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I. Objectives

This survey was designed to achieve the following objectives:

- Assist the World Bank in gaining a better understanding of how stakeholders in Mauritania perceive the Bank;
- Obtain systematic feedback from stakeholders in Mauritania regarding:
 - Their views regarding the general environment in Mauritania;
 - Their perceived overall value of the World Bank in Mauritania;
 - Overall impressions of the World Bank as related to programs, poverty reduction, personal relationships, effectiveness, knowledge base, collaboration, and its day-to-day operation; and
 - Perceptions of the World Bank's communication and outreach in Mauritania.
- Use data to help inform the Mauritania country team's strategy.

II. Methodology

In December 2011—January 2012, 215 stakeholders of the World Bank in Mauritania were invited to provide their opinions on the Bank's assistance to the country by participating in a country survey. Participants in the survey were drawn from among the office of the President or Prime Minister; the office of a Parliamentarian; employees of a ministry or ministerial department; Project Implementation Units or Project Coordination Units; representatives of independent government institutions; local government officials or staff; bilateral or multilateral agencies; private sector organizations; trade unions; NGOs (including CBOs); the media; diverse ethnic and faith-based groups; political parties; academia, research institutes or think tanks; and the judiciary. A total of 110 stakeholders participated in the country survey (51%).

Respondents received the questionnaire in three ways—in person, in the mail, or via email—and returned the completed questionnaire similarly. Respondents were asked to indicate: their overall attitudes toward the Bank; the importance of specific areas of the Bank's work and the Bank's effectiveness in those areas; and their level of agreement with a series of statements about the way the World Bank does business. Respondents were also asked about general issues facing Mauritania, the Bank's future role in Mauritania, and the Bank's communication and outreach efforts in Mauritania.

The questionnaire was broken into eight sections:

1. **Background Information:** The first section asked respondents for their current position; specialization; familiarity and involvement with the Bank; and geographic location.

2. General Issues facing Mauritania: Respondents were asked to indicate what they thought were the most important development priorities, and which areas would contribute most to poverty reduction and economic growth in Mauritania, as well as rating their perspective on the next generation in Mauritania.
3. Overall Attitudes toward the World Bank: Respondents were asked to rate the Bank's overall effectiveness in Mauritania, the extent to which the Bank meets Mauritania's needs for financial instruments and knowledge services, and their agreement with various statements regarding the Bank's programs, poverty mission, relationships, and collaborations in Mauritania. Respondents were also asked to indicate the areas which they perceived as the Bank's top priorities, the areas on which it would be most productive for the Bank to focus its resources and research, what the Bank's level of involvement should be, what they felt were the Bank's greatest values and greatest weaknesses in its work, and with which groups the Bank should work more.
4. The Work of the World Bank: Respondents were asked to rate their level of importance and the Bank's level of effectiveness across twenty-five areas in which the Bank was involved, such as helping to reduce poverty and bring about economic growth.
5. The Way the World Bank does Business: Respondents were asked to rate the Bank's level of effectiveness in the way it does business, including the Bank's knowledge, personal relationships, partnerships, and poverty mission.
6. Project/Program Related Issues: Respondents were asked to rate their level of agreement with a series of statements regarding the Bank's programs, day-to-day operations, and collaborations in Mauritania.
7. The Future of the World Bank in Mauritania: Respondents were asked to rate how significant a role the Bank should play in Mauritania's development and to indicate what the Bank could do to make itself of greater value and to what reasons respondents attributed failed or slow reform efforts.
8. Communication and Outreach: Respondents were asked to indicate where they get information about development issues and the Bank's development activities in Mauritania, as well as how they prefer to receive information from the Bank. Respondents were also asked to indicate their awareness of the Bank's Access to Information policy, their past experience requesting information, their access to the Internet, and their usage of the Bank's website.

II. Methodology (continued)

Important notes on how data are reported throughout the report

It is common for the Country Survey reports to compare data over time. In the case of Mauritania, surveys were conducted in FY '08 and FY '05. However, the respondent composition this year was extremely different in the following way: In this year's survey a majority of respondents was from NGOs (including CBOs) *and* these respondents had very little familiarity with the Bank. In nearly every Country Survey we see a correlation between familiarity and positive views of the Bank; in the case of Mauritania, this is true as well. With such a significant difference in the composition of the Mauritania samples from year to year, we found that the standard comparison simply did not work (or was not a fair representation of the data).

In FY '08 only 17% of respondents were from NGOs and in FY 05, just three percent. As a result it is not appropriate to compare aggregates over the years because they are relatively different universes of respondents. Hence, in the report (and the appendices) we report findings in the following ways:

- In the aggregate;
- Overall year to year;
- FY '08 compared to the non-NGO respondents (who correspond better to the other years' samples of respondents); and
- FY '12 non-NGO respondents compared to FY '12 NGO respondents.


The Country Survey report does not note stakeholder differences because the numbers of respondents from each group other than NGOs was so small. However, these are reported in the appendices. In addition, only significant differences between the groups described above are reported in the text of the report.

It is always important to note that a Country Survey is a snapshot of views of key stakeholder groups in a country. In the case of Mauritania this year, this is an especially interesting snapshot of voices that might not have been heard in the past (in an objective survey effort). The findings will be useful as one input into all of the country team's efforts to consult, listen and gather opinions from critical audiences in the country.

III. Demographics of the Sample


Current Position

- The majority of respondents were from NGOs. Because of the small number of respondents from independent government institutions, the office of the President/Prime Minister, academic/research institutions and think tanks, the judiciary, the office of a Parliamentarian, and political parties, responses from these stakeholder groups were combined and included in the “Other” category for all further analyses. Note there were no respondents from local government, trade unions, ethnic groups, or faith-based organizations.


Area of Primary Specialization


Geographic Location

- The majority of respondents indicated that they were located in Nouakchott. Because of the small number of respondents from other locations, these respondents were combined into one category, “Outside Nouakchott”, for all further analyses.



Involvement with the World Bank


- More than half of all respondents indicated that they have been involved with or a close observer of World Bank activities for more than three years.

Familiarity with the World Bank


- Across all respondents, familiarity with the Bank received a mean rating of 4.4 on a 10-point scale with 1 being not familiar at all and 10 being extremely familiar. This was slightly lower than the mean familiarity rating received in the FY '08 survey (4.8) and significantly lower than the FY 2005 survey, in which familiarity with the Bank received a mean rating of 7.1 across all respondents.
 - Respondents from bilateral/multilateral agencies and PIUs/project coordination units indicated the highest levels of familiarity with the Bank whereas respondents from NGOs had significantly lower levels of familiarity.



IV. The General Environment in Mauritania

Optimism


- When asked about perceptions of the future for the next generation in Mauritania, across all respondents, the overall mean rating was 6.2 on a 10-point scale of 1 being extremely pessimistic and 10 being extremely optimistic. This was significantly higher compared to the FY '08 survey, in which optimism for the next generation received a mean rating of 5.3 across all respondents.



IV. The General Environment in Mauritania (continued)

Development Priority

- Respondents indicated that government effectiveness/governance and access to/quality of education were the most important development priorities in Mauritania.
 - Respondents from NGOs were significantly more concerned about corruption and the capacity of civil society and private sector organizations than non-NGO respondents.
 - In the FY '08 country survey¹, respondents indicated that government effectiveness/ governance (43%) and access to/quality of education (42%) were the most important development priorities.



IV. The General Environment in Mauritania (continued)

Poverty Reduction

- Respondents indicated that access to/quality of education and government effectiveness/governance would contribute most to poverty reduction in Mauritania.
 - In the FY '08 country survey², agriculture development (49%), education (30%), and improving governance (29%) were considered the top contributors to poverty reduction in Mauritania.



IV. The General Environment in Mauritania (continued)

Economic Growth

- Respondents identified a range of most important contributors to economic growth.
 - In the FY '08 country survey³, increasing agricultural productivity (62%), improving governance (43%), and improving access to/quality of education (34%) were identified as the top contributors to generating faster economic growth in Mauritania.



V. Perceived Overall Value of the World Bank

Perceived Bank Priorities

- Respondents identified as the Bank's top priorities in Mauritania access to/quality of education, micro-economic growth, and agriculture development (crop production).
 - In the FY '08 country survey⁴, government effectiveness/governance (33%), access to/quality of health services (27%), and access to/quality of education (26%) were considered the Bank's top priorities.



V. Perceived Overall Value of the World Bank (continued)

Focusing Bank Resources

- Since 2008, the views on where the Bank should focus its resources have changed. In the FY '08 country survey⁵, respondents indicated that the Bank should focus primarily on agriculture development (29%), access to/quality of health services (29%), and basic infrastructure (23%).



V. Perceived Overall Value of the World Bank (continued)

Focusing Bank Research

- In the FY '08 country survey⁶, respondents similarly indicated education (42%) as the most valuable area for the Bank to focus its research efforts on.
 - In this year's survey, respondents from NGOs rated social protection, poverty and rural development significantly higher than non-NGO respondents.




Level of Bank Involvement

- More than three-quarters of all respondents indicated that the Bank should be more involved in Mauritania's development strategies.
 - Similarly, in the FY '08 and FY '05 country surveys, the majority of respondents (60% and 71%, respectively), indicated that the Bank should be more involved in Mauritania's development strategies.



Level of Bank Involvement in Regions outside Nouakchott


- The majority of all respondents indicated that the Bank should focus more attention and resources that it has available on the regions outside of Nouakchott.

Collaborating in Mauritania


- Nearly two-thirds of all respondents indicated that the World Bank should work more closely with NGOs to ensure better development results in Mauritania.
- There were three instances in which there were significant differences between NGOs and non-NGO stakeholder groups.
 - The majority of respondents from NGOs (96%) indicated that the World Bank should work more closely with NGOs, whereas non-NGO respondents indicated, that the Bank should work more closely with beneficiaries and private sector to ensure better development results in Mauritania.



V. Perceived Overall Value of the World Bank (continued)

Greatest Value


- More than a third of all respondents indicated that the Bank’s greatest value to Mauritania was its lending when others won’t. The Bank’s knowledge and financial resources were also considered of great value.
 - In the FY ’08 country survey, the Bank’s financial resources (38%), policy and economic advice (34%), and knowledge (29%) were considered the top values brought by the Bank to Mauritania.



V. Perceived Overall Value of the World Bank (continued)

Greatest Weakness

- Respondents indicated that the Bank's greatest weakness in its work in Mauritania was imposing technocratic solutions without regard to political realities.
 - This view has not changed over the eight-year period: in both the FY '08 and FY '05 country surveys⁷, respondents indicated the same area as the Bank's greatest weakness (56% and 36%, respectively).



Importance


- Respondents indicated that it was most important for the Bank to help reduce poverty in Mauritania, receiving a mean rating of 7.7 on a 10-point scale with 1 being not at all and 10 being very important.

Importance (continued)


- Overall, respondents in this year's survey had lower importance ratings compared to respondents from the FY '08 and FY '05 country surveys. Significant differences were found for all areas except "Helping to strengthen the public financial management and procurement system", "Fighting against corruption", "Helping to improve the investment climate for attracting private sector growth and foreign investment", and "Helping Mauritania adapt to/avert risk of climate change".



VI. Overall Impressions of the World Bank

The Bank's Overall Effectiveness


- Across all respondents, the Bank's overall effectiveness in Mauritania received a mean rating of 4.7 on a 10-point scale, with 1 being not effective at all and 10 being very effective. This is lower (driven significantly by NGOs) than the ratings in FY '08 (5.3) and FY '05 (6.8).

Meeting Mauritania's Needs for Bank's Financial Resources


- Across all respondents, the extent to which the Bank's financial instruments meet Mauritania's needs received a mean rating of 4.7 on a 10-point scale, with 1 being to no degree at all and 10 being to a very significant degree.

Meeting Mauritania's Knowledge Needs


- Across all respondents, the extent to which the Bank meets Mauritania's needs for knowledge services received a mean rating of 4.7 on a 10-point scale, with 1 being to no degree at all and 10 being to a very significant degree.



VI. Overall Impressions of the World Bank (continued)

Specific Areas of Effectiveness

- Respondents saw the Bank as most effective in helping to increase access and quality of health services, including the fight against HIV/AIDS and other communicable diseases, receiving a mean rating of 5.9, across all respondents, on a 10-point scale with 1 being not effective at all and 10 being very effective.



VI. Overall Impressions of the World Bank (continued)

Specific Areas of Effectiveness (continued)


- While all effectiveness ratings are not terribly high across these twenty-five areas, there were five instances in which there were significant differences between NGOs and non-NGO stakeholders in their ratings. Non-NGO respondents had significantly higher ratings of the Bank's effectiveness than respondents from NGOs for the following areas:
 - "Helping to bring about economic growth";
 - "Helping to improve the investment climate for attracting private sector growth and foreign investment";
 - "Helping to strengthen the public financial management and procurement system";
 - "Helping reduce internal conflicts"; and
 - "Helping to strengthen mining and oil resources management".

- There was only one instance in which there was a significant difference between ratings of FY '12 non-NGO respondents and FY '08 respondents (including all stakeholder groups).
 - FY '08 respondents had significantly higher ratings of the Bank's effectiveness in "Helping to improve the legal and regulatory systems" than FY '12 non-NGO respondents.

Specific Areas of Effectiveness (continued)

- Overall, effectiveness ratings in this year's survey were lower than in the FY '08 and FY '05 country surveys, significantly so for "Helping to improve the investment climate for attracting private sector growth and foreign investment", "Helping to strengthen the public financial management and procurement system", "Helping to improve the legal and regulatory systems", "Helping to strengthen the fisheries sector", "Helping to expand internet connectivity", and "Helping Mauritania adapt to/avert risk of climate change".



VI. Overall Impressions of the World Bank (continued)

Drivers of Effectiveness

To determine the key drivers of respondents' ratings of the Bank's overall effectiveness in Mauritania, bivariate correlational analyses were conducted on respondents' ratings of the Bank's overall effectiveness in Mauritania with respondents' ratings of the twenty-five specific areas of effectiveness.

Correlational analyses, however, are not able to tell us exactly what is causing respondents' ratings of the Bank's overall effectiveness. Rather, these analyses tell us that as ratings of effectiveness in one area increase, respondents' ratings of the Bank's overall effectiveness increase. Thus, it can be inferred that respondents' perceptions of effectiveness in one specific area are related to, or drive, respondents' perceptions of the Bank's overall effectiveness.


- Those specific areas with the highest Pearson Product-Moment correlations were determined to be the most closely related to perceptions of the Bank's overall effectiveness, suggesting that ratings of effectiveness in those specific areas are drivers of perceptions of the Bank's overall effectiveness. The areas determined to be key drivers from these analyses were:
 - The Bank's effectiveness at helping reduce internal conflicts;
 - The Bank's effectiveness at helping to improve the legal and regulatory systems;
 - The Bank's effectiveness at helping to improve port infrastructure; and
 - The Bank's effectiveness at helping to bring about economic growth.

VI. Overall Impressions of the World Bank (continued)

Importance versus Effectiveness – Sector Analysis

By plotting respondents' ratings of importance versus effectiveness, one can assess where respondents perceived the Bank to be performing well on priority issues in Mauritania, as well as areas in which respondents perceived the Bank to not be performing so well on priority issues, areas in which respondents perceived the Bank was performing well, but on lower priority issues, and areas in which respondents perceived the Bank to not be performing so well on lower priority issues.

- **Bank relatively good and issue is a priority:** Areas in this quadrant are those that respondents indicated a high level of importance and gave the Bank a *relatively* high rating of effectiveness (although it should be noted that ratings of effectiveness were more than a point lower than ratings of importance). It is important that the Bank continue to do well in these areas (in order of mean importance):
 - Helping to reduce poverty;
 - Helping to increase access and quality of education;
 - Helping to increase access and quality of health services, including the fight against HIV/AIDS and other communicable diseases;
 - Helping to bring about economic growth;
 - Helping to strengthen the public financial management and procurement system;
 - Helping to strengthen the agricultural sector/food security;
 - Helping to increase access to clean water;
 - Helping to improve the investment climate for attracting private sector growth and foreign investment;
 - Helping to strengthen mining and oil resources management; and
 - Helping to improve port infrastructure (although this is on the borderline of being less of a priority).



VI. Overall Impressions of the World Bank (continued)

Importance versus Effectiveness – Sector Analysis (continued)

- **Bank not so good on priority issues:** Areas in this quadrant were those for which respondents indicated a high level of importance, but gave the Bank a relatively low rating of effectiveness. These areas were (in order of mean importance):
 - Fighting against corruption;
 - Helping to increase professional skills, employment and income generation, specifically for young people; and
 - Helping to strengthen environment and natural resources management.
- **Bank not so good, but issue not perceived to be a priority:** Areas in this quadrant were those for which respondents gave the Bank a relatively low rating of effectiveness and a moderate level of importance. These areas were (in order of mean importance):
 - Helping to strengthen the government's effectiveness;
 - Helping to improve the quality of life in urban areas;
 - Helping to strengthen the fisheries sector;
 - Helping to improve the legal and regulatory systems;
 - Helping to expand internet connectivity;
 - Helping to lay the foundation to integrate Mauritania into the global and/or sub-regional economy;
 - Helping to empower communities to participate in their own development;
 - Helping Mauritania adapt to/avert risk of climate change;
 - Helping to increase access to proper housing; and
 - Helping reduce internal conflicts.
- **Bank good, but issue not perceived to be a priority:** Areas in this quadrant were those for which respondents indicated a moderate level of importance, but gave the Bank a relatively high rating of effectiveness. There were two areas in this quadrant:
 - Helping to strengthen the capacity of civil society and private sector organizations; and
 - Ensuring that attention is paid to gender disparities.

VI. Overall Impressions of the World Bank (continued)

Respondents were asked a variety of questions regarding the Bank's programs, poverty mission, personal relationships, collaborations/partnerships, knowledge, and day-to-day operations.

- Aggregated respondents from this year's country survey had significantly lower ratings compared to respondents from the FY '05 and FY '08 country surveys across all areas that could be compared. These areas were:
 - Overall the Bank currently plays a relevant role in development in Mauritania;
 - The Bank's work is aligned with what I consider the development priorities for this country;
 - The Bank's work reflects its own mission of poverty reduction;
 - The World Bank recommends programs and strategies that are realistic for Mauritania;
 - The World Bank treats clients and stakeholders in Mauritania with respect;
 - The World Bank collaborates well with other donors here;
 - Overall, I like to work/interact with Bank staff;
 - The Bank is an effective catalyst for discussion on issues related to poverty;
 - In general, the strategies that the Bank supports are sustainable over time;
 - The World Bank's work promotes country ownership of development strategies;
 - The Bank's work promotes the empowerment of poor people to participate in development;
 - The World Bank imposes reasonable conditions on its lending;
 - The Bank gives appropriate priority to growth issues;
 - Technical competence;
 - Producing "knowledge" (studies, analyses) that is useful;
 - Making the results of studies and analyses readily available;
 - Sharing knowledge about international best practices;
 - Ability to adapt its knowledge to your country's needs;
 - Ensuring its staff is accessible;
 - Providing sound policy and economic advice;
 - Straightforwardness in its dealings with you;
 - Maintaining consistent messages;
 - Promoting the inclusion of local communities in the development of strategies;
 - Promoting the inclusion of civil society in the development of strategies;
 - Promoting the inclusion of local project experts in the development of strategies;
 - Promoting the inclusion of private sector in the development of strategies;
 - Giving appropriate priority to poverty reduction;
 - Lending in a way that promotes effective development;
 - The Bank is flexible in terms of adjusting to changing circumstances;
 - The Bank disburses funds promptly;
 - The Bank works efficiently;
 - The Bank effectively monitors and evaluates the projects and programs it supports;


VI. Overall Impressions of the World Bank (continued)

- The Bank helps to build capacity at the community level;
 - The Bank helps to build capacity of government officials;
 - The Bank and partners in government collaborate well together on Bank supported programs and projects in Mauritania;
 - The Bank helps to strengthen institutional capacity;
 - The Government supports and takes responsibility for development efforts in Mauritania; and
 - The Bank's procurement requirements are reasonable.

Programs/Projects in Regions outside Nouakchott


- Across all respondents, the extent to which the Bank's programs and projects in the regions outside of Nouakchott have been effectively received a mean rating of 4.1 on a 10-point scale, with 1 being not effective at all and 10 being extremely effective.

PRSP


- Across all respondents, the extent to which the Bank's actions are effectively aligned in terms of Mauritania's Poverty Reduction Strategy Program (PRSP) received a mean rating of 4.3 on a 10-point scale, with 1 being not at all aligned and 10 being aligned to a very high degree.

Bank Programs in Mauritania


- In terms of the Bank's programs in Mauritania, Bank supported strategies being sustainable over time received the highest mean level of agreement, 4.8, across all respondents, on a 10-point scale with 1 being strongly disagree and 10 being strongly agree.
 - Significant differences between NGOs and non-NGO stakeholders were found in their levels of agreement for all seven statements. In all cases, non-NGO respondents had significantly higher mean ratings of the Bank's programs in Mauritania than respondents from NGOs.

Bank Programs in Mauritania (continued)



- The Bank's effectiveness at lending in a way that promotes effective development received a mean rating of 4.6 across all respondents on a 10-point scale with 1 being not at all effective and 10 being very effective.
 - Non-NGO respondents had significantly higher ratings of the Bank's effectiveness at lending in a way that promotes effective development than respondents from NGOs.

Poverty Mission



- In terms of the Bank’s poverty mission in Mauritania, the Bank being an effective catalyst for discussion on issues related to poverty received the highest mean level of agreement, 5.2, across all respondents, on a 10-point scale with 1 being strongly disagree and 10 being strongly agree.
 - Non-NGO respondents had significantly higher mean levels of agreement with all three statements than respondents from NGOs.
- The Bank’s effectiveness at giving appropriate priority to poverty reduction received a mean rating of 4.8 across all respondents on a 10-point scale with 1 being not at all effective and 10 being very effective.
 - Non-NGO respondents had significantly higher ratings of the Bank’s effectiveness at giving appropriate priority to poverty reduction than respondents from NGOs.

Personal Relationships


- In terms of the Bank’s personal relationships in Mauritania, respondents liking to work/interact with Bank staff received the highest mean level of agreement, 4.7, across all respondents, on a 10-point scale with 1 being strongly disagree and 10 being strongly agree.
- In terms of maintaining relationships with clients and stakeholders in Mauritania, the Bank’s effectiveness at being straightforward in its dealings received the highest mean rating, 4.6, across all respondents, on a 10-point scale with 1 being not at all effective and 10 being very effective.
 - In all these six cases, non-NGO respondents had significantly higher mean ratings than respondents from NGOs.

Collaboration/Partnerships


- In terms of the Bank’s collaborations in Mauritania, the Bank’s work promoting country ownership of development strategies received the highest mean level of agreement, 5.3, across all respondents, on a 10-point scale with 1 being strongly disagree and 10 being strongly agree.
 - Non-NGO respondents had significantly higher mean levels of agreement with all six statements than respondents from NGOs.


- The Bank's effectiveness at promoting the inclusion of local communities, local project experts, and civil society in strategy development all received a mean rating of 4.1 on a 10-point scale with 1 being not at all effective and 10 being very effective.
 - In all these four cases, non-NGO respondents had significantly higher mean ratings than respondents from NGOs.
 - There was only one instance in which there was a significant difference between ratings of FY '12 non-NGO respondents and FY '08 respondents (including all stakeholder groups). FY '08 respondents had significantly higher ratings for "Promoting the inclusion of private sector in the development of strategies" than FY '12 non-NGO respondents.

Knowledge


- In terms of the Bank’s effectiveness at being a knowledge base in Mauritania, the Bank’s ability to produce “knowledge” (studies, analysis) that is useful received the highest mean rating, 5.5, across all respondents, on a 10-point scale with 1 being not at all effective and 10 being very effective.
 - In all these six areas, non-NGO respondents had significantly higher mean ratings than respondents from NGOs.
 - There was only one instance in which there was a significant difference between ratings of FY ’12 non-NGO respondents and FY ’08 respondents (including all stakeholder groups). FY ’08 respondents had significantly higher ratings for “Making the results of studies and analyses readily available” than FY ’12 non-NGO respondents.

Day-to-Day Operations



Role Significance



Making the Bank of Greater Value



Attributing Slow or Failed Reform Efforts


- When World Bank assisted reform efforts fail or are slow to take place, respondents attributed this most to inadequate level of citizen/civil society participation and the government working inefficiently or too slowly.
 - Respondents from NGOs indicated inadequate level of citizen/civil society participation (58%) and the World Bank working inefficiently or too slowly (48%) at statistically higher level than non-NGO respondents, who indicated the government working inefficiently or too slowly (50%) and reforms being not well thought out in light of country challenges (43%) as the top causes.

Information Sources



 - Non-NGO respondents indicated the Internet and local newspapers as the top information sources; respondents from NGOs indicated the Internet (however, at the statistically lower level than non-NGO) and international television as the top information sources.
 - In the FY '08 and FY '05 country surveys, respondents indicated the Internet (44%) and international television (58%), respectively, as a top source from where they got most of their information about economic and social development issues.






Internet Access

Website Usage


- Nearly half of all respondents indicated that they had used the Bank’s website.
















