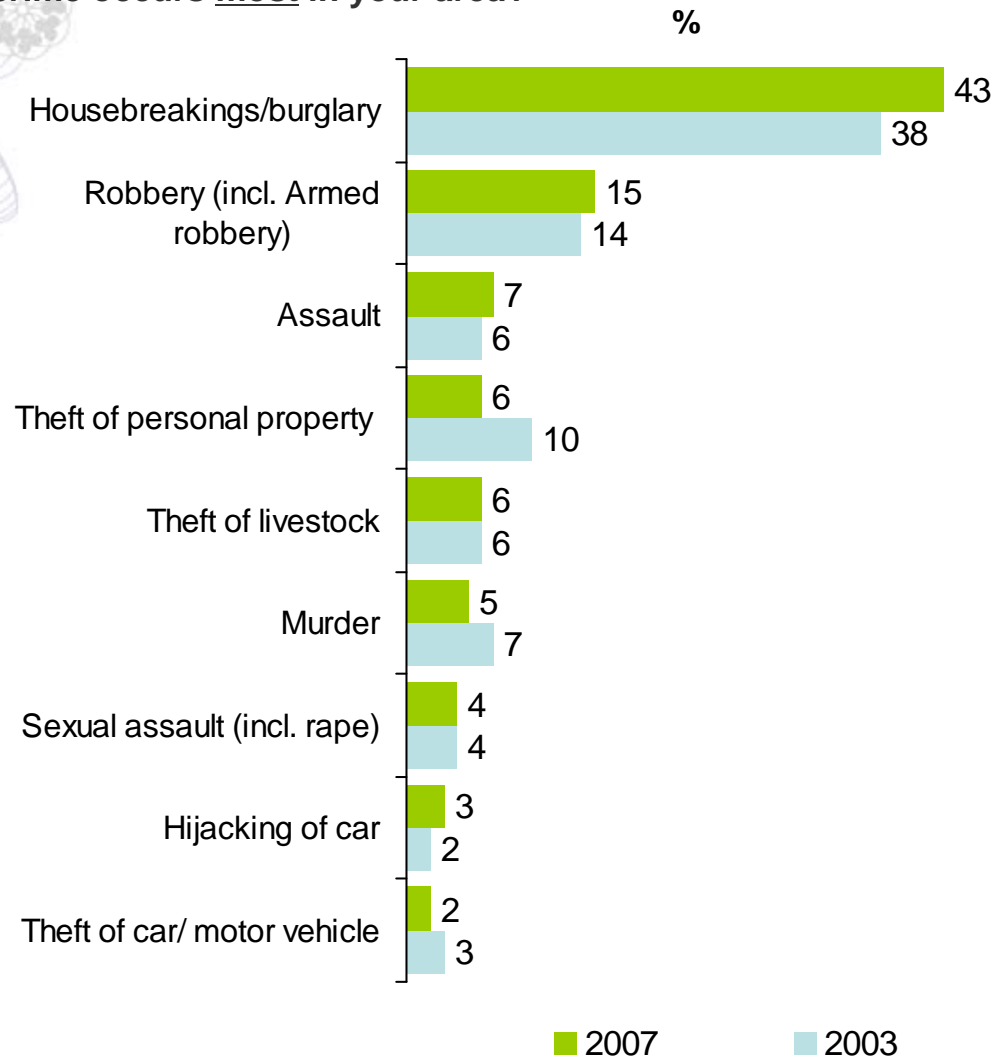
Newcomers to residential areas continue to be the most optimistic about the crime situation in their area, possibly because they have had access to less information about criminal activities in their areas.

With the exception of the Free State, respondents in all regions regarded housebreakings to be the most commonly occurring crime in their area. In the Free State, the occurrence of assault appears to far outweigh the incidence in other regions. Theft of livestock occurs most commonly in Kwa-Zulu/Natal.

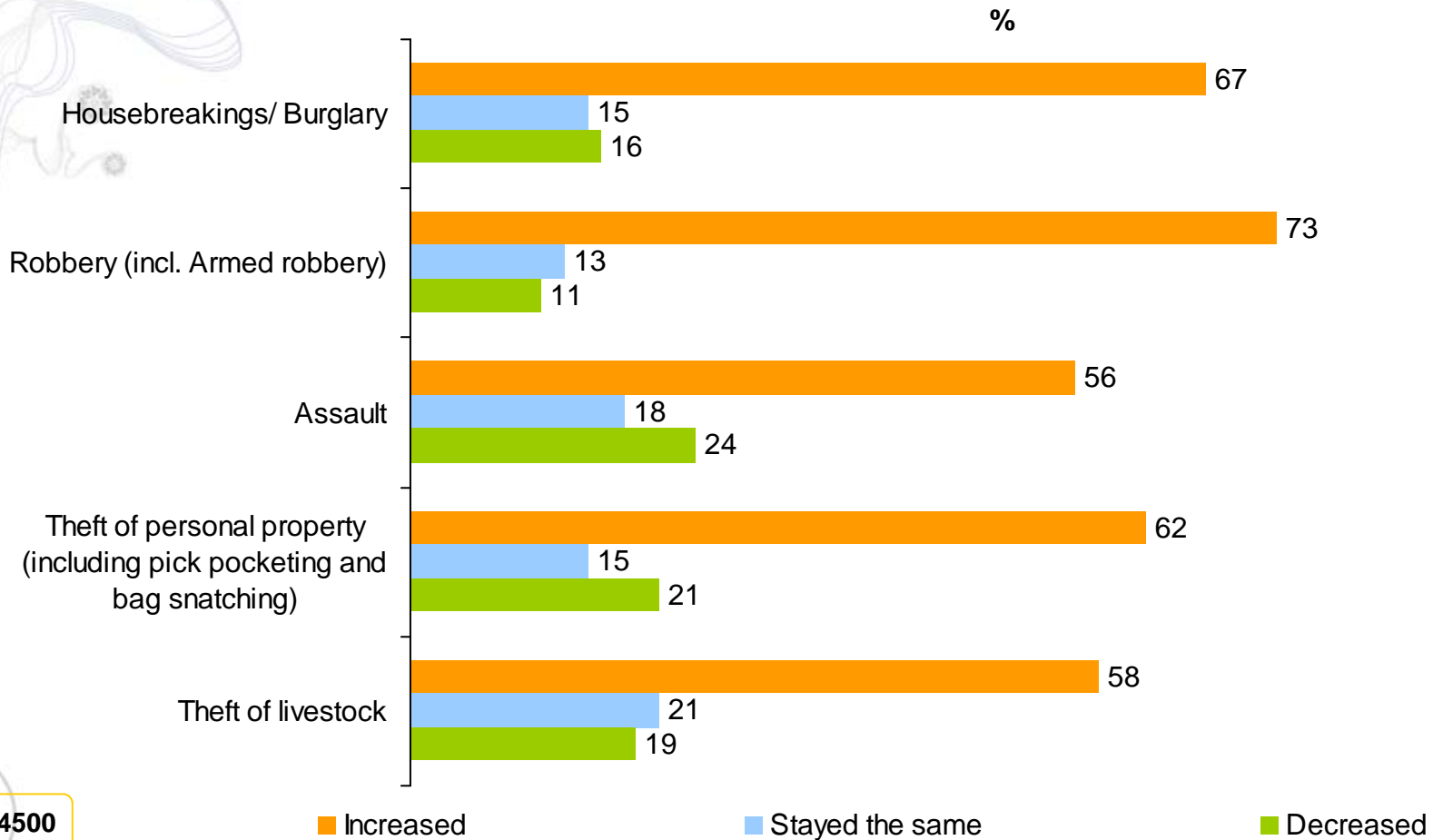

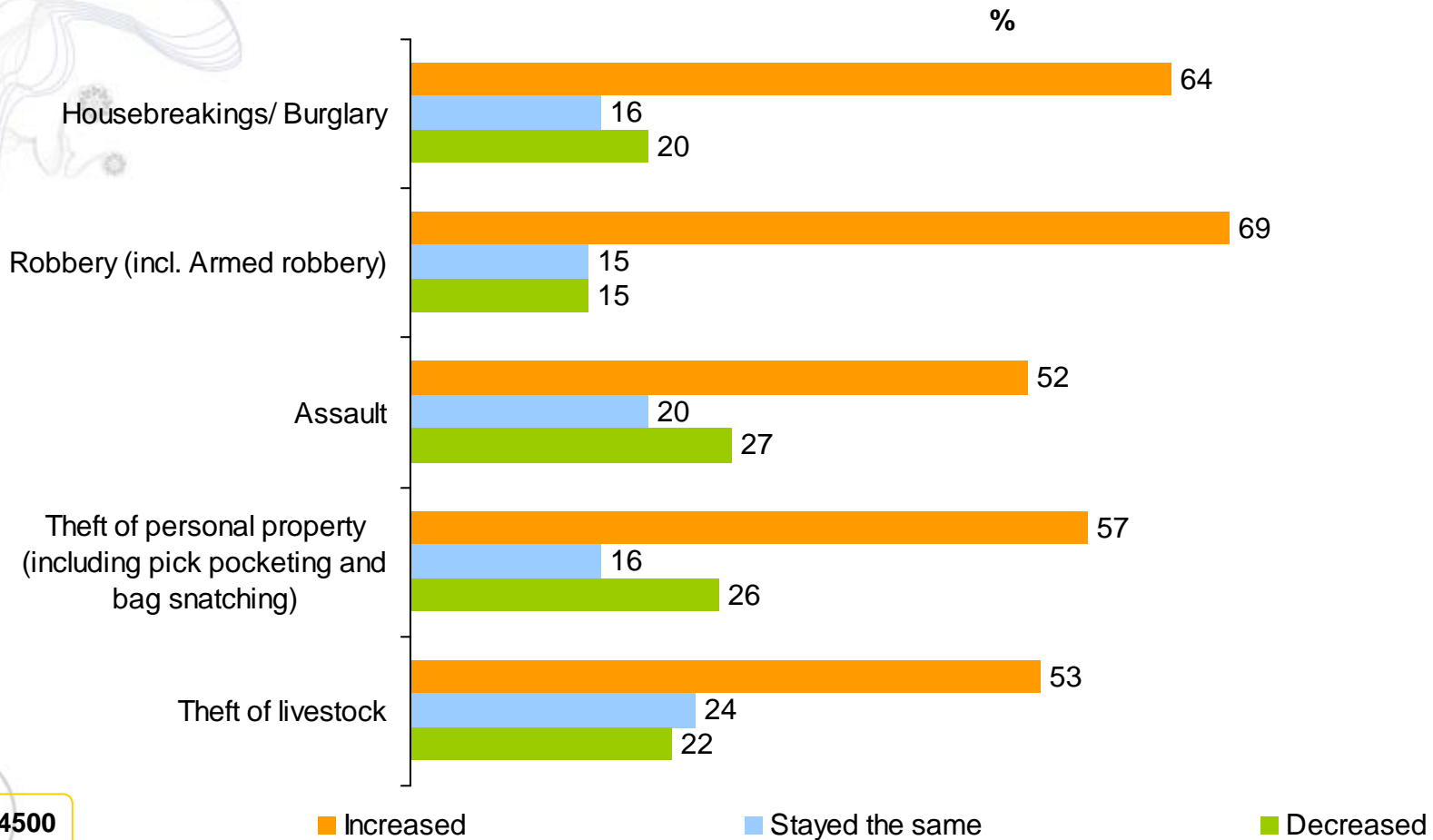

How do you think this crime has changed over the past 4 years (Oct 2003-2007)?



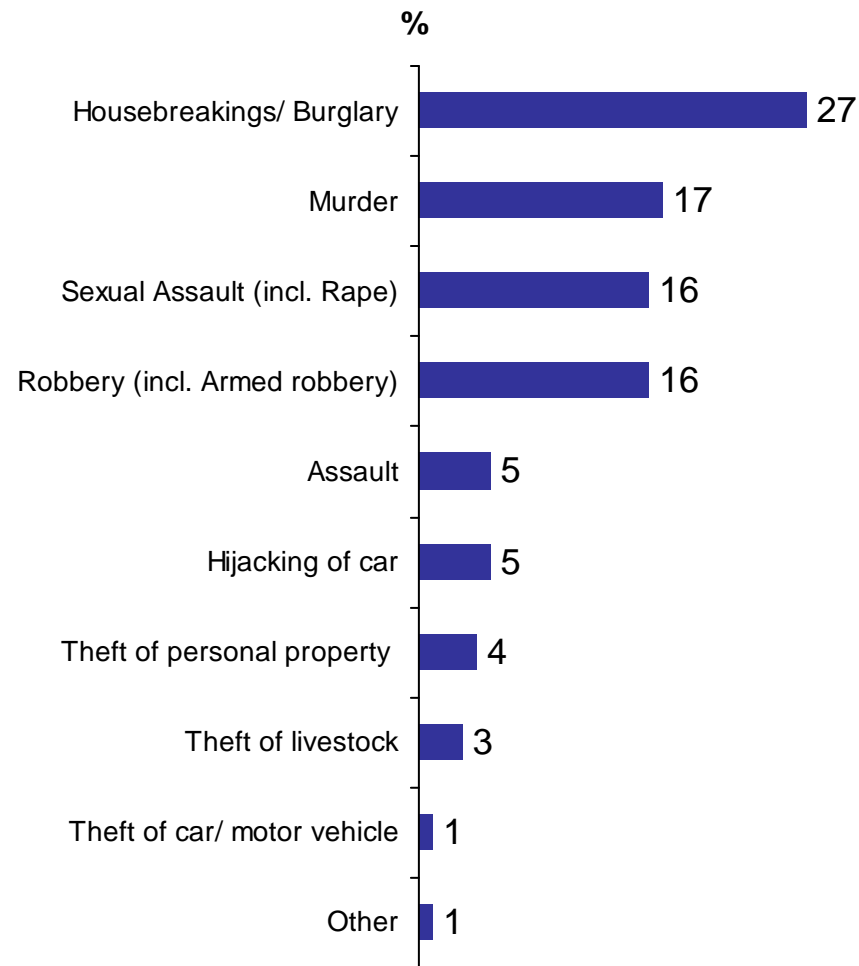

In the Free State, fear of assault is markedly higher than in other regions, a fear that appears not to be unfounded. Not only is the perception there that this is the most commonly occurring crime in this region, but in reality residents have the most personal experience of this crime. Murder is most feared by residents in Gauteng, while in the Northern Cape fear of sexual assault is high.

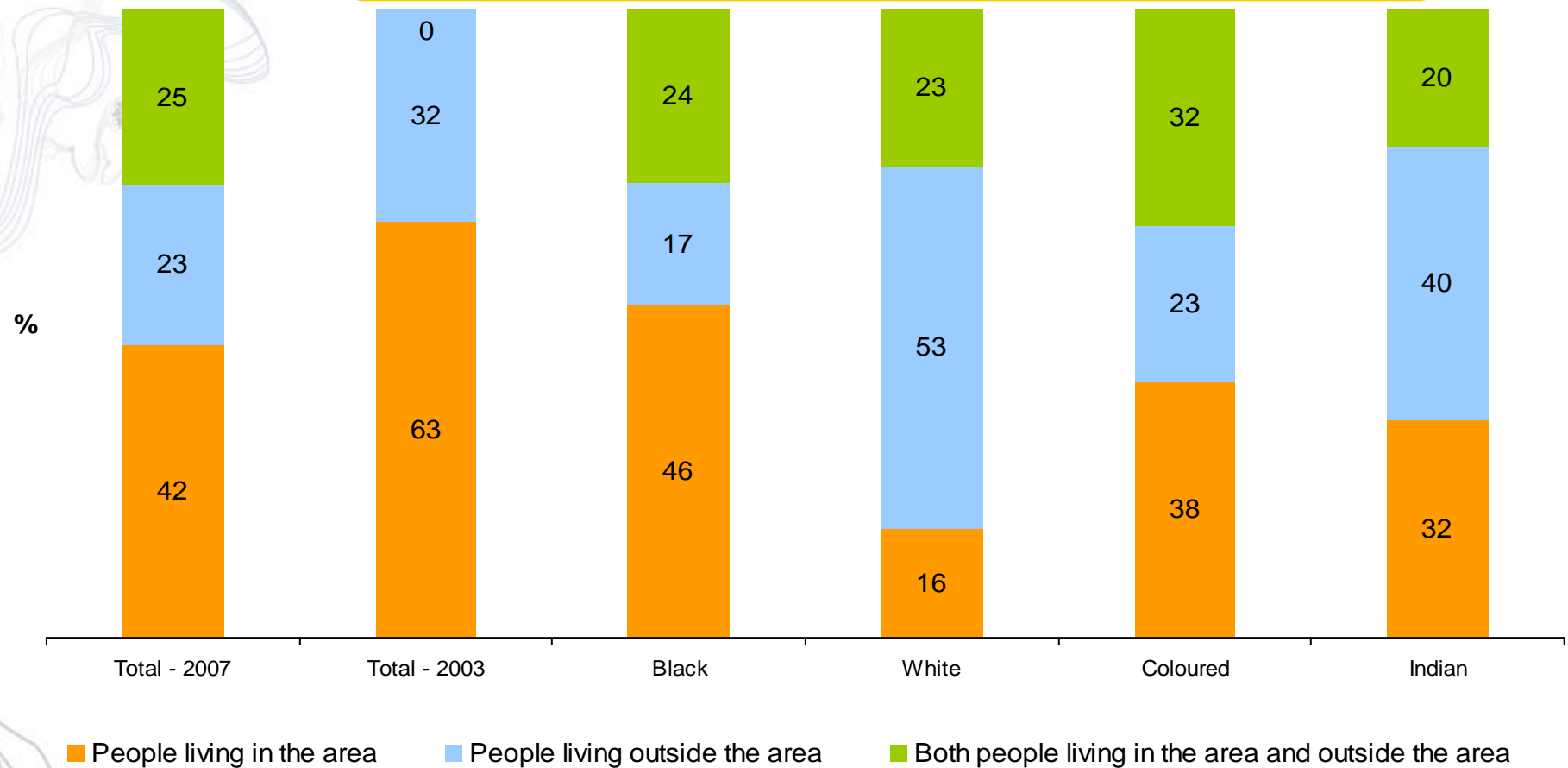

Do you think property crimes in this area are more likely to be committed by:



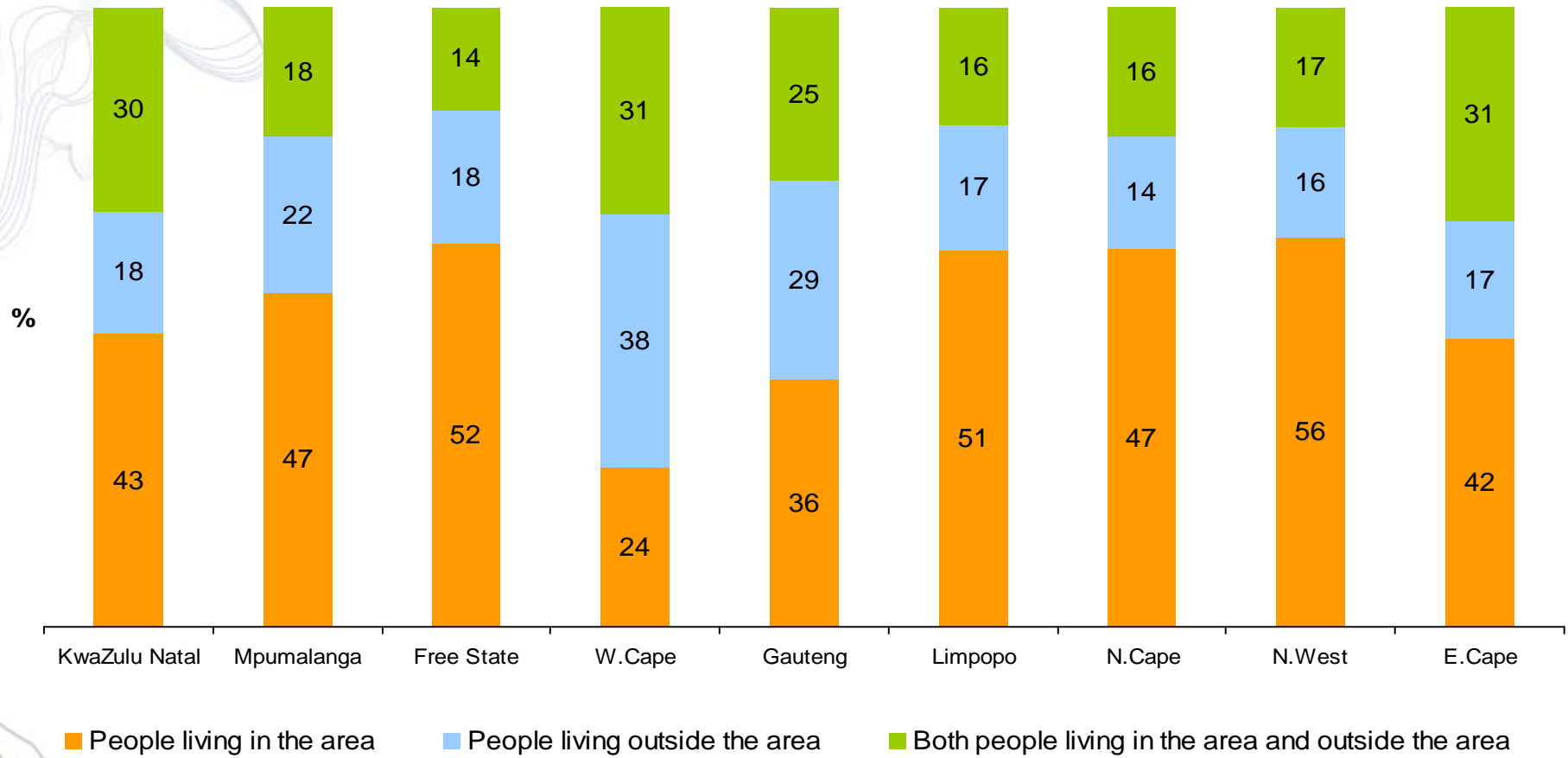

Do you think property crimes in this area are more likely to be committed by:

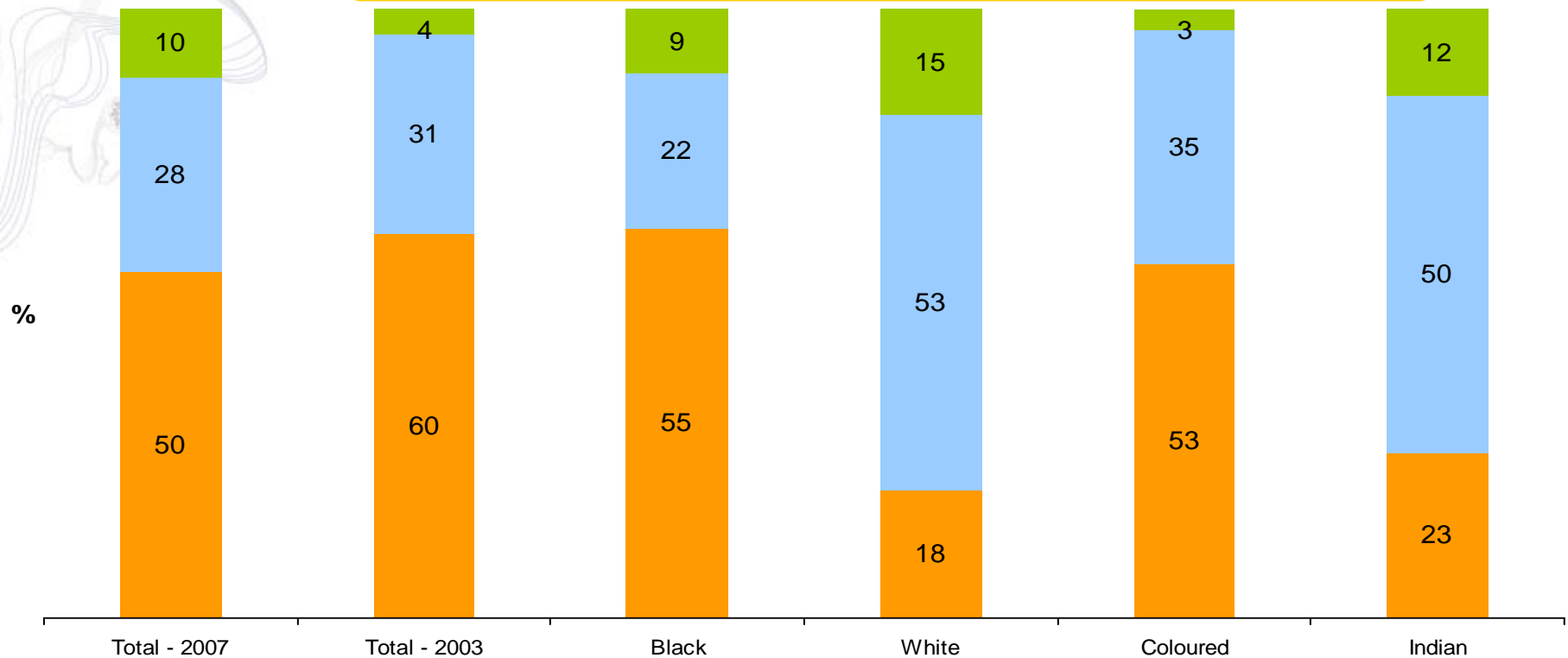

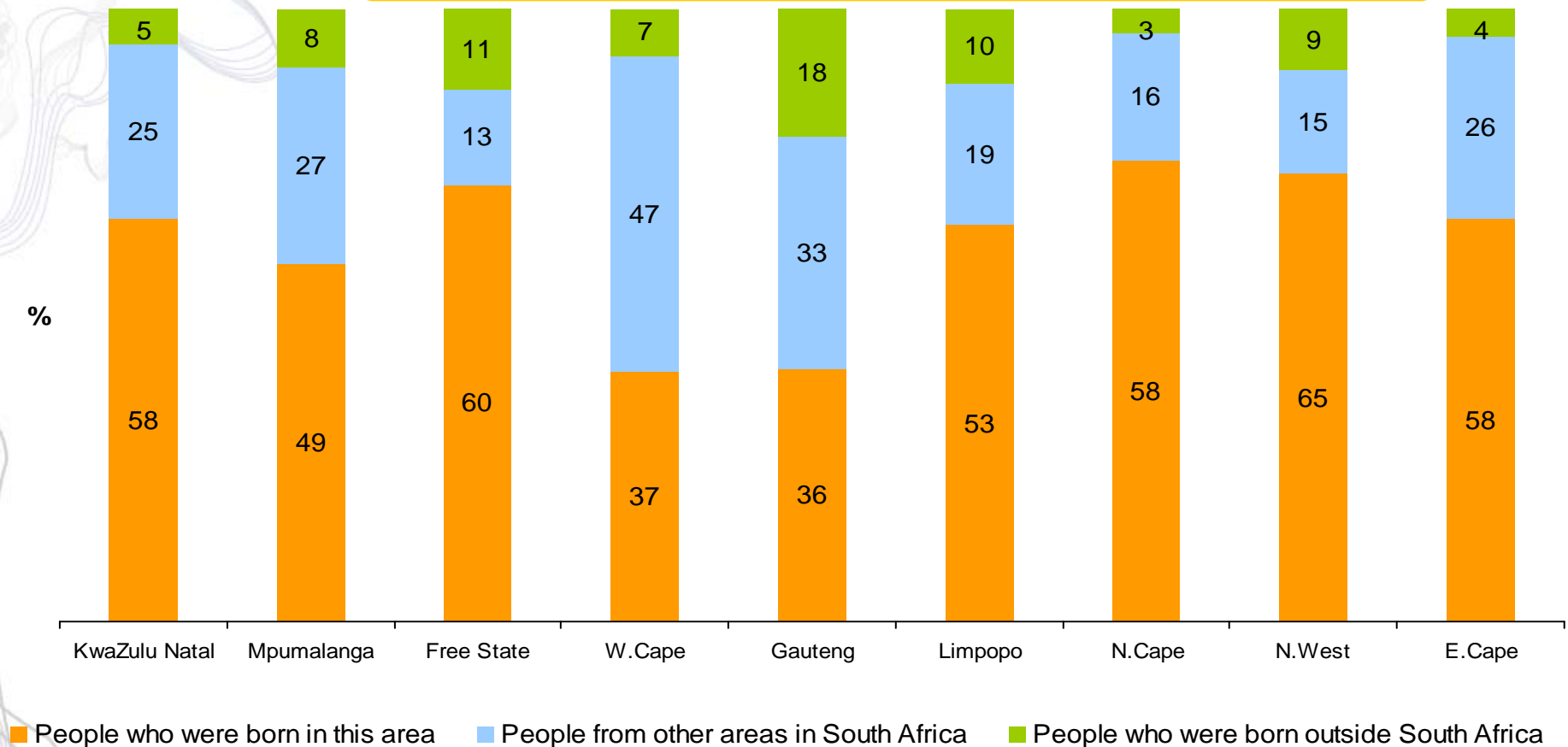

This chart does not support the impression that the media would sometimes have us believe that South Africans are seriously xenophobic. Only 10% of South Africans regard foreigners as being responsible for property crimes. Most whites and Indians believe that South Africans from outside their area are responsible for property crimes, while blacks and coloureds are most likely to feel that people who were born in their area are responsible.

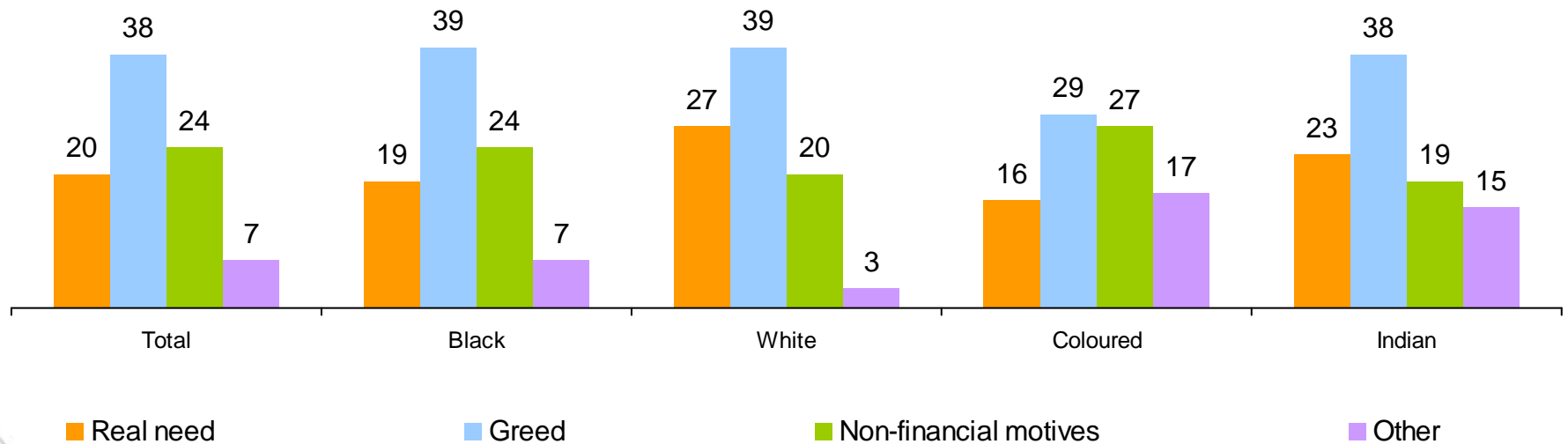

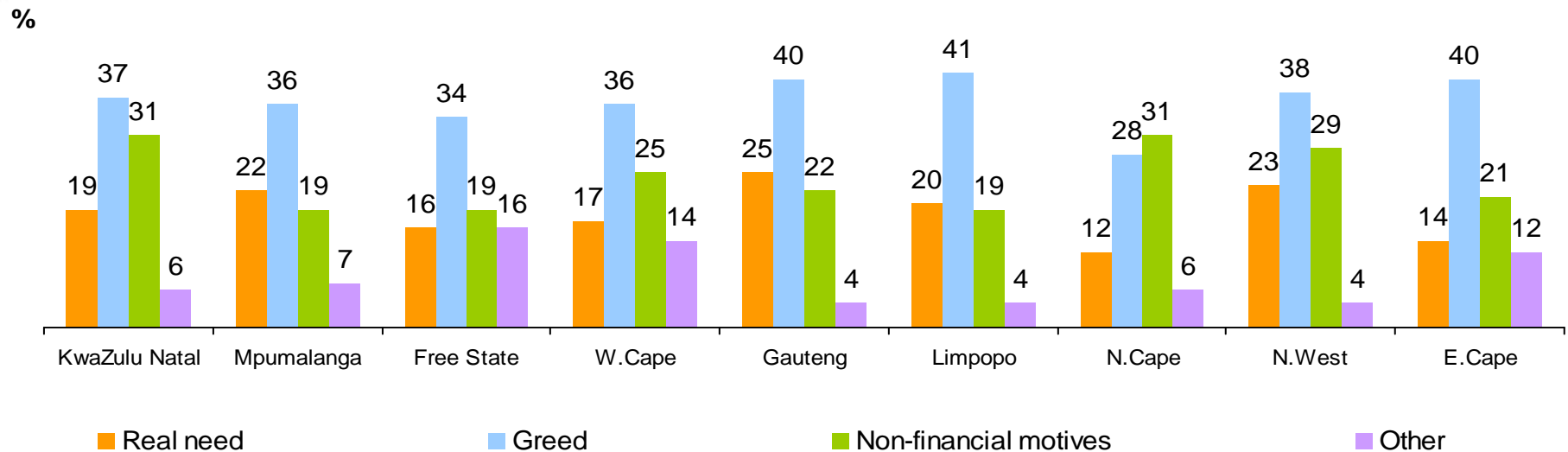


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Greed is seen as the main motivating factor spurring on perpetrators of property crimes.

Do you think that most of the people committing property crimes in this area are most motivated by:

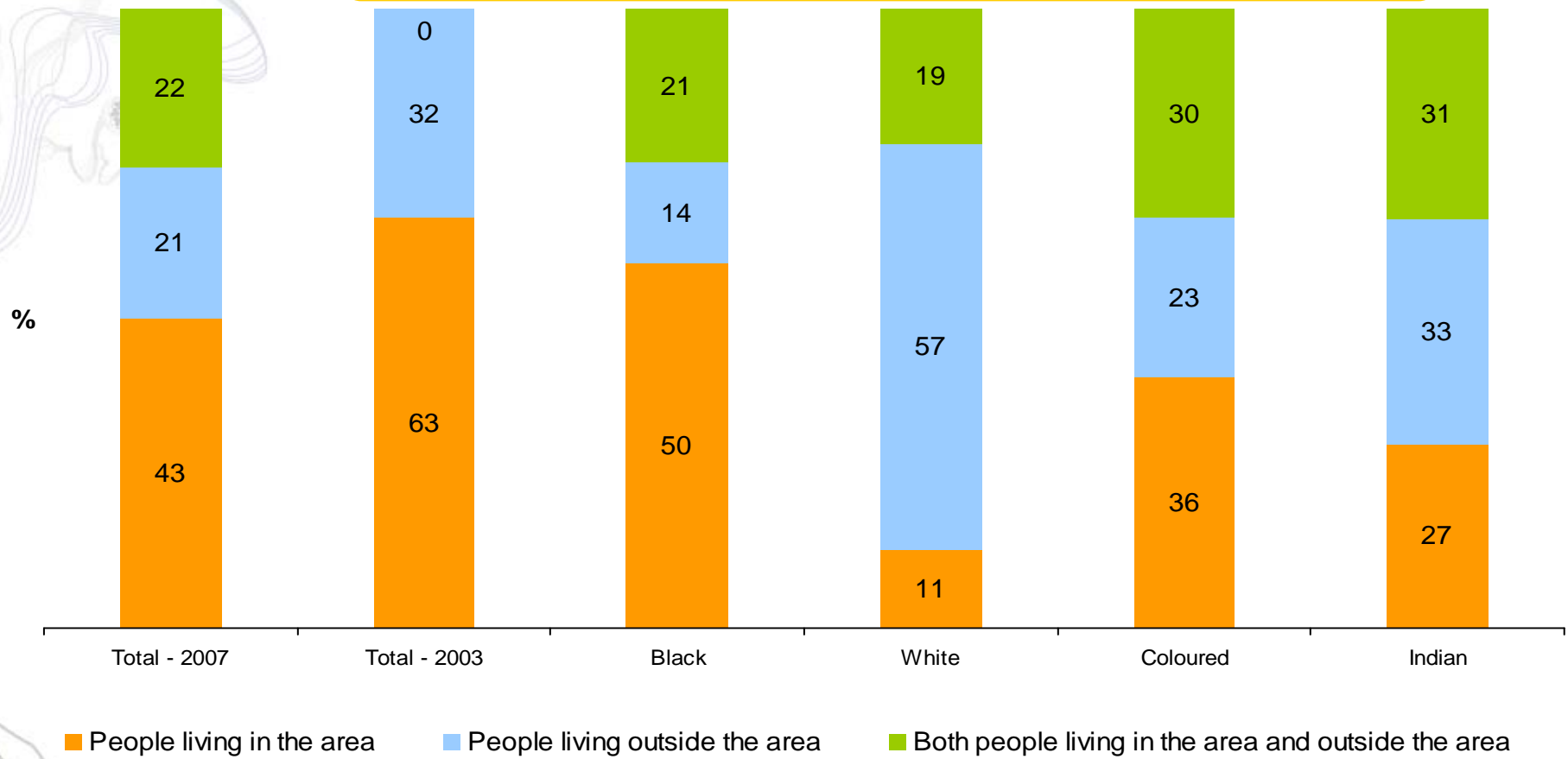

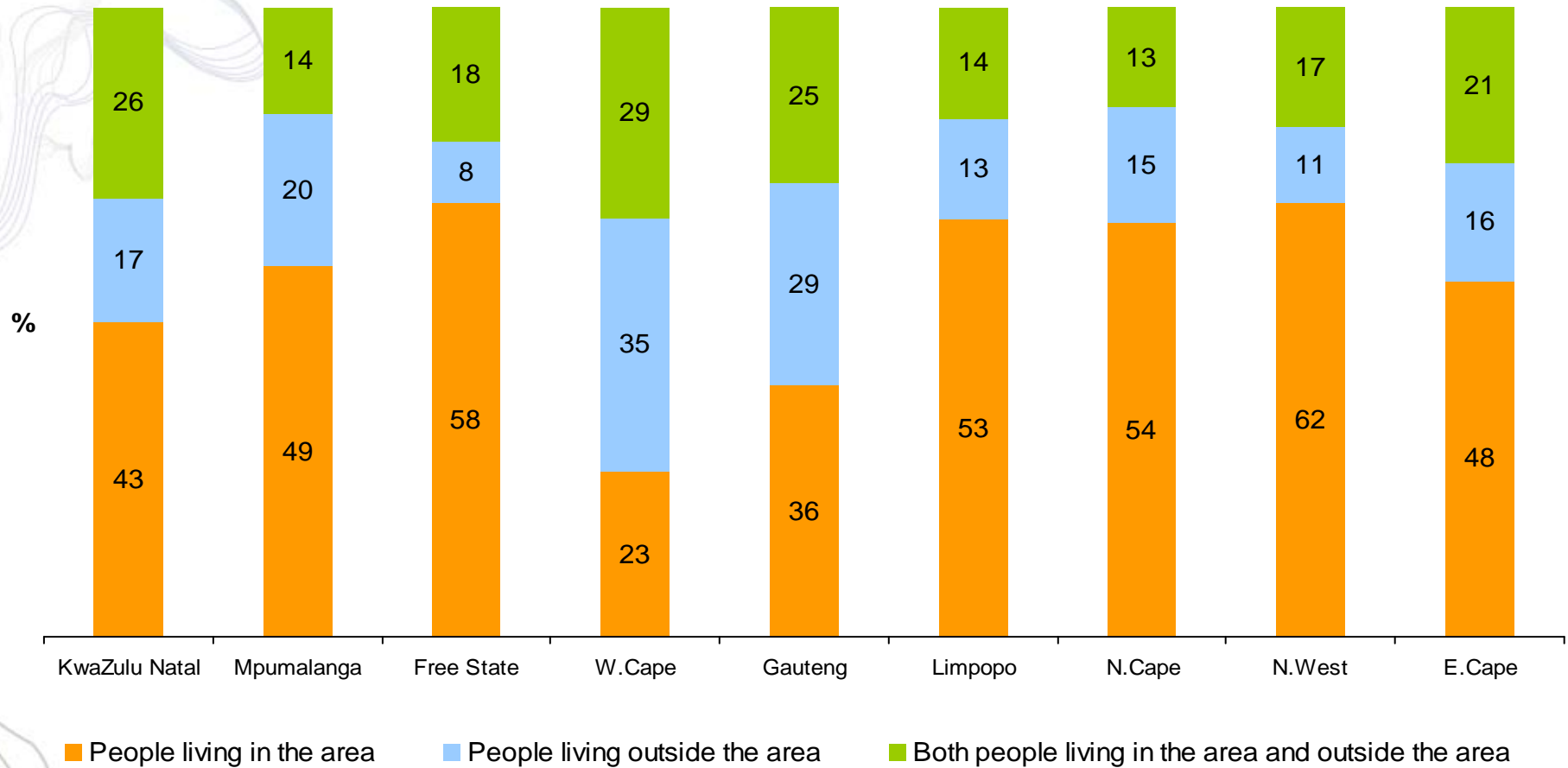

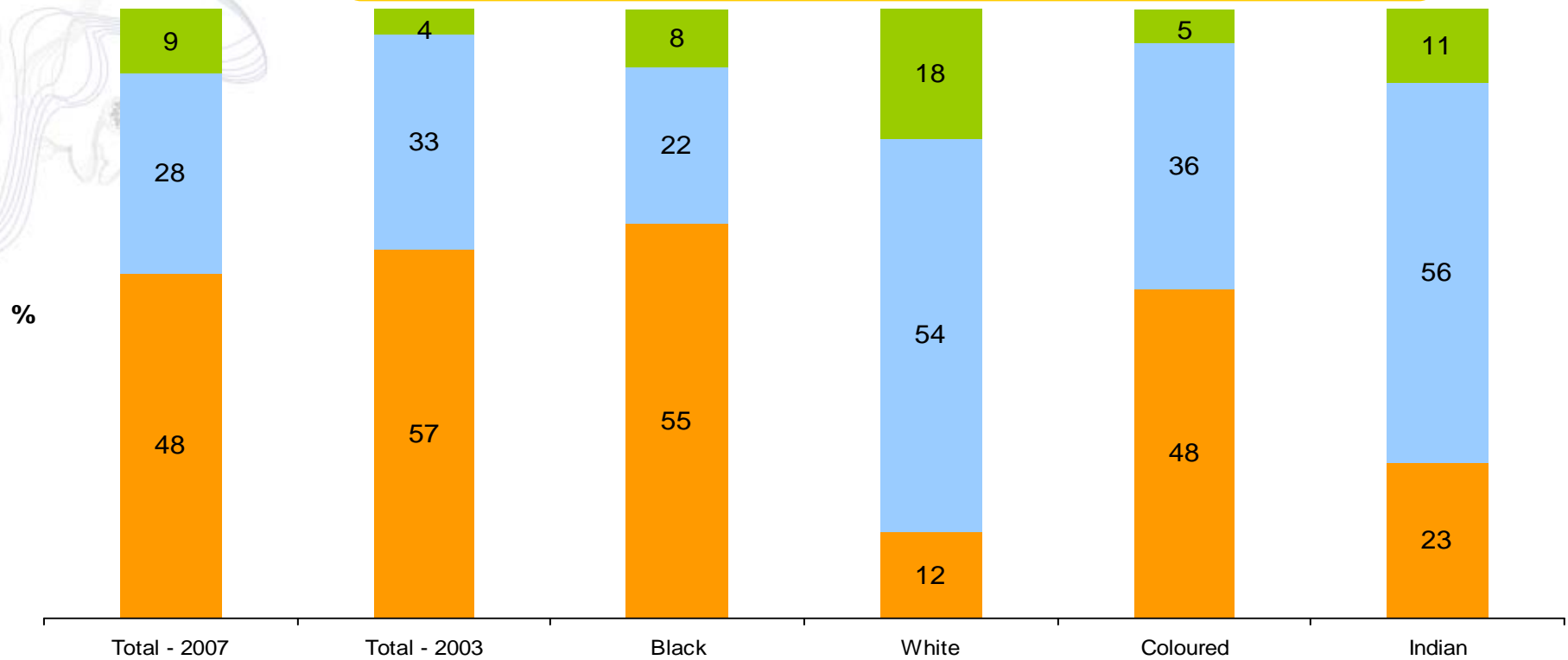

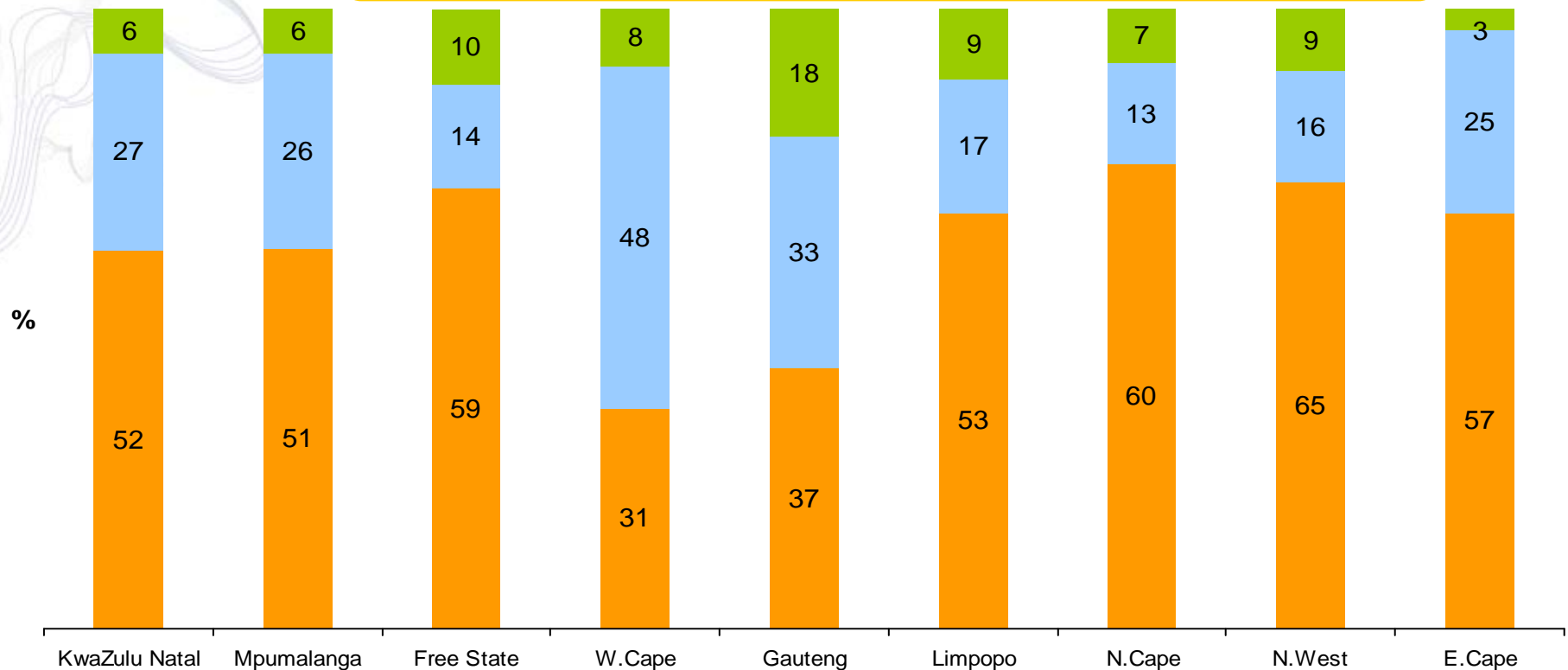

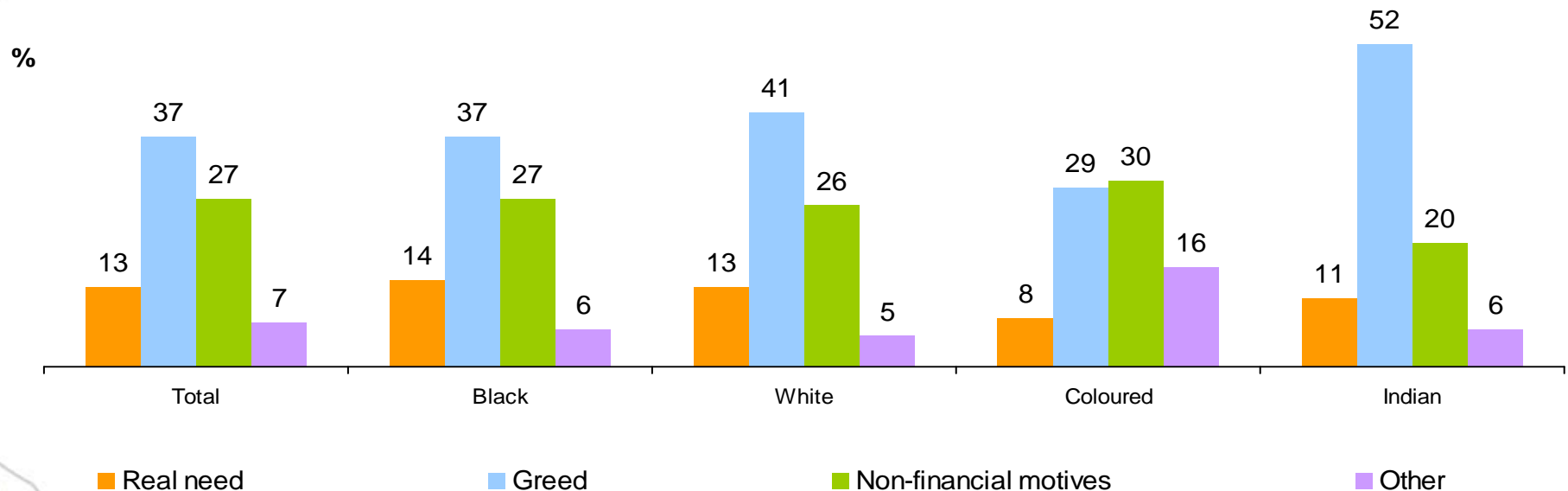

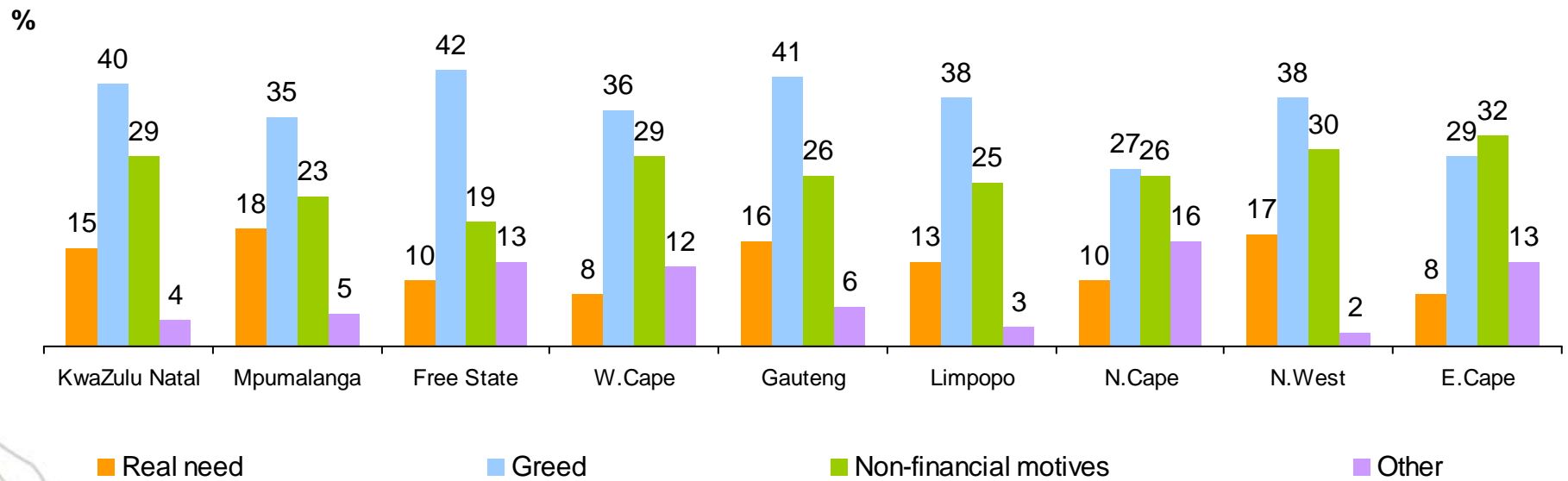

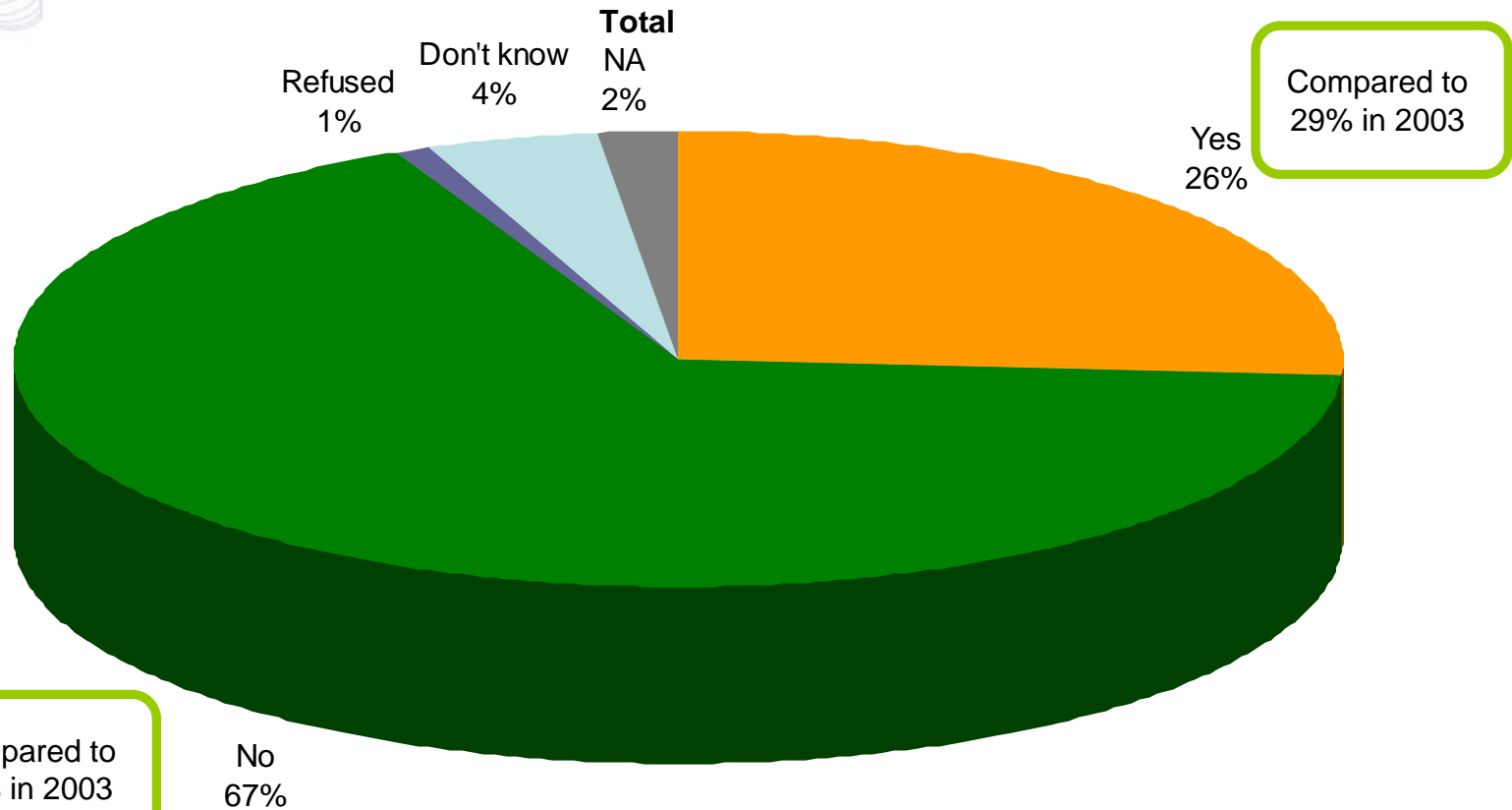
Do you think that most of the people committing violent crimes in this area are most motivated by:

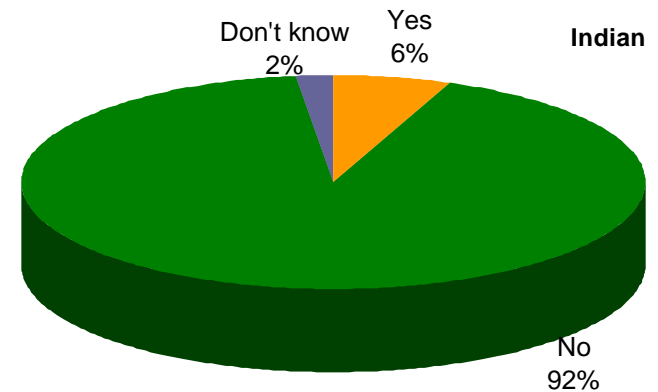

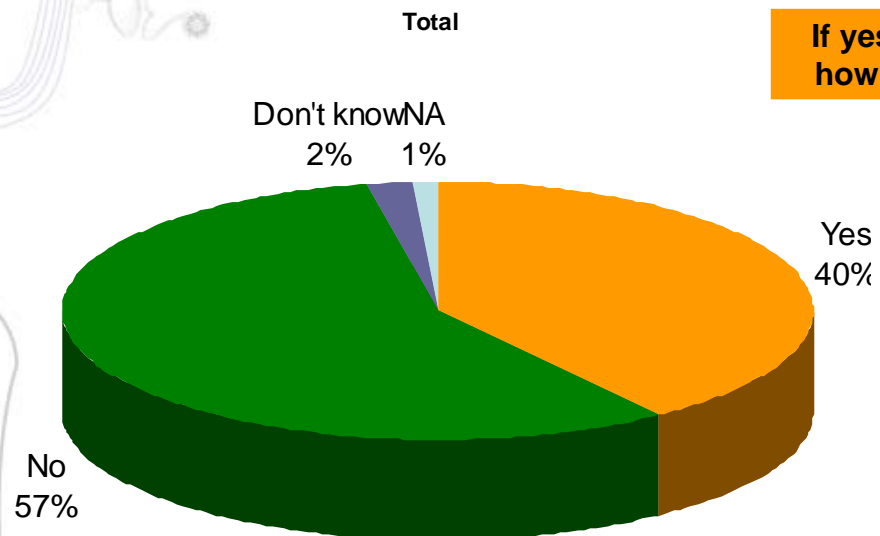

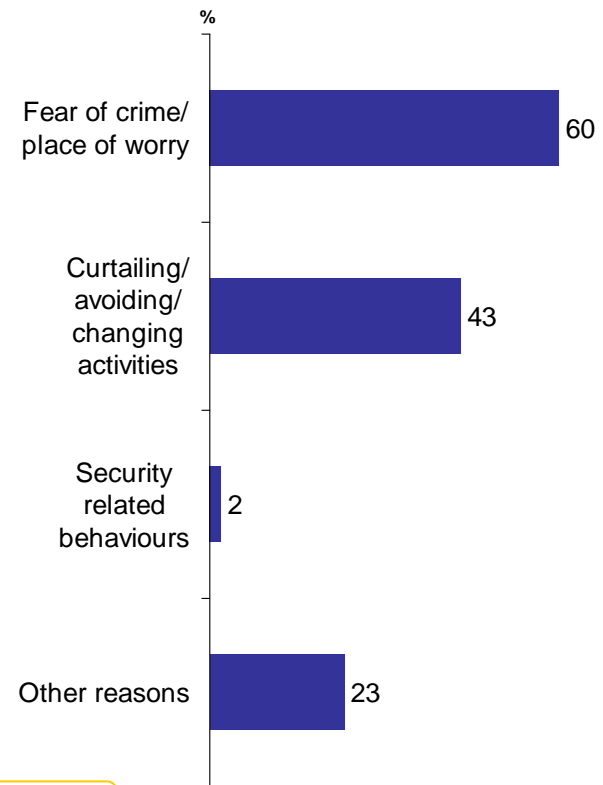

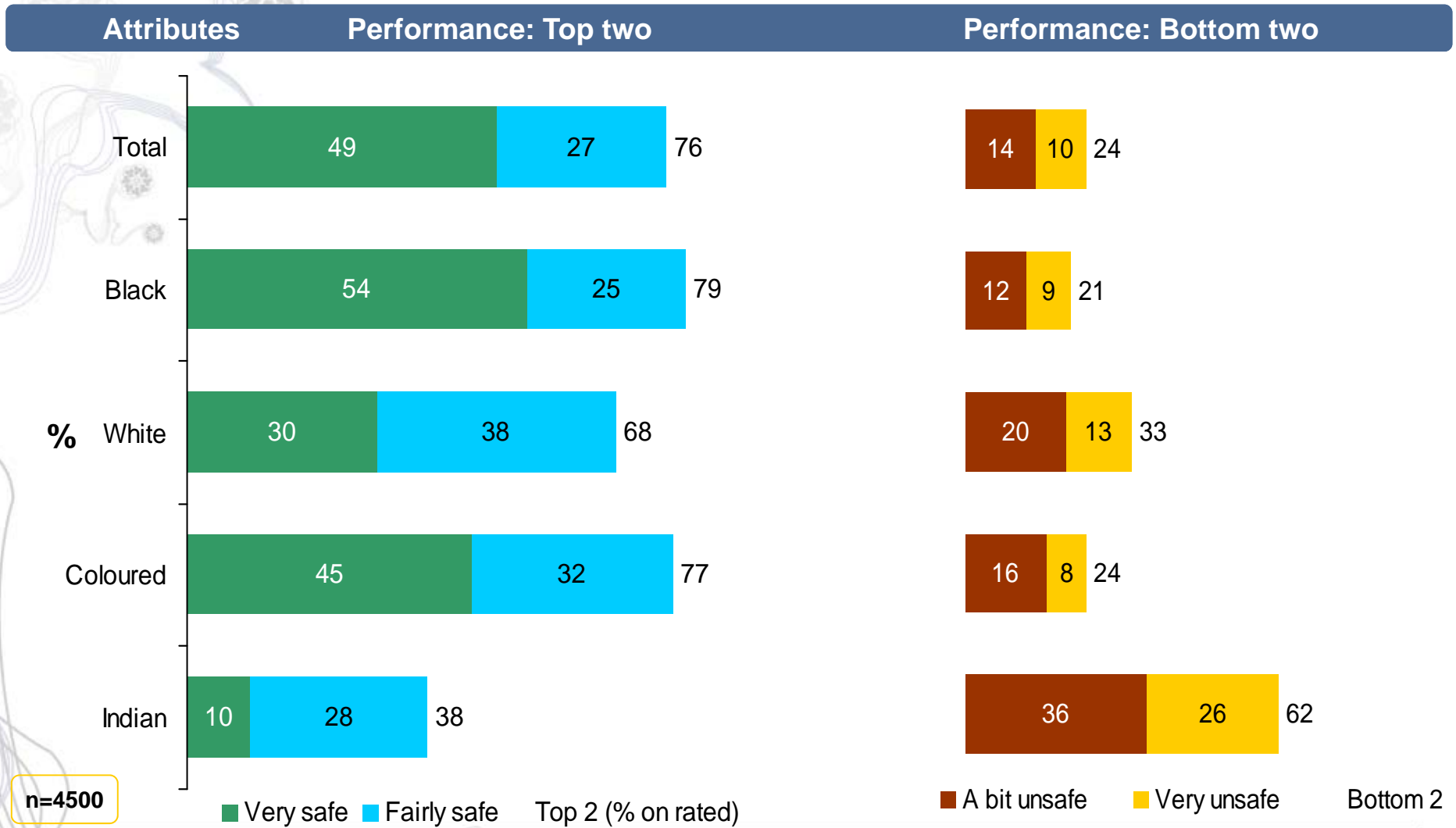

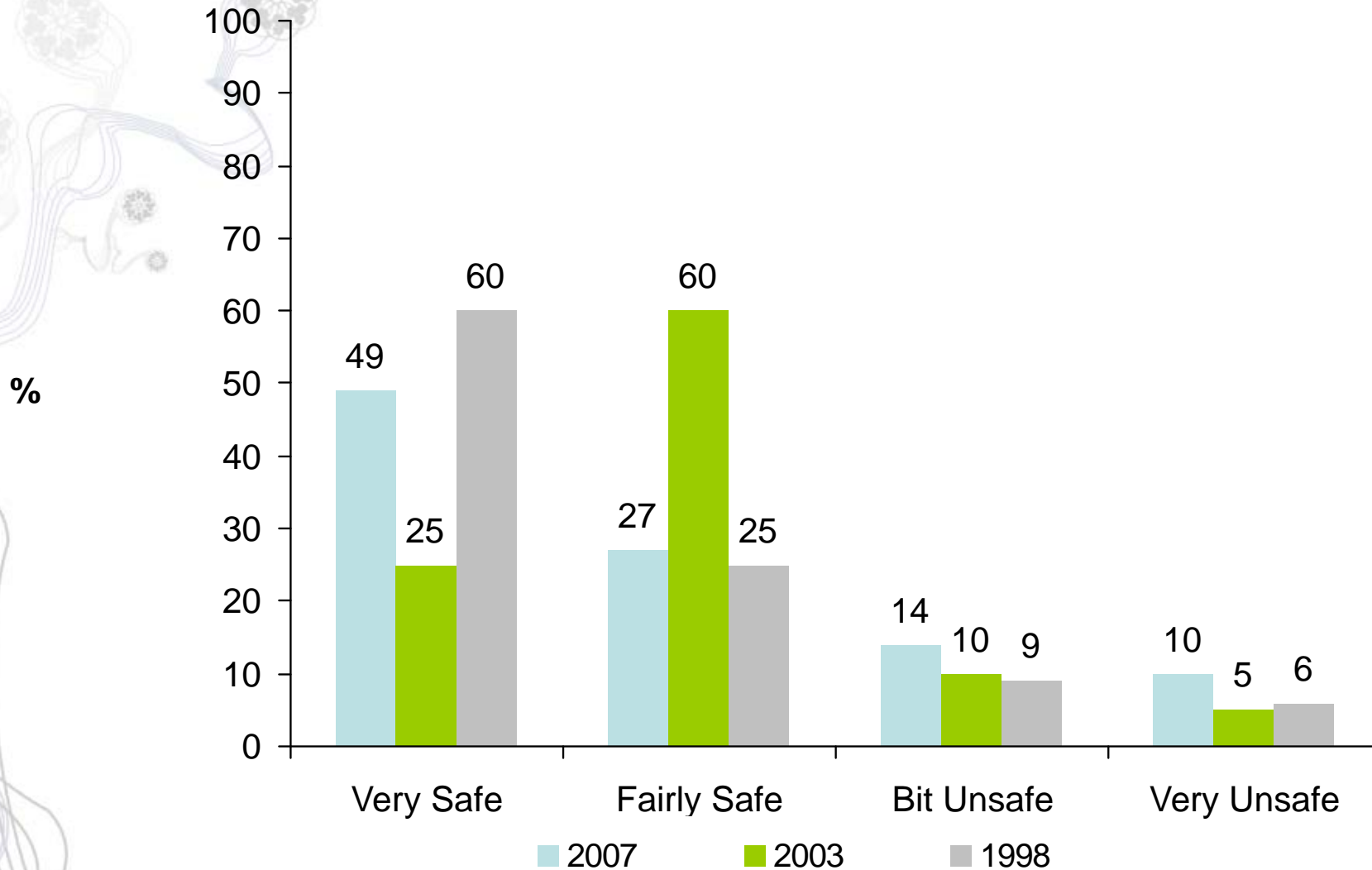

How safe do you feel walking alone in your area during the day?

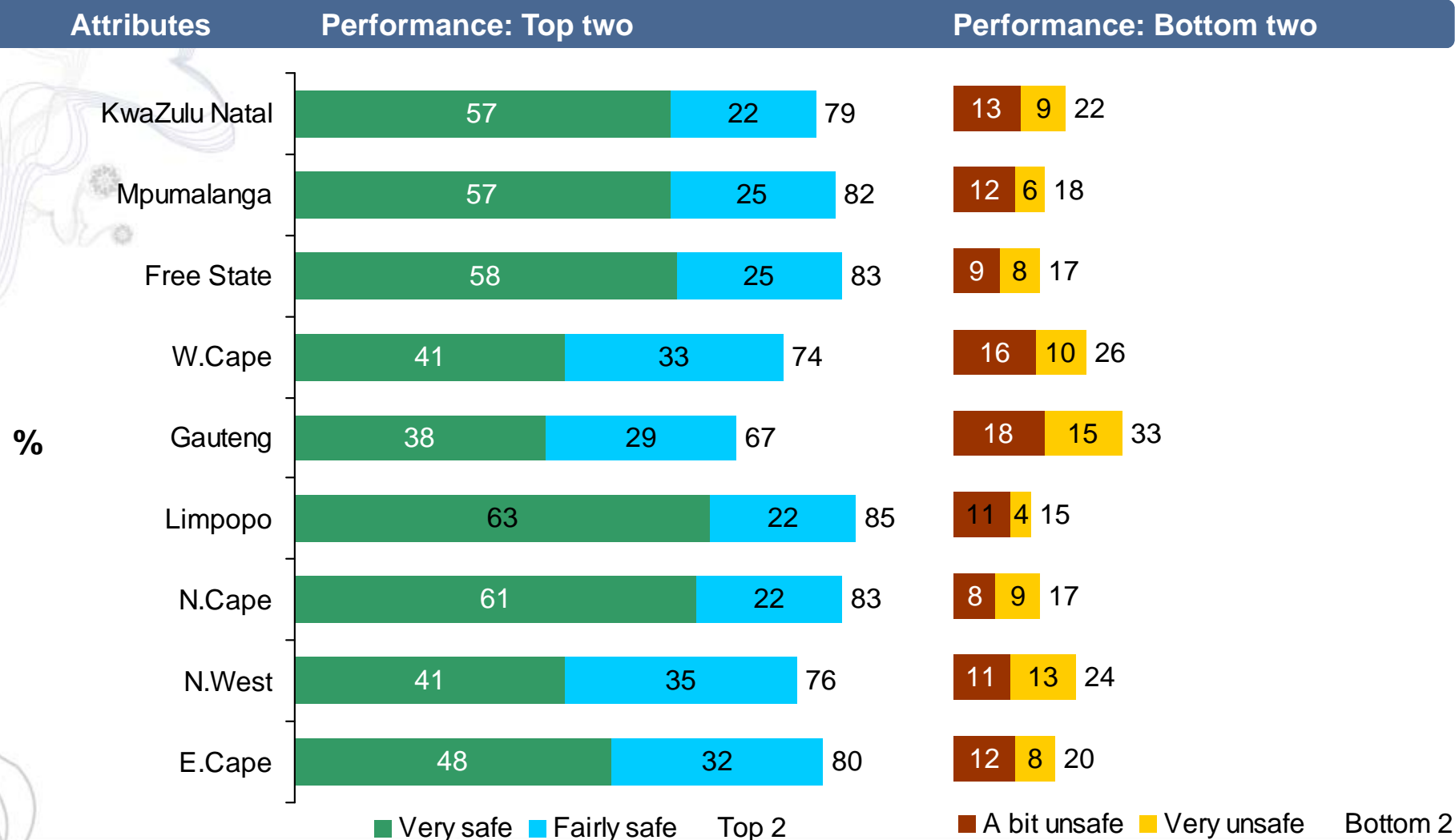

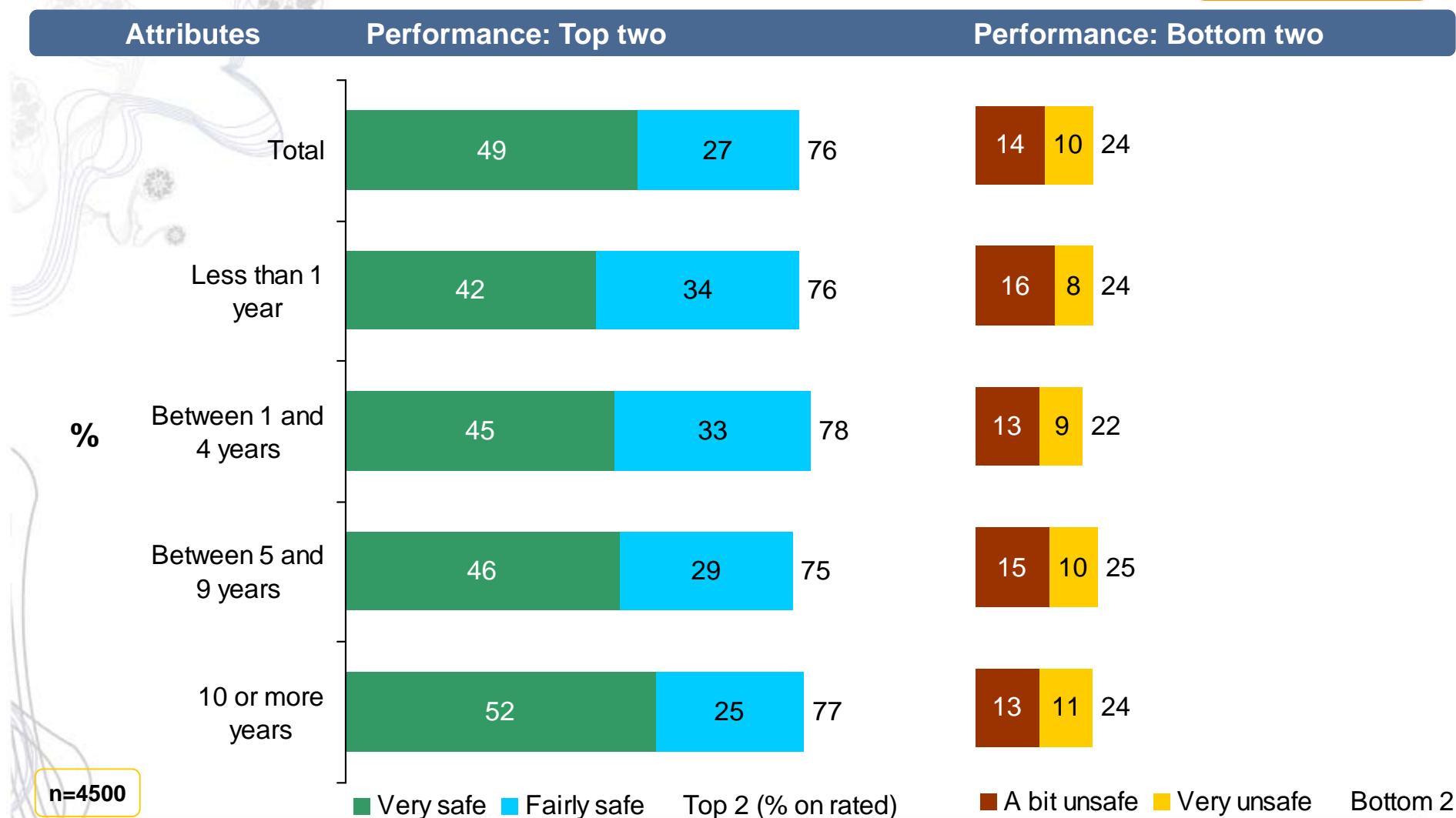

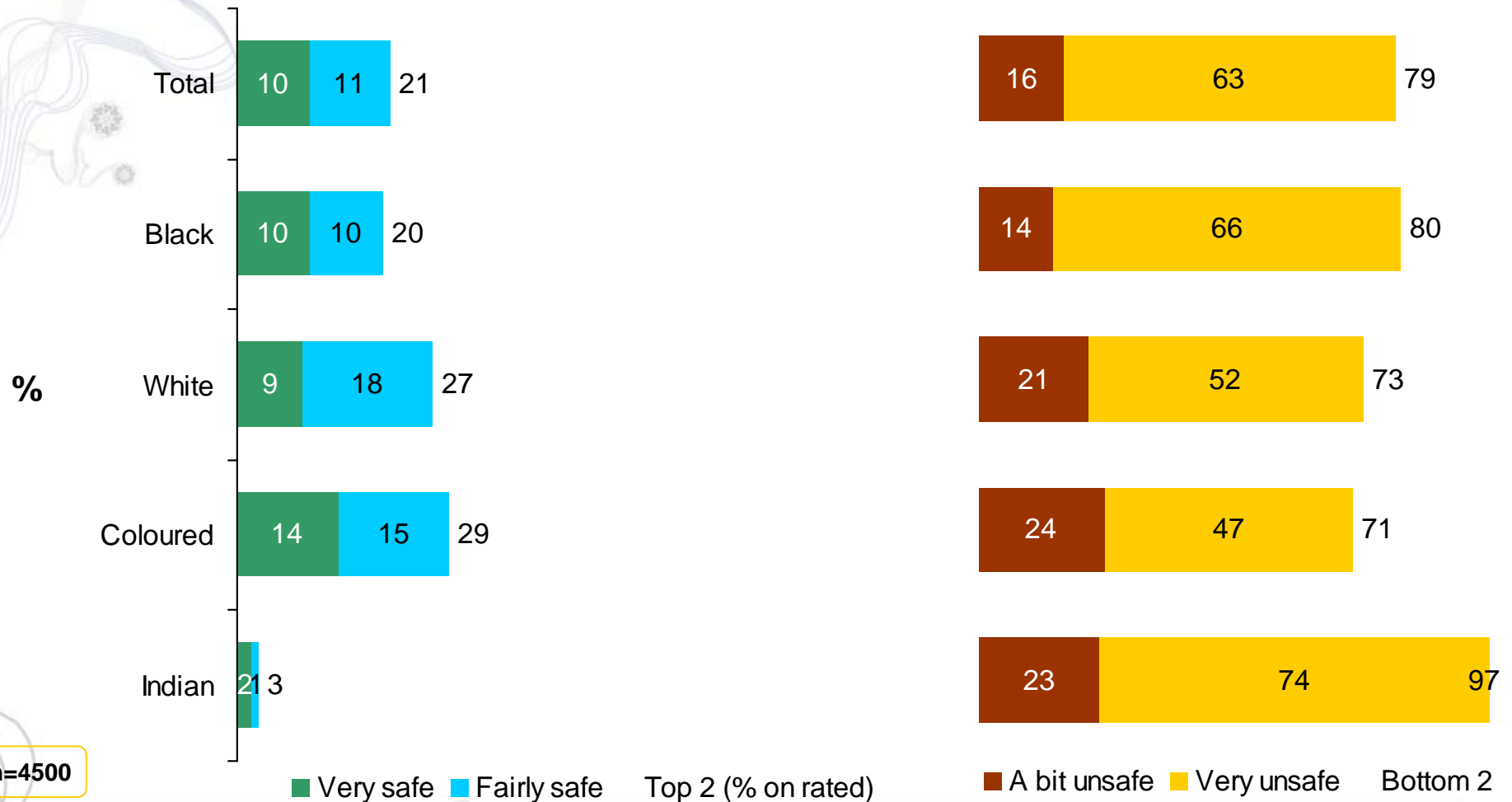

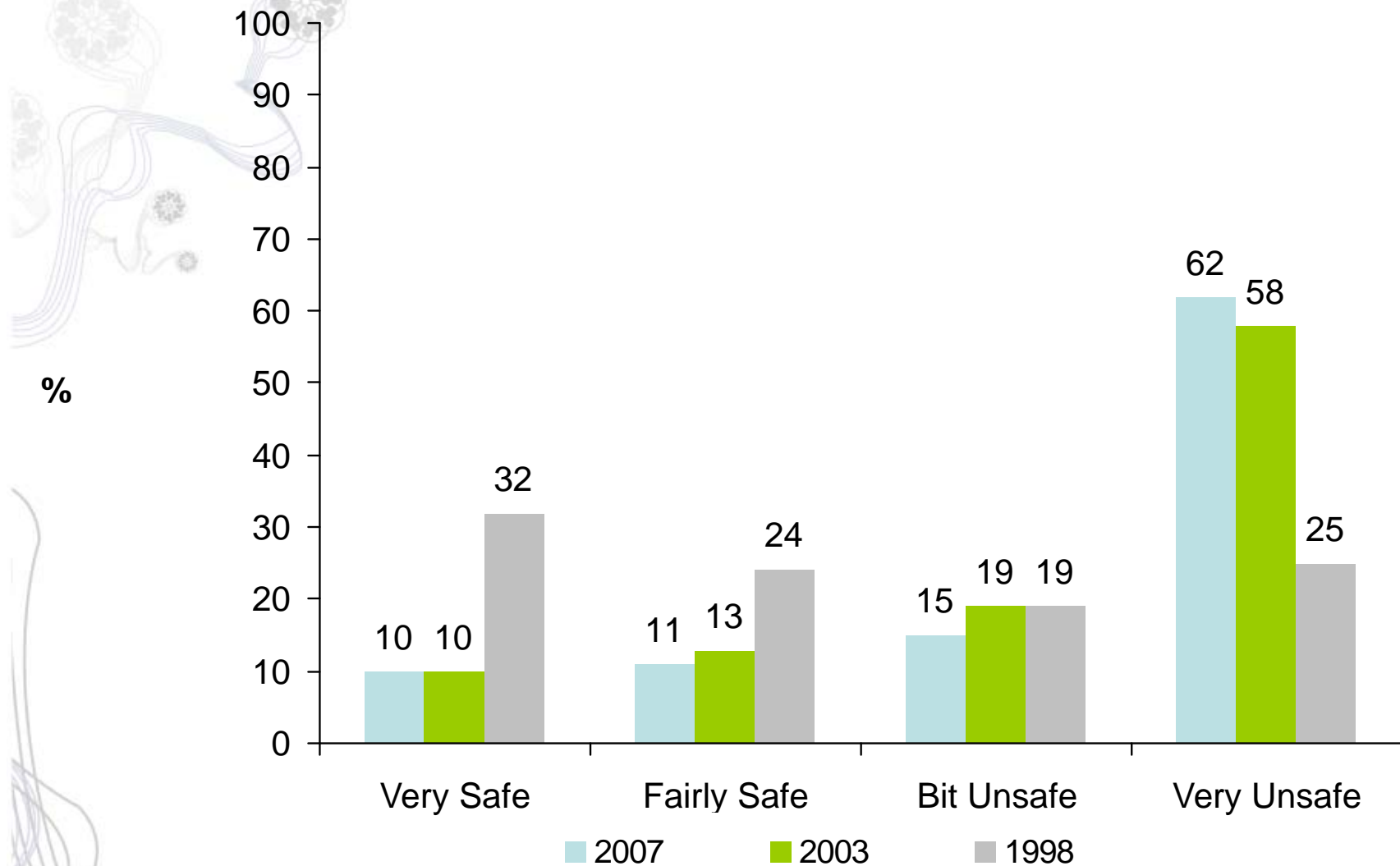

How safe do you feel walking alone in your area after dark?

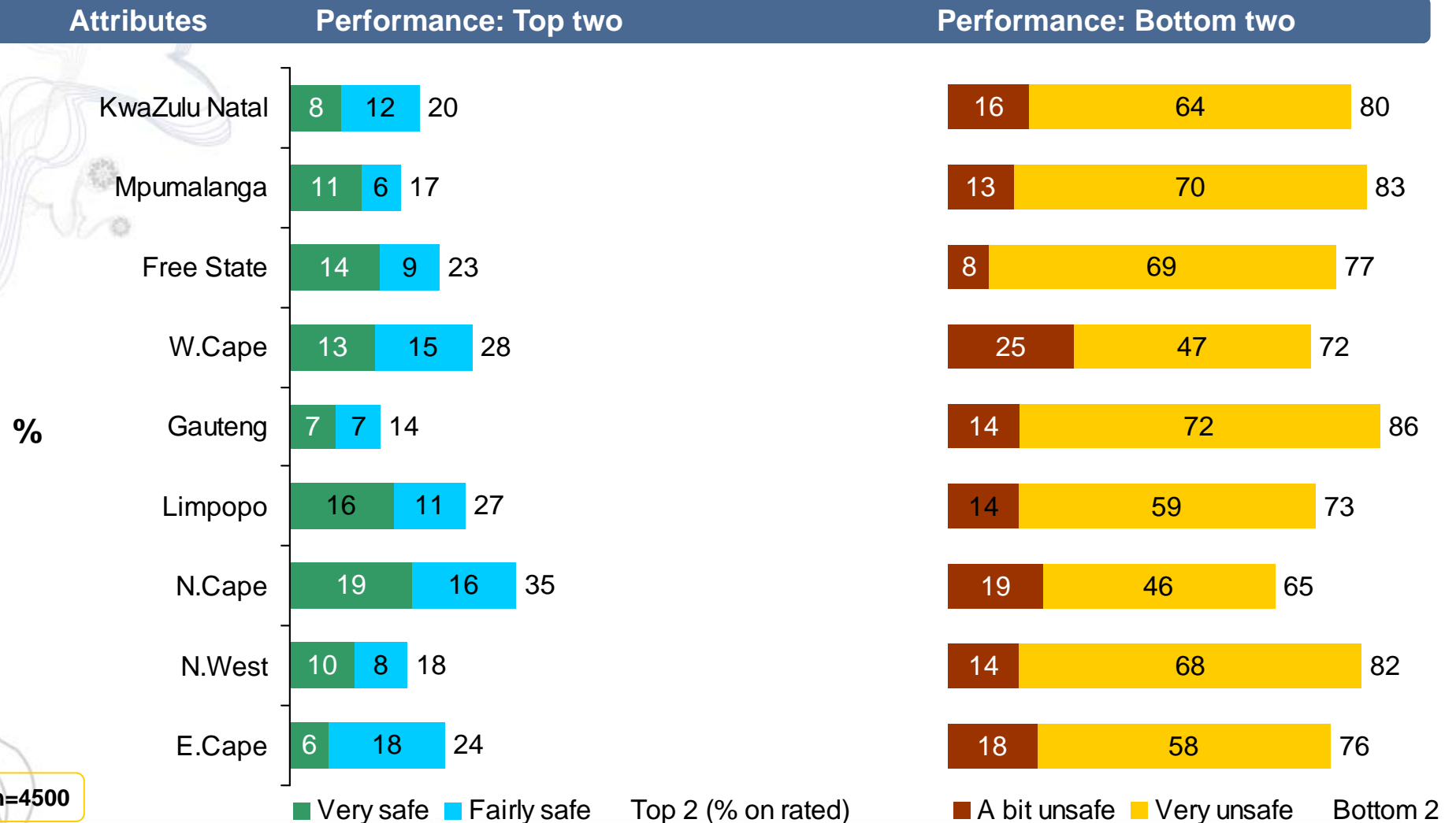


The number of South Africans who feel very unsafe when walking alone in their area after dark has steadily increased on both the 1998 and 2003 results.

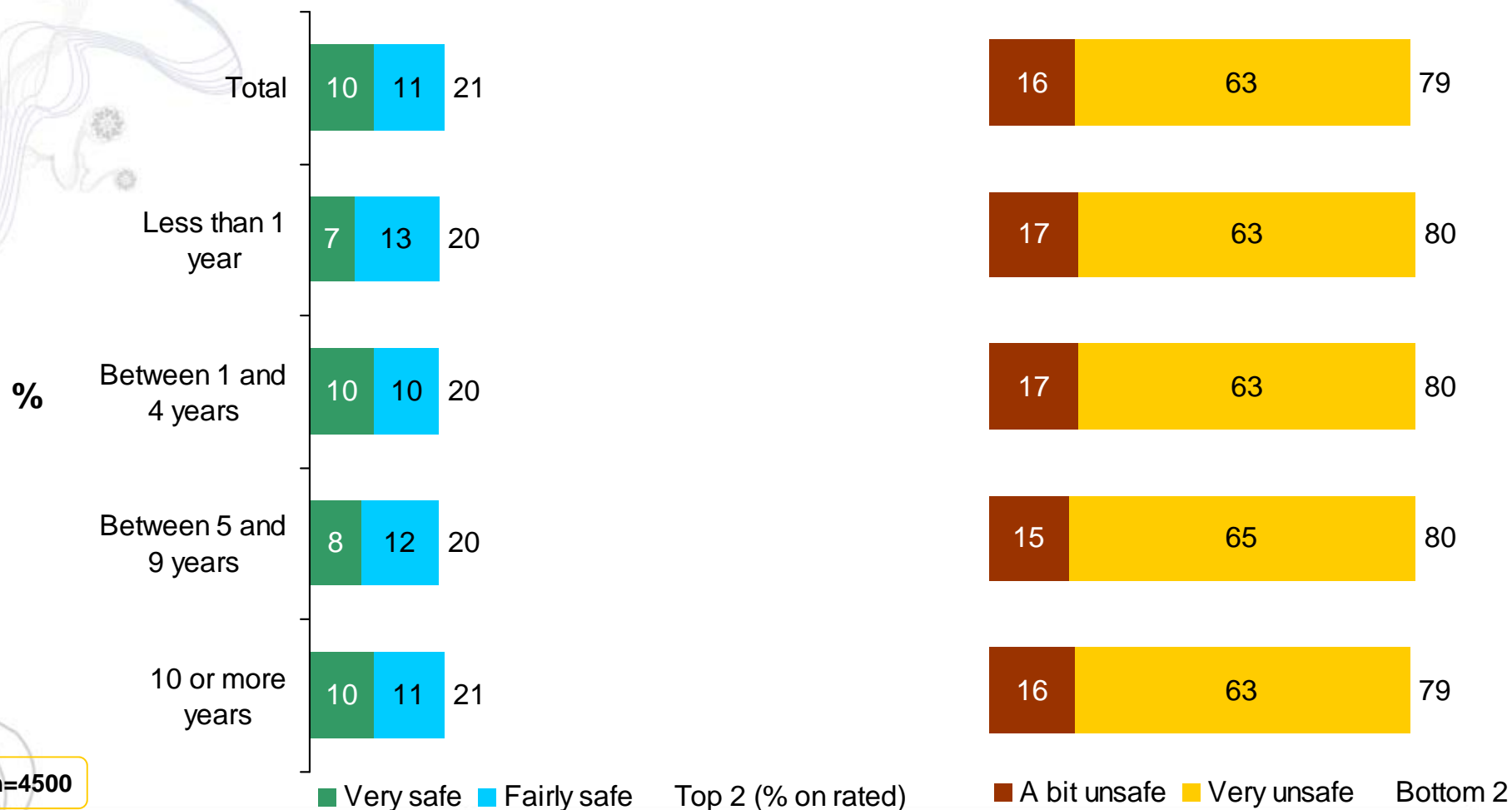
How safe do you feel walking alone in your area after dark?

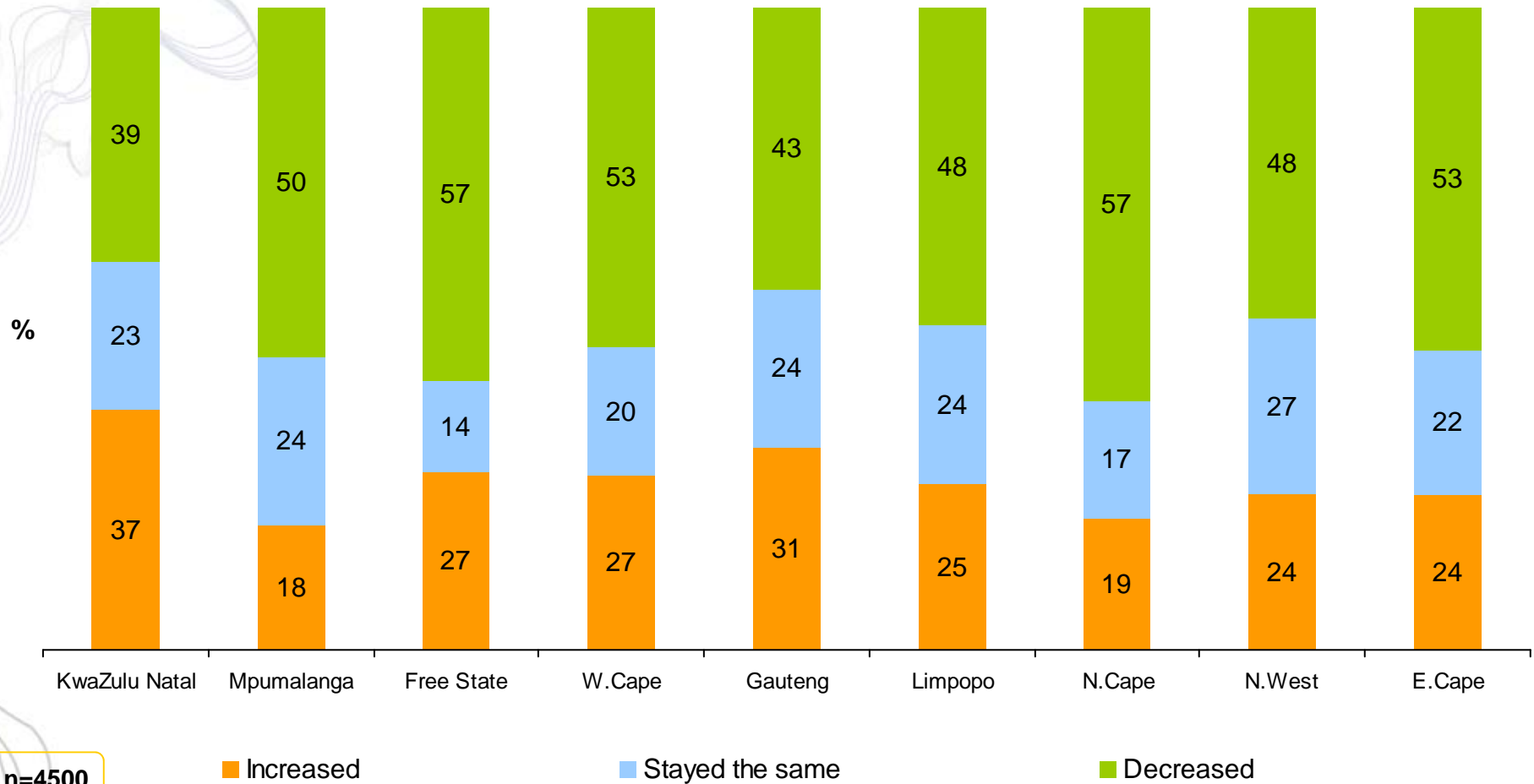

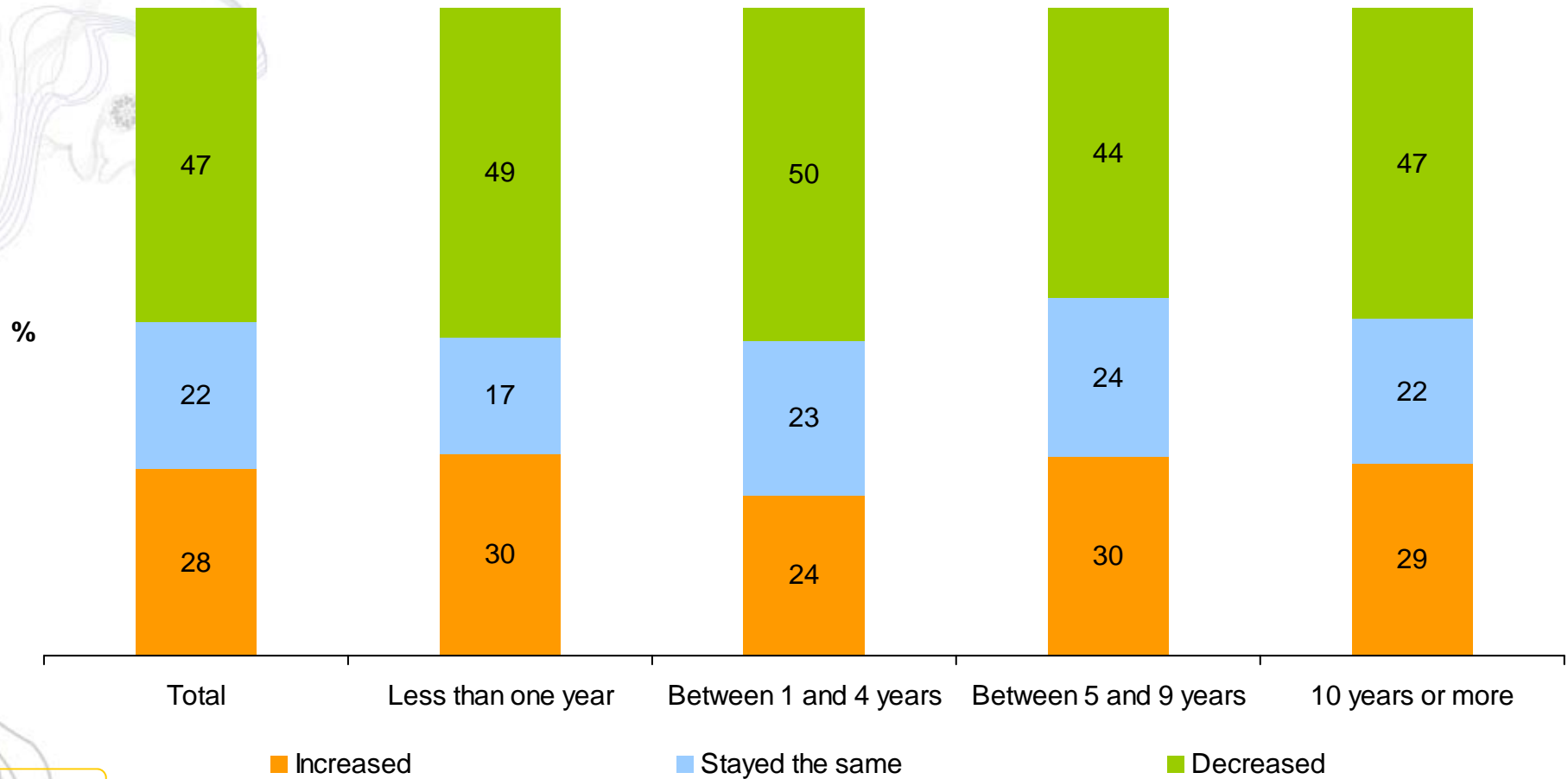
How do you think your personal safety has changed in the last 12 months

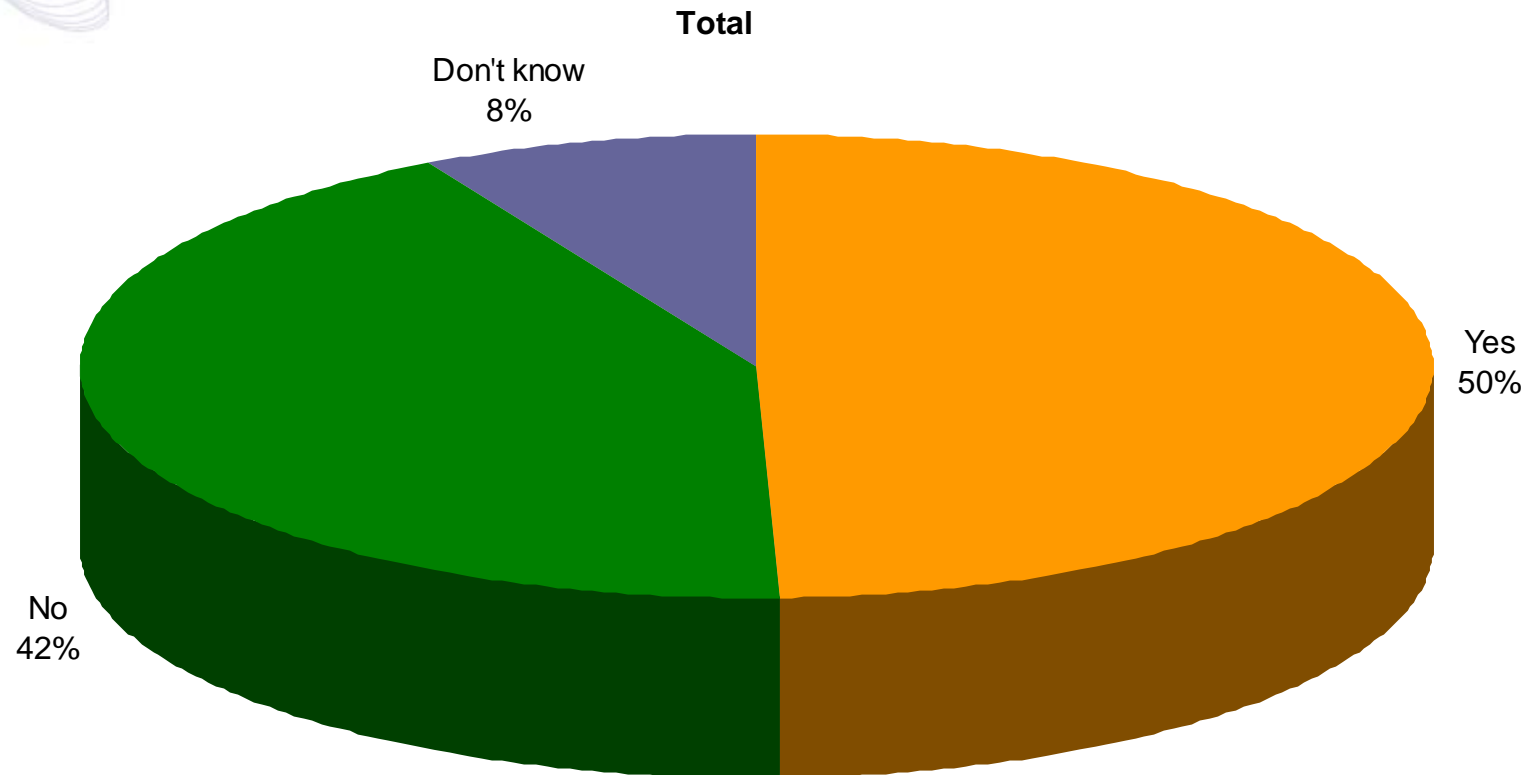

If you could tell the government what to spend money on which one of the following would you select in order to make your area safer in terms of property crimes?

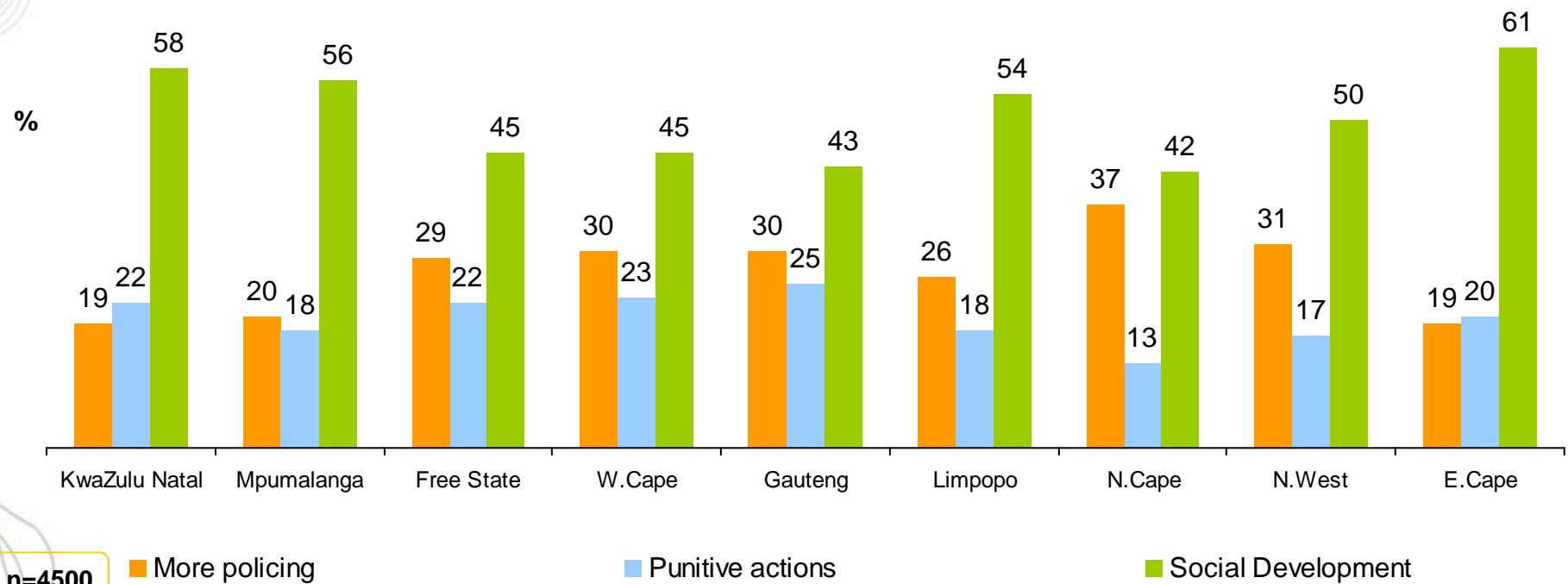

If you could tell the government what to spend money on which one of the following would you select in order to make your area safer in terms of property crimes?

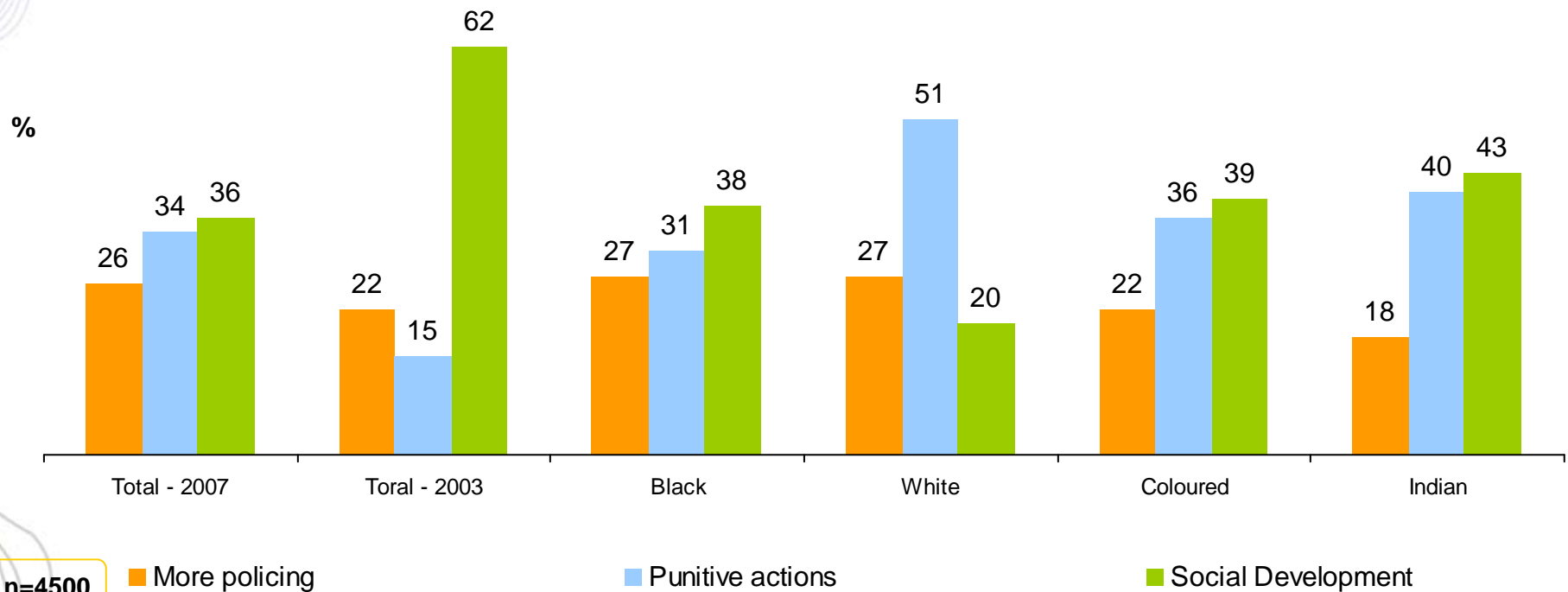

If you could tell the government what to spend money on which one of the following would you select in order to make your area safer in terms of violent crimes?

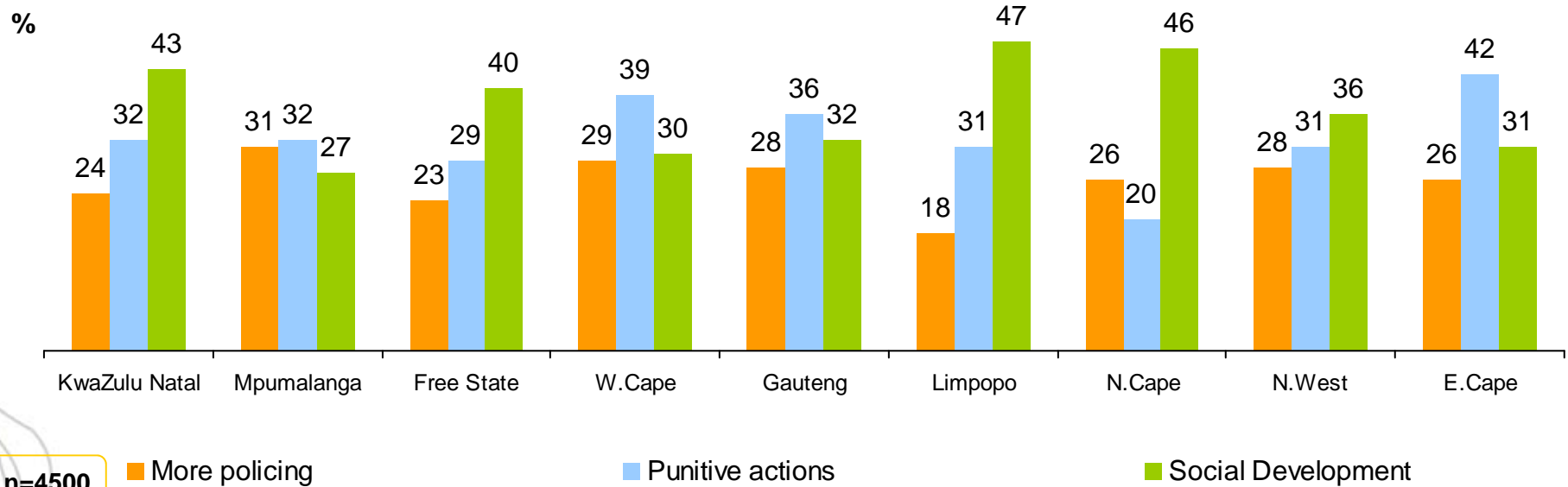

If you could tell the government what to spend money on which one of the following would you select in order to make your area safer in terms of violent crimes?

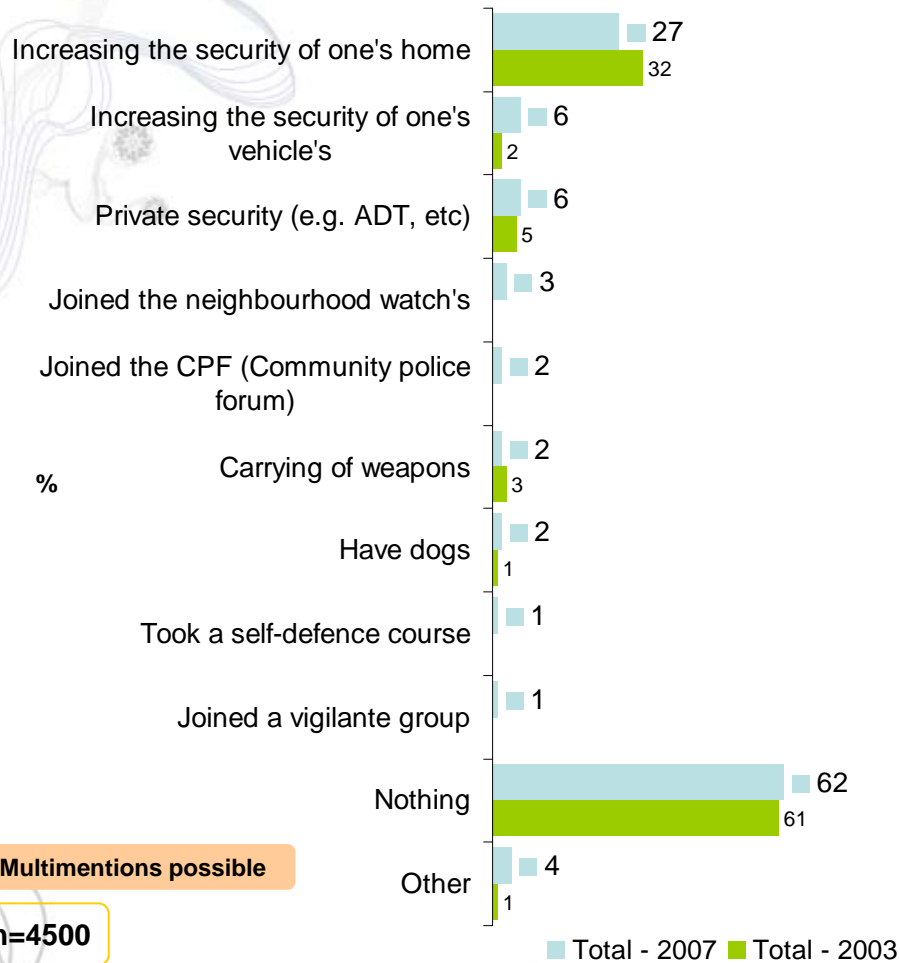

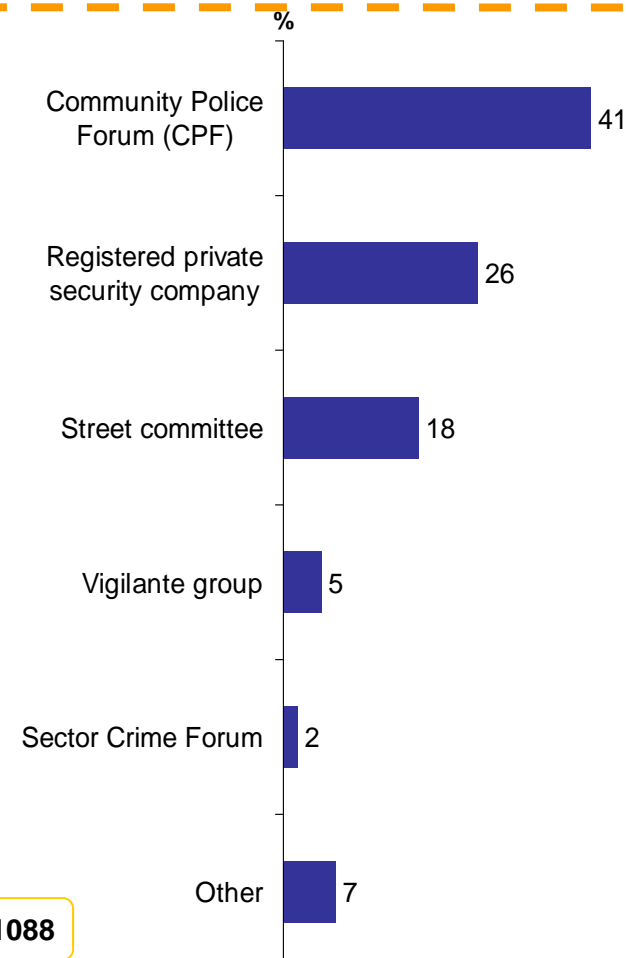

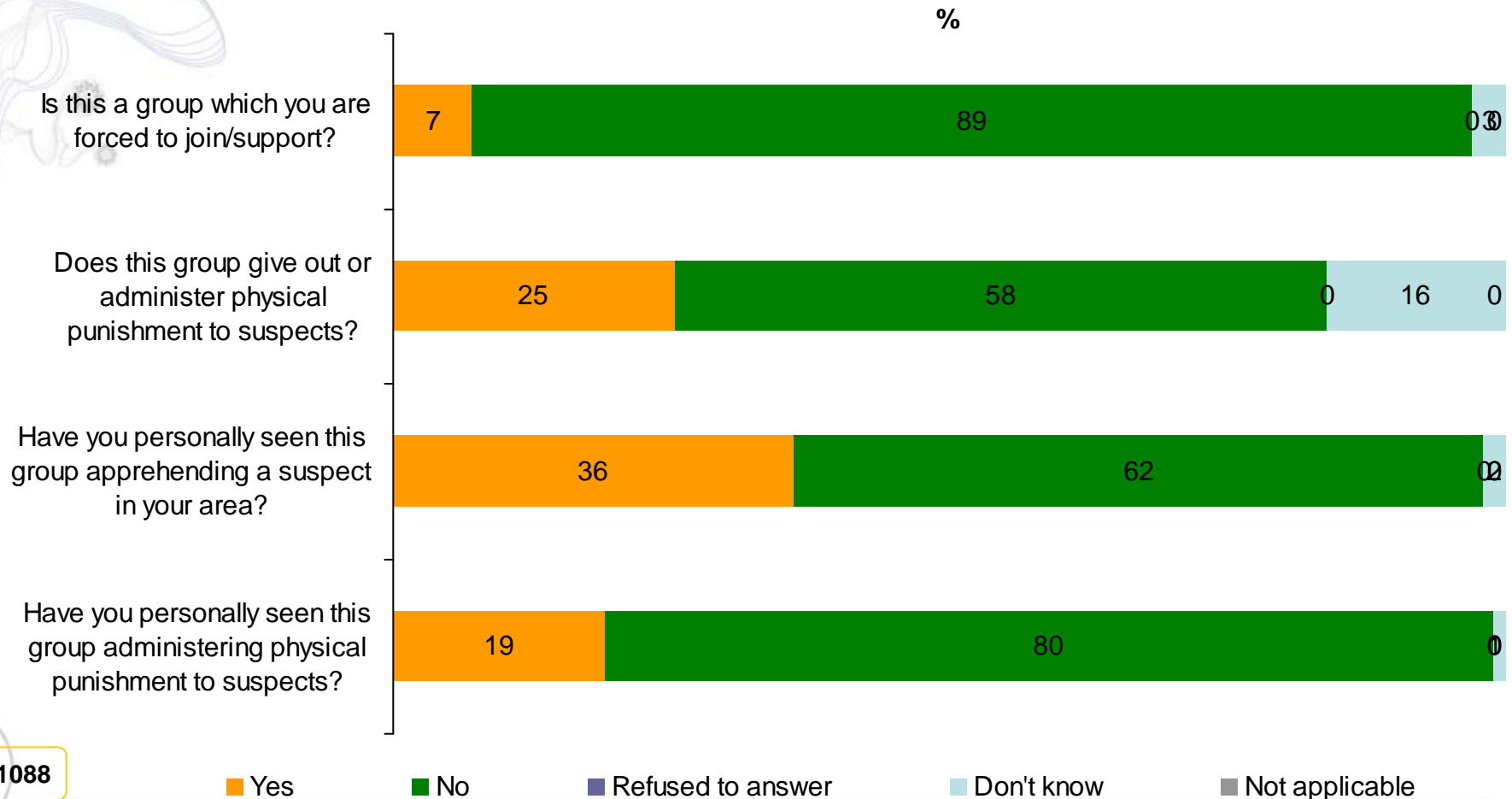

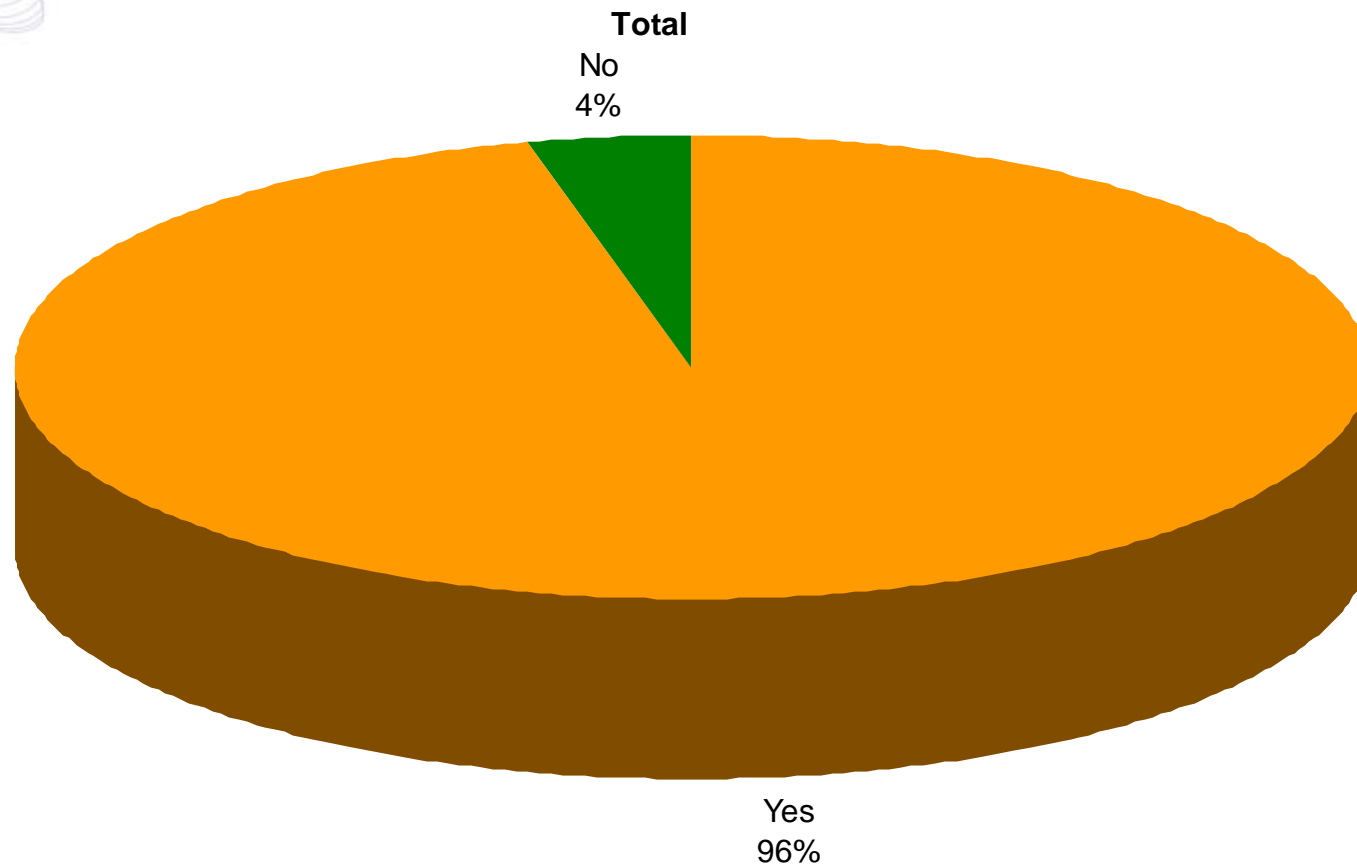

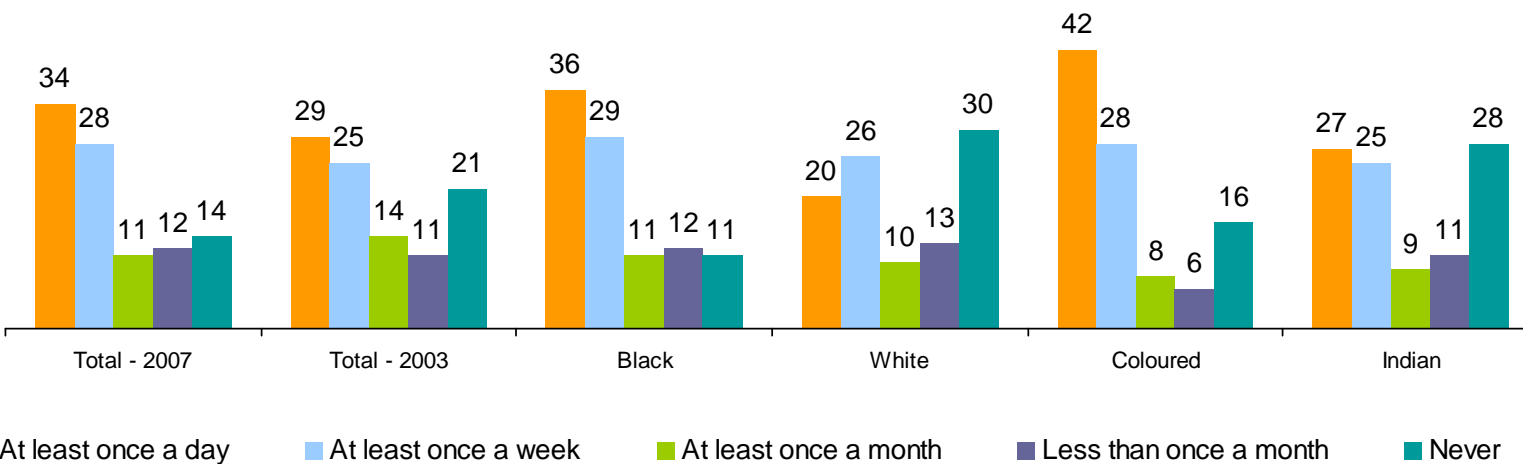

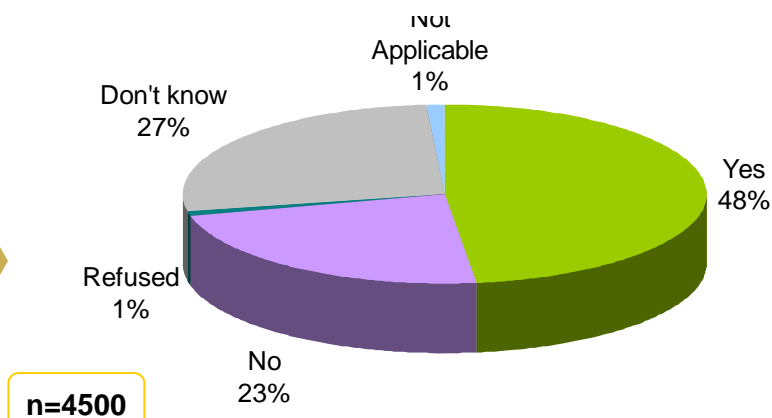


Do you know where the nearest magistrate's court is?
