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I. Objectives

This survey was designed to achieve the following objectives:

- Assist the World Bank Group in gaining a better understanding of how stakeholders in Russia perceive the World Bank Group;
- Obtain systematic feedback from stakeholders in Russia regarding:
 - Their views regarding the general environment in Russia;
 - Their overall attitudes toward the World Bank Group in Russia;
 - Overall impressions of the World Bank Group’s effectiveness and results, knowledge work and activities, and communication and information sharing in Russia;
 - Perceptions of the World Bank Group’s future role in Russia.
- Use data to help inform Russia country team’s strategy.

II. Methodology

In February—June 2014, 393 stakeholders of the World Bank Group in Russia were invited to provide their opinions on the World Bank Group’s assistance to the country by participating in a country survey. Participants in the survey were drawn from the office of the President; the office of the Prime Minister; office of a minister; office of a parliamentarian; ministries, ministerial departments, or implementation agencies; consultants/contractors working on World Bank Group-supported projects/programs; project management units (PMUs) overseeing implementation of a project; local government officials; bilateral and multilateral agencies; private sector companies; private foundations; the financial sector/private banks; NGOs; community based organizations; the media; independent government institutions; trade unions; academia/research institutes/think tanks; the judiciary branch; and other organizations. A total of 139 stakeholders participated in the survey (35% response rate).

Some respondents received the questionnaire via email and returned it accordingly. Others received a link to an online version of the questionnaire in the Qualtrics platform. Respondents were asked about: general issues facing Russia; their overall attitudes toward the World Bank Group (WBG); the WBG’s effectiveness and results; the WBG’s knowledge work and activities; working with the WBG; the WBG’s future role in Russia; Russia’s role as a global donor for development; and the WBG’s communication and information sharing in Russia.

Every country that engages in the Country Opinion Survey must include specific indicator questions that will be aggregated for the World Bank Group’s annual Corporate Scorecard. These questions are identified throughout the survey report.

- A. General Issues Facing Russia: Respondents were asked to indicate whether Russia is headed in the right direction, what they thought were the top three most important development priorities in the country, which areas would contribute most to reducing poverty and generating economic growth in Russia, and how “shared prosperity” would be best achieved in Russia.

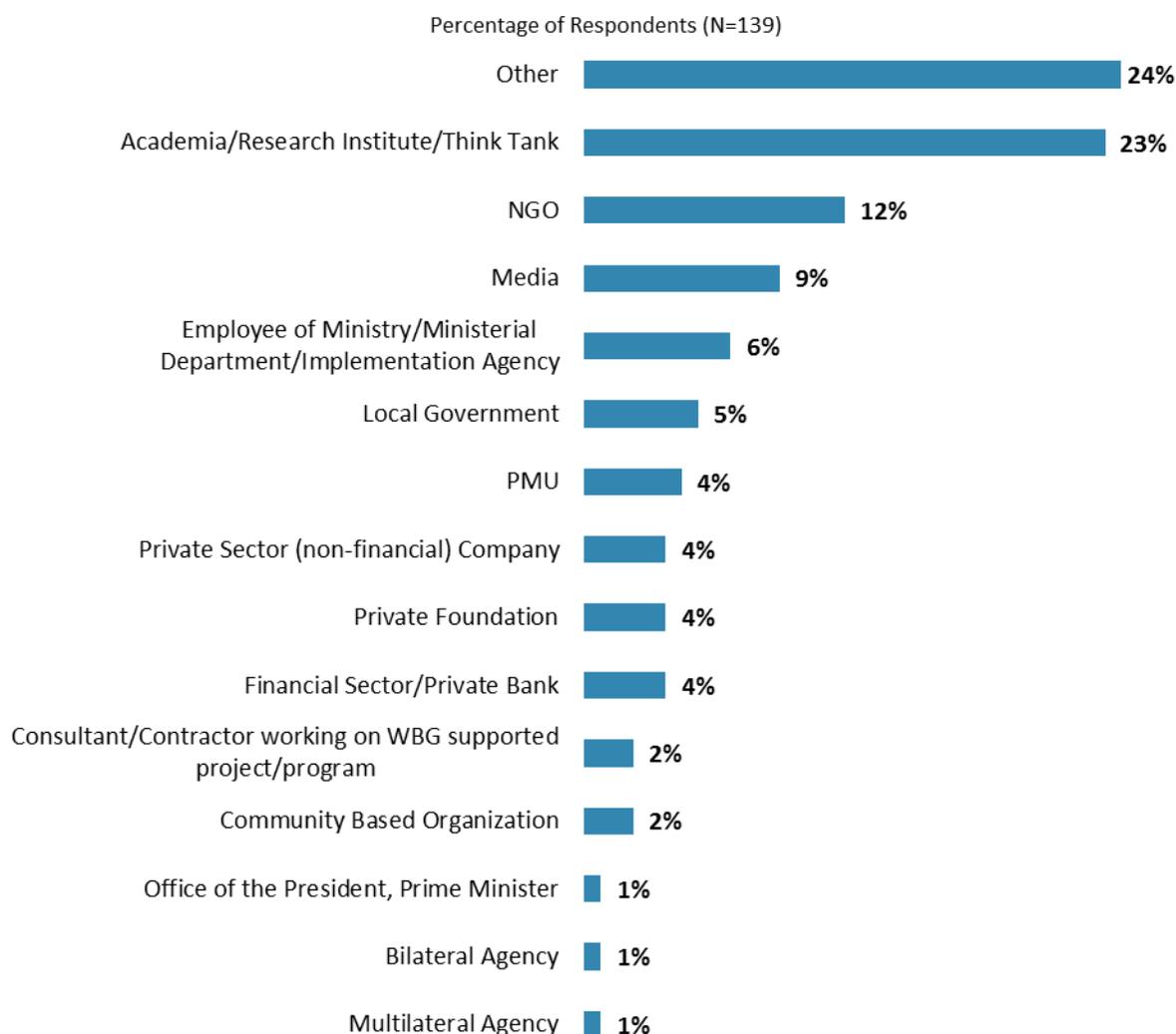
II. Methodology (continued)

- B. Overall Attitudes toward the World Bank Group (WBG): Respondents were asked to rate their familiarity with the WBG, the WBG's effectiveness in Russia, WBG staff preparedness to help Russia solve its development challenges, their agreement with various statements regarding the WBG's work, and the extent to which the WBG is an effective development partner. Respondents were asked to indicate the WBG's greatest values and weaknesses, the most effective instruments in helping reduce poverty in Russia, with which stakeholder groups the WBG should collaborate more, in which sectoral areas the WBG should focus most of its resources (financial and knowledge services), and to what reasons respondents attributed failed or slow reform efforts.
- C. World Bank Group's Effectiveness and Results: Respondents were asked to rate the extent to which the WBG's work helps achieve development results in Russia, the extent to which the WBG meets Russia's needs for knowledge services and financial instruments, and the WBG's level of effectiveness across thirty-three development areas, such as economic growth, governance, private sector development, education, and job creation.
- D. The World Bank Group's Knowledge Work and Activities: Respondents were asked to indicate how frequently they consult WBG's knowledge work and activities and to rate the effectiveness and quality of the WBG's knowledge, including how significant of a contribution it makes to development results and its technical quality.
- E. Working with the World Bank Group: Respondents were asked to rate their level of agreement with a series of statements regarding working with the WBG, such as the WBG taking decisions quickly in Russia, imposing reasonable conditions on its lending/investments, disbursing funds promptly, increasing Russia's institutional capacity, and providing effective implementation support.
- F. The Future Role of the World Bank Group in Russia: Respondents were asked to indicate what the WBG should do to make itself of greater value in Russia, and which services the WBG should offer more of in the country.
- G. Russia's Role as a Global Donor for Development: Respondents were asked about their views on Russia's role as a donor providing assistance to developing/poor countries.
- H. Communication and Information Sharing: Respondents were asked to indicate how they get information about economic and social development issues, how they prefer to receive information from the WBG, and their usage and evaluation of the WBG's websites and social media channels. Respondents were also asked about their awareness of the WBG's Access to Information policy, past information requests from the WBG, and their level of agreement that they use more data from the WBG as a result of the WBG's Open Data policy.
- I. Background Information: Respondents were asked to indicate their current position, specialization, whether they professionally collaborate with the WBG, their exposure to the WBG in Russia, which WBG agencies they work with, and their geographic location.

III. Demographics of the Sample

Current Position

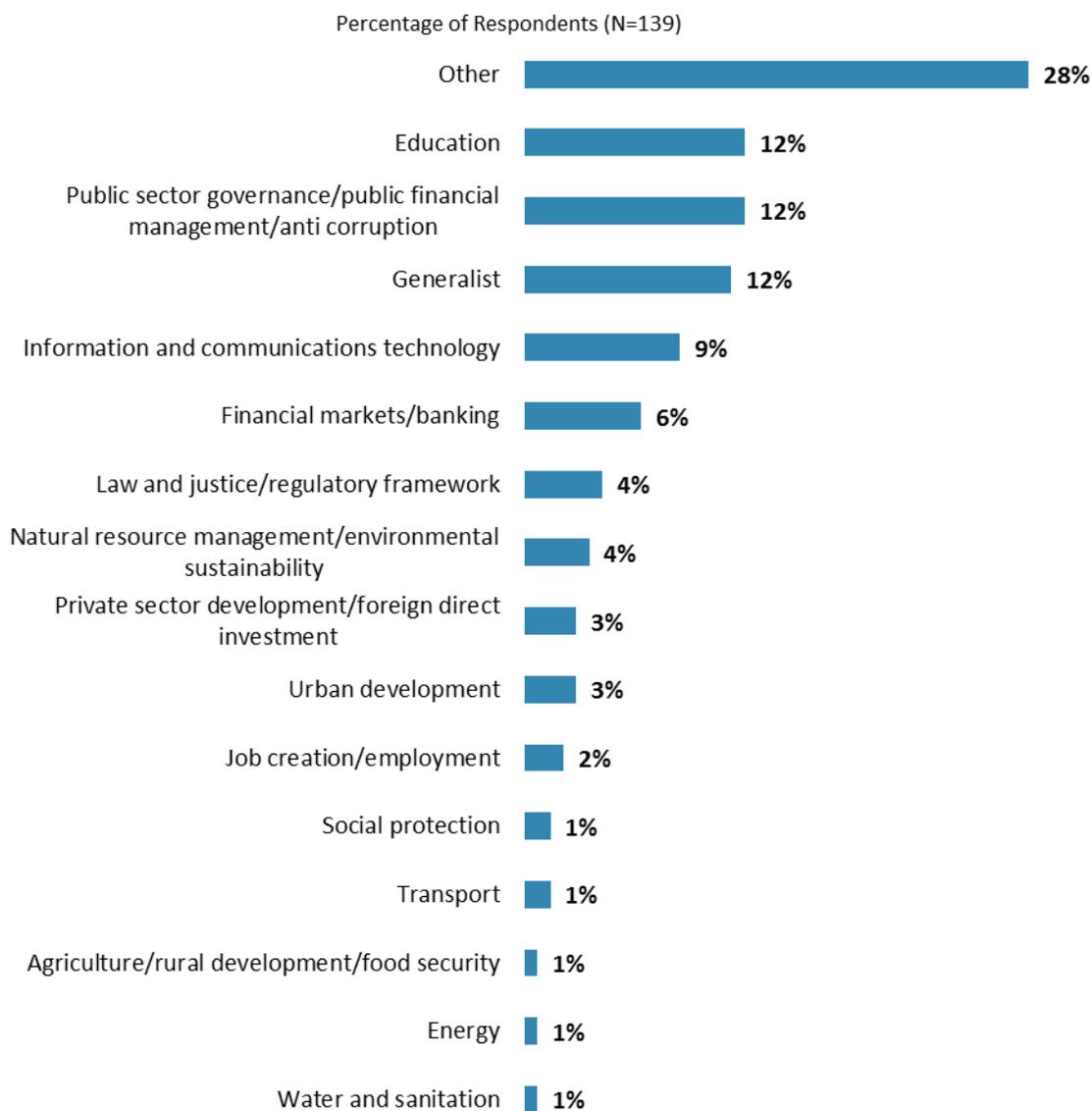
- For further analyses, a small number of respondents from PMUs and consultants/contractors working on WBG-supported projects/programs were combined with employees of ministries/ministerial departments/implementation agencies; respondents from the financial sector/private banks were combined with those from private sector companies; respondents from NGOs, community based organizations, and private foundations were combined into the “CSO” category; and the few respondents from the office of the President/Prime Minister, bilateral agencies and multilateral agencies were included in the “Other” category. There were no respondents from the office of a minister, the office of a parliamentarian, independent government institutions, trade unions, and the judiciary branch.

Area of Primary Specialization

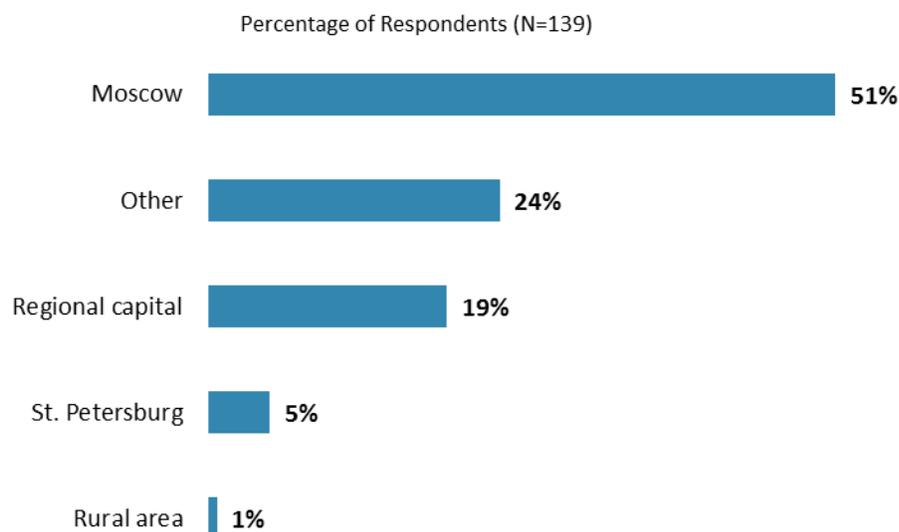


“Please identify the primary specialization of your work.” (Respondents chose from a list.)

Geographic Location

- The majority of respondents indicated that they were located in Moscow. A small number of respondents from St. Petersburg were combined with those from Moscow, and a small number of respondents from rural areas were included in the “Other” category for all further analyses.
- Responses across geographic locations for all country survey questions can be found in Appendix C (see page 99). Only significant differences between geographic locations in response to indicator questions will be discussed in the body of this report.

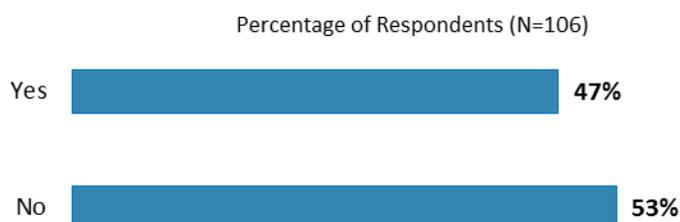


“Which best represents your geographic location?” (Respondents chose from a list.)

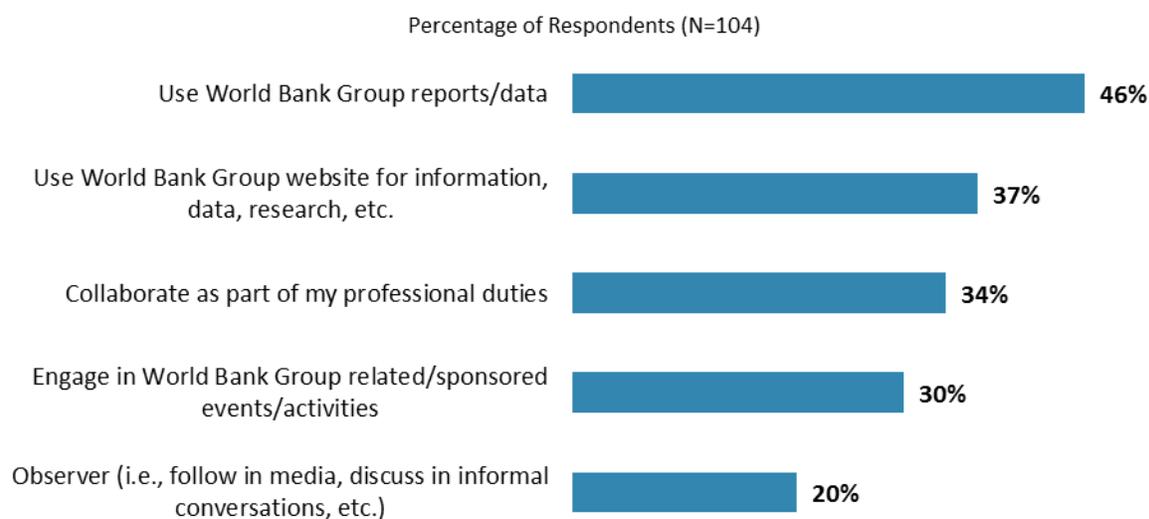

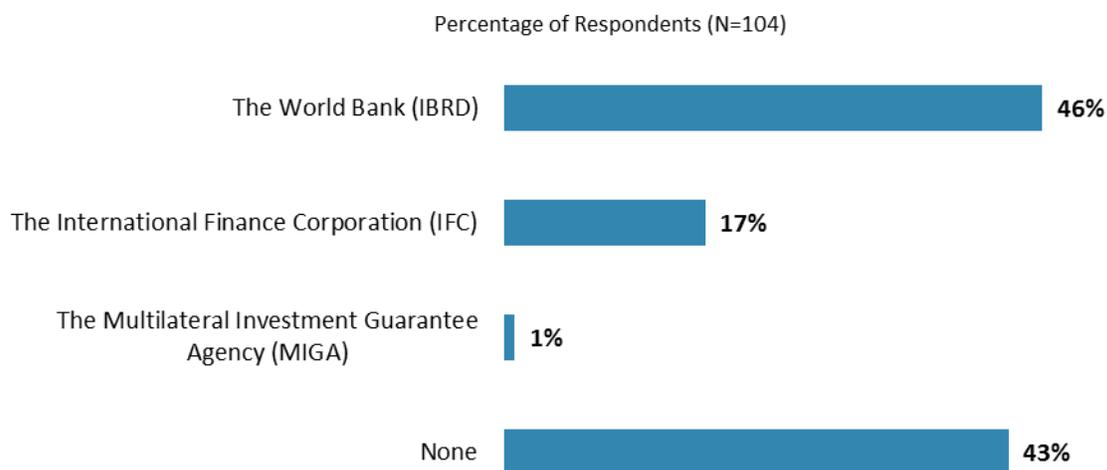
"Currently, do you professionally collaborate/work with the World Bank Group in your country?"

III. Demographics of the Sample (continued)

Familiarity with the World Bank Group

- Employees of ministries/PMUs/consultants on WBG projects had the highest levels of familiarity with the World Bank (IBRD), whereas respondents from academia/research institutes/think tanks had significantly lower levels of familiarity.
- Respondents from the private sector/financial sector/private banks had the highest levels of familiarity with the IFC, whereas respondents from local governments had significantly lower levels of familiarity.
- Respondents who indicated that they work with the IFC in Russia (17% of the sample) had significantly higher levels of familiarity with the IFC than other respondents.
- Respondents who professionally collaborate/work with the WBG had significantly higher levels of familiarity with the World Bank (IBRD) and the IFC than respondents who indicated that they do not collaborate with the WBG.
- Respondents' ratings of familiarity with the World Bank and the IFC were significantly, strongly correlated with their perceptions of the overall effectiveness of the World Bank and the IFC (respectively) in Russia, and significantly, moderately correlated with their perceptions of the WBG's relevance to Russia's development, and the WBG's ability to help achieve development results in Russia.

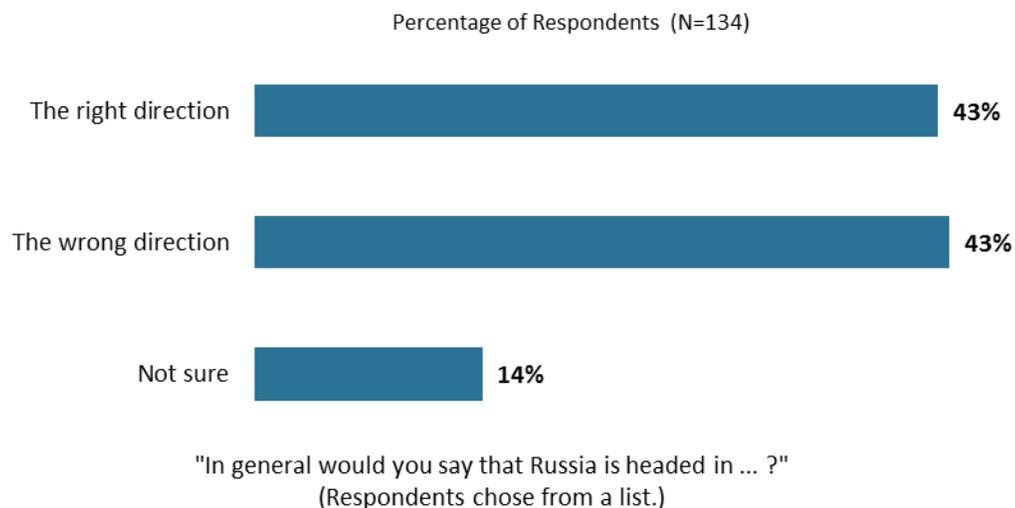

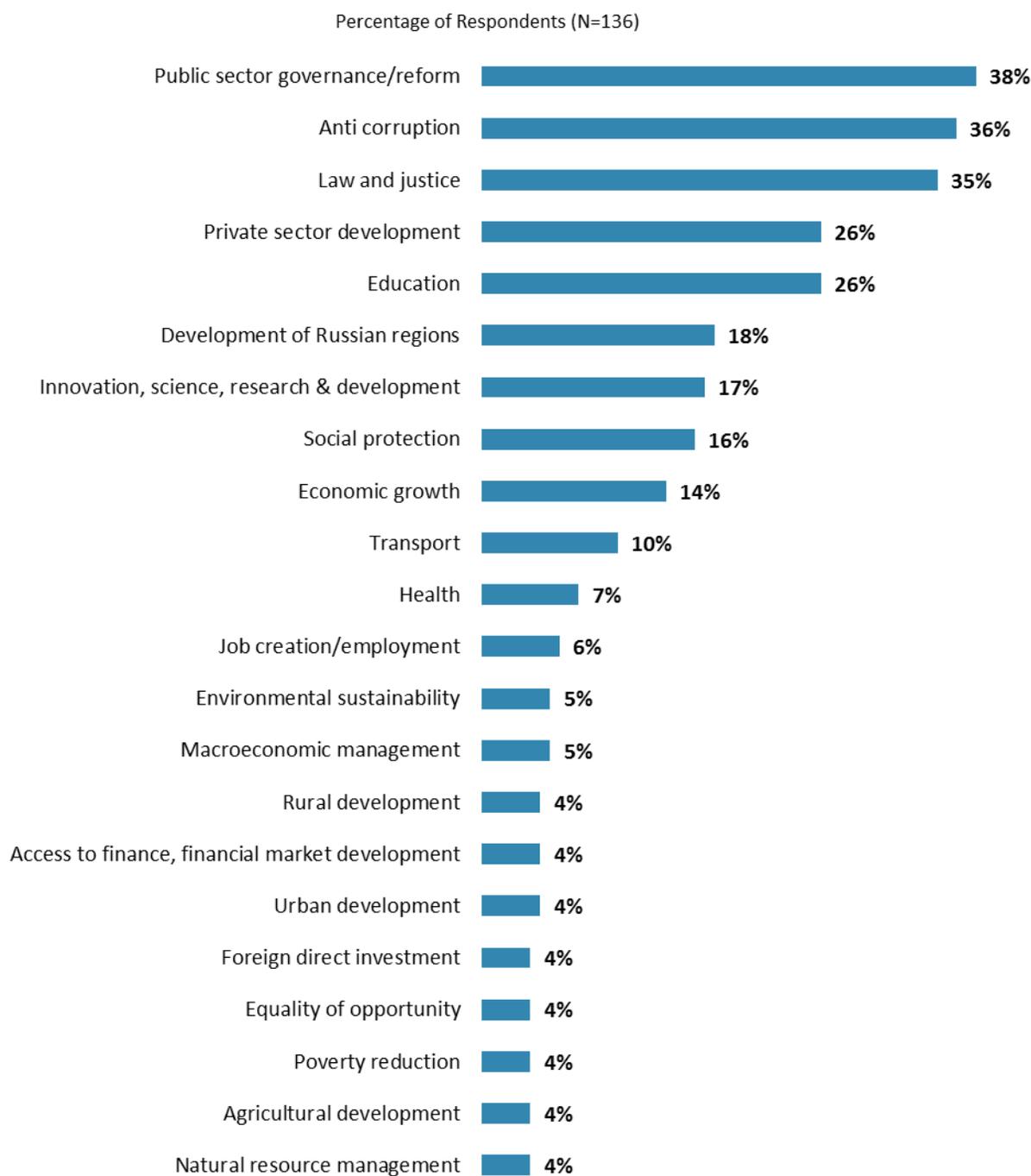
Headed in the Right Direction

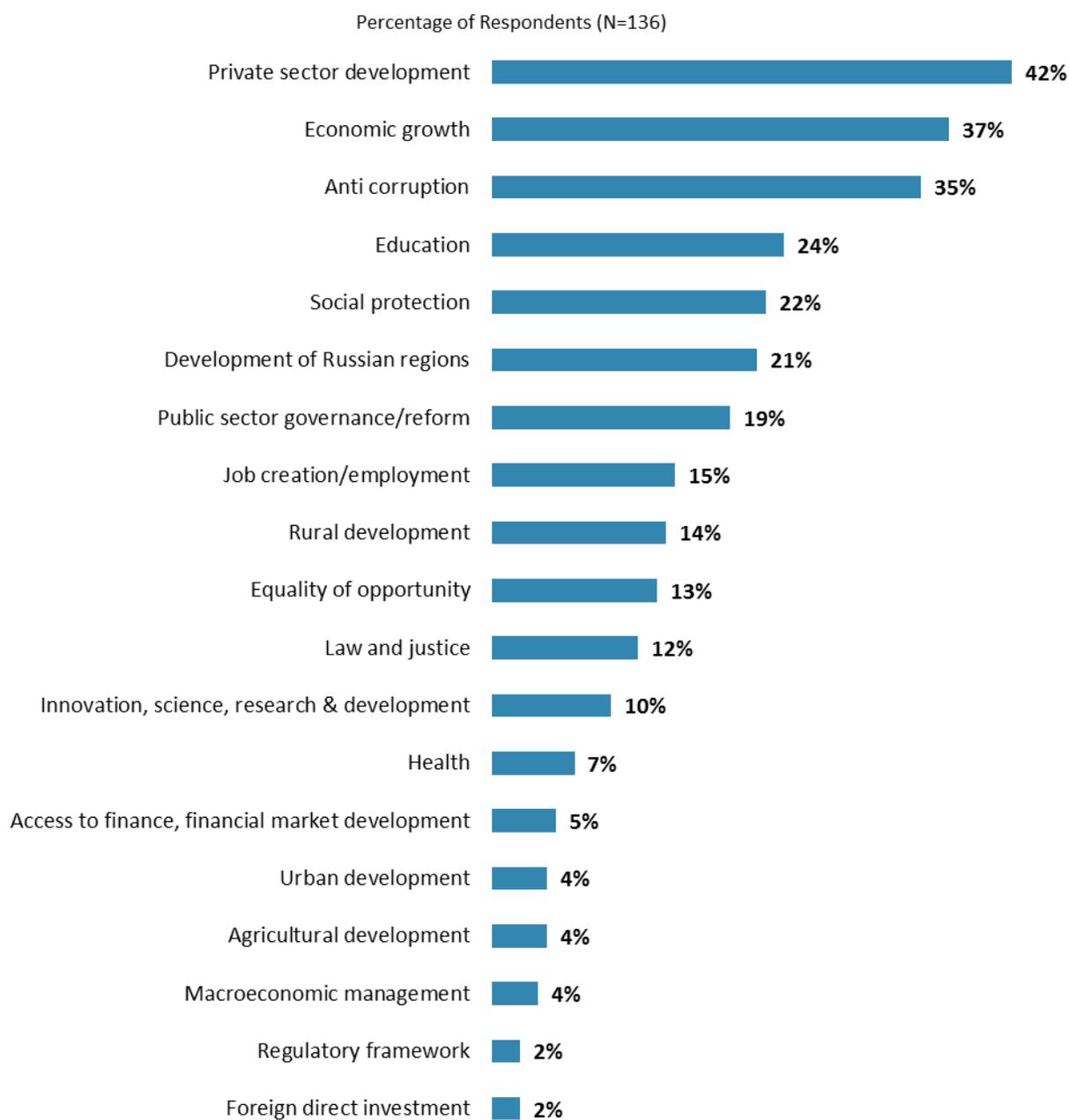
Development Priority

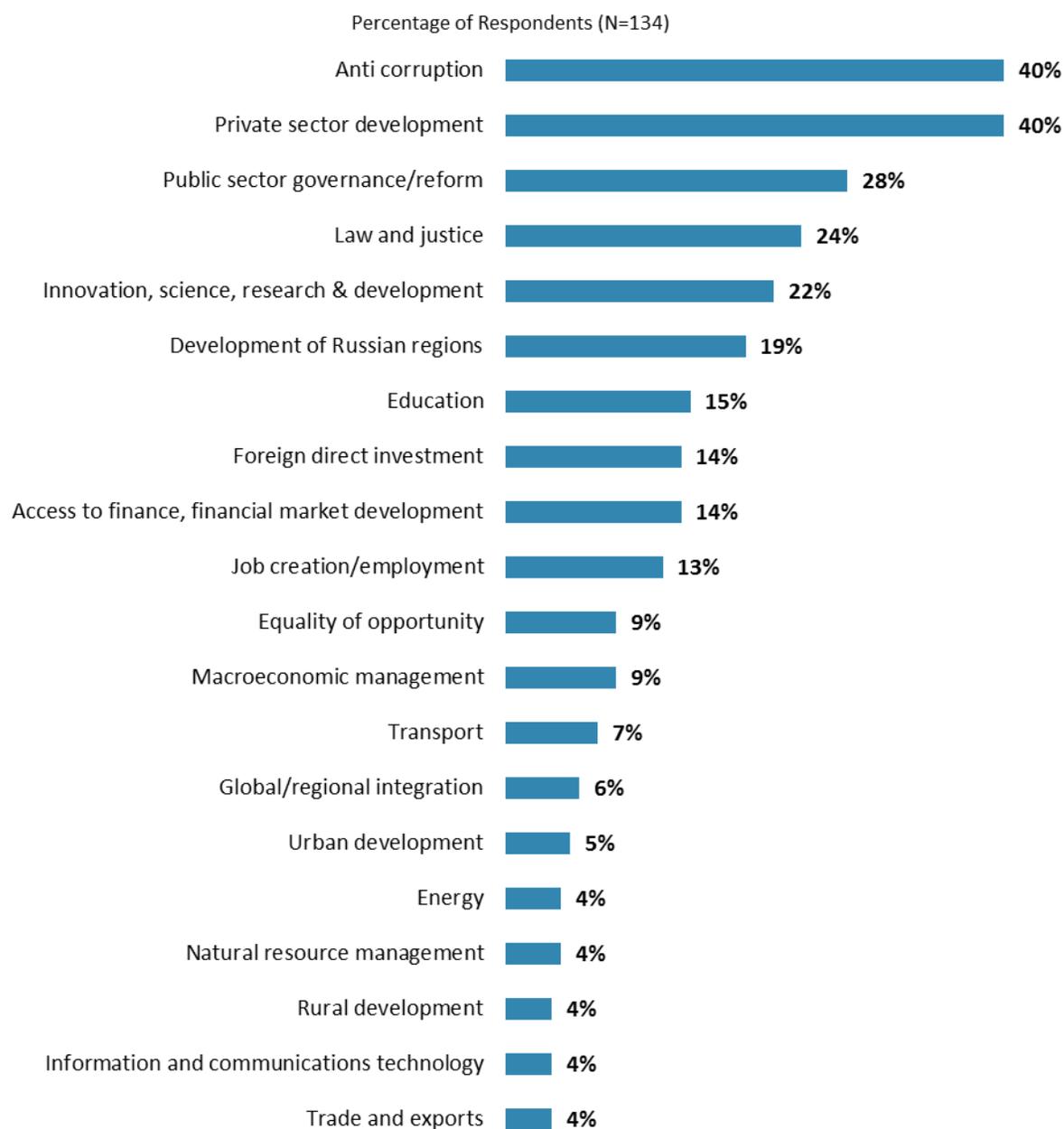
Factors Contributing to Poverty Reduction

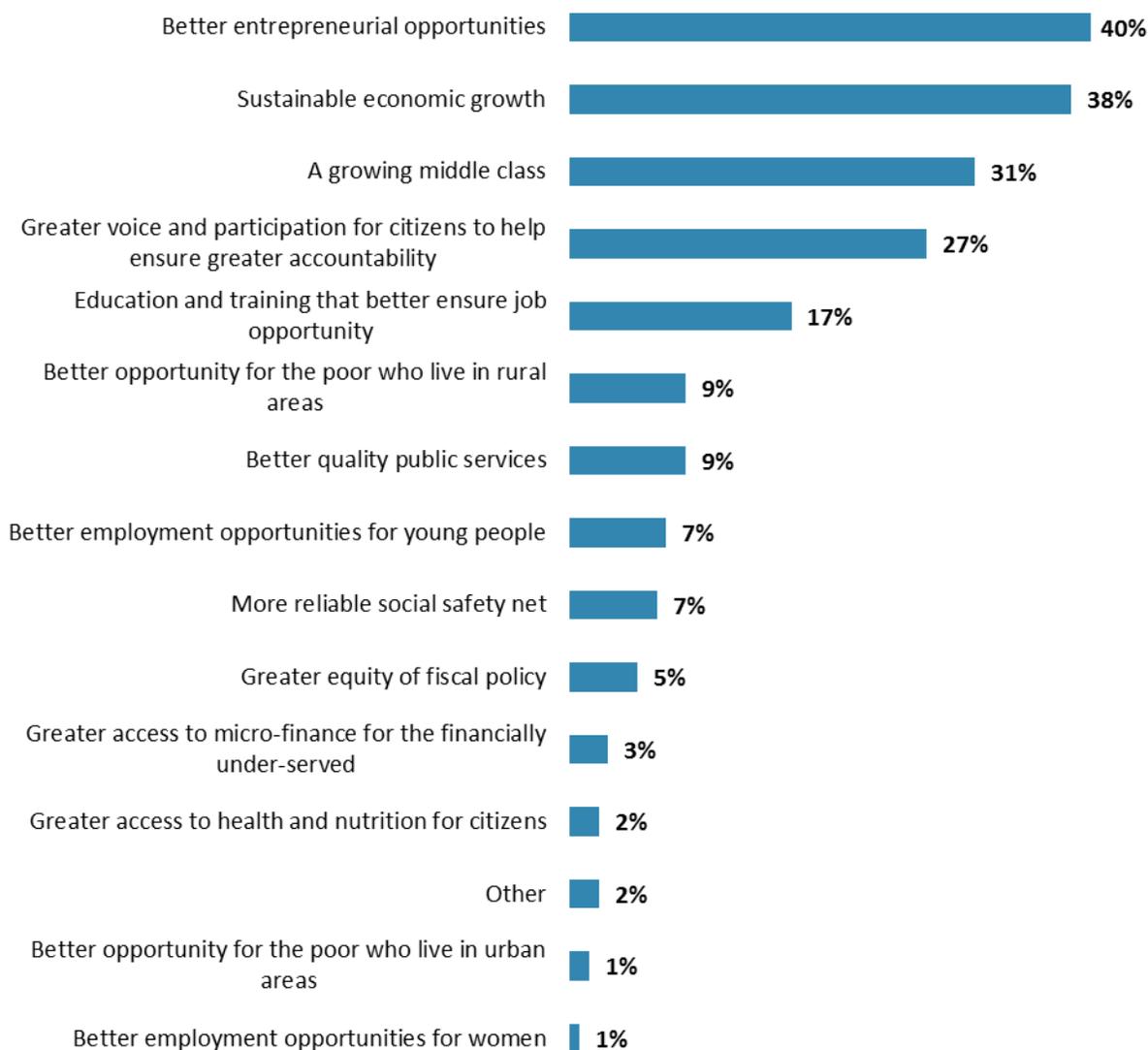


"Economic growth can be driven by a number of factors. Which THREE areas below do you believe would contribute most to generating economic growth in Russia? (Choose no more than THREE)"

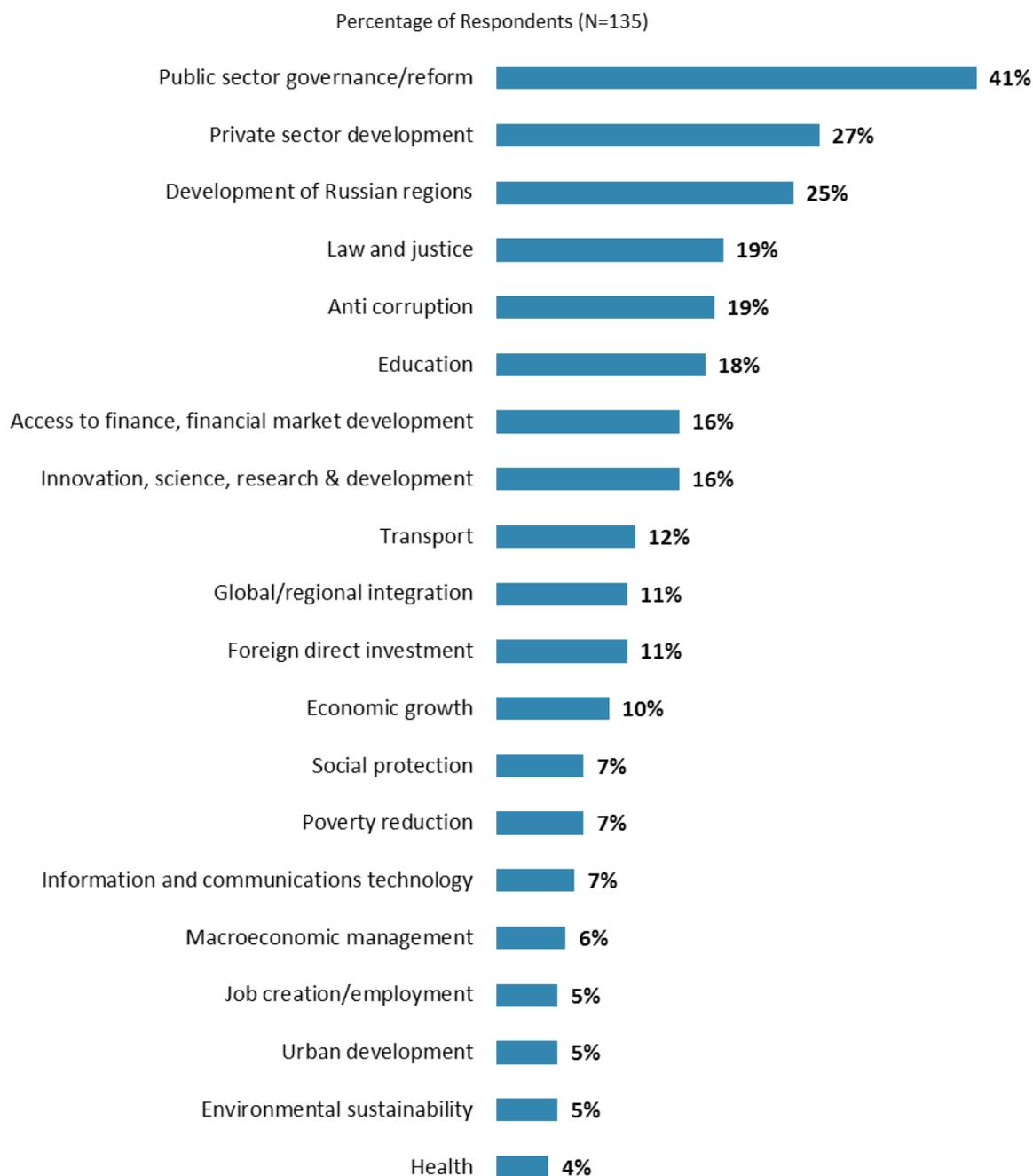
Percentage of Respondents (N=136)

As noted in the “Methodology” section, the indicator questions referred to throughout the survey report are questions that are asked in every country that engages in the Country Opinion Survey. These will be aggregated for the World Bank Group’s annual Corporate Scorecard.

The World Bank Group’s Overall Effectiveness (*Indicator Question*)

- Respondents who collaborate/work with the WBG gave significantly higher ratings for the World Bank’s (IBRD) and IFC’s overall effectiveness than respondents who do not collaborate with the WBG in Russia.
- Respondents who indicated that they work with the IFC in Russia (17% of the sample) gave significantly higher ratings for the IFC’s effectiveness than other respondents.
- Respondents from the private sector/financial sector/private banks gave the highest ratings for the IFC’s effectiveness in Russia, whereas respondents from local governments gave significantly lower ratings.
- Respondents from regional capitals gave significantly lower ratings for the IFC’s effectiveness than respondents from other geographic areas in Russia.

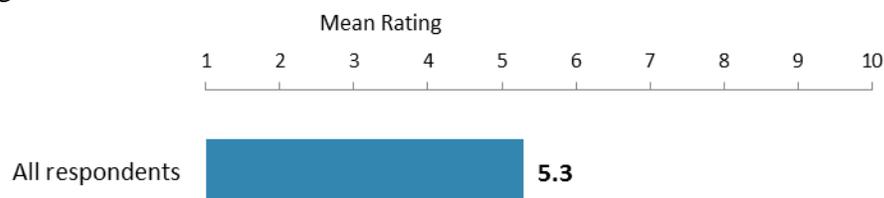

Achieving Development Results (*Indicator Question*)

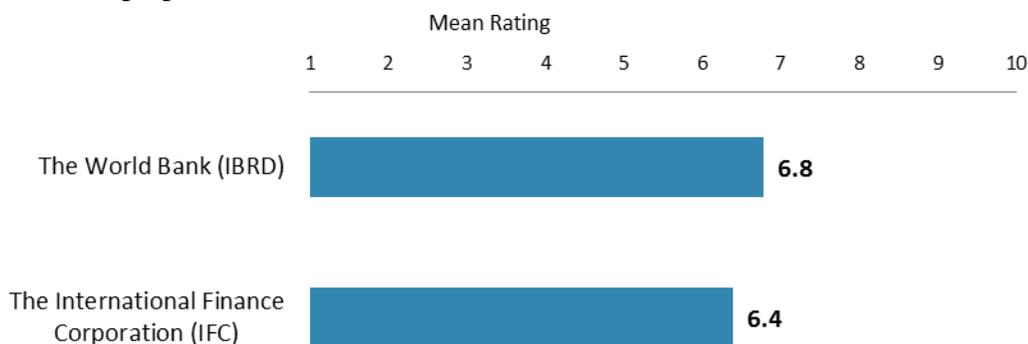
- Respondents who collaborate/work with the WBG gave significantly higher ratings for the extent to which the WBG's work helps to achieve development results in Russia than respondents who do not collaborate with the WBG.
- Respondents across all stakeholder groups and geographic locations gave statistically similar ratings.

Staff Preparedness (*Indicator Question*)

- Respondents who collaborate/work with the WBG gave significantly higher ratings for the extent to which the IFC's staff is well prepared to help Russia solve its most complicated development challenges than respondents who do not collaborate with the WBG in Russia.
- Respondents from the private sector/financial sector/private banks gave the highest ratings for the IFC's staff preparedness in Russia, whereas respondents from local governments gave significantly lower ratings.
- Respondents from regional capitals gave significantly lower ratings for the IFC's staff preparedness than respondents from other geographic areas in Russia.
- Respondents across all stakeholder groups, geographic locations, and levels of collaboration with the WBG gave statistically similar ratings for the World Bank's (IBRD) staff preparedness.

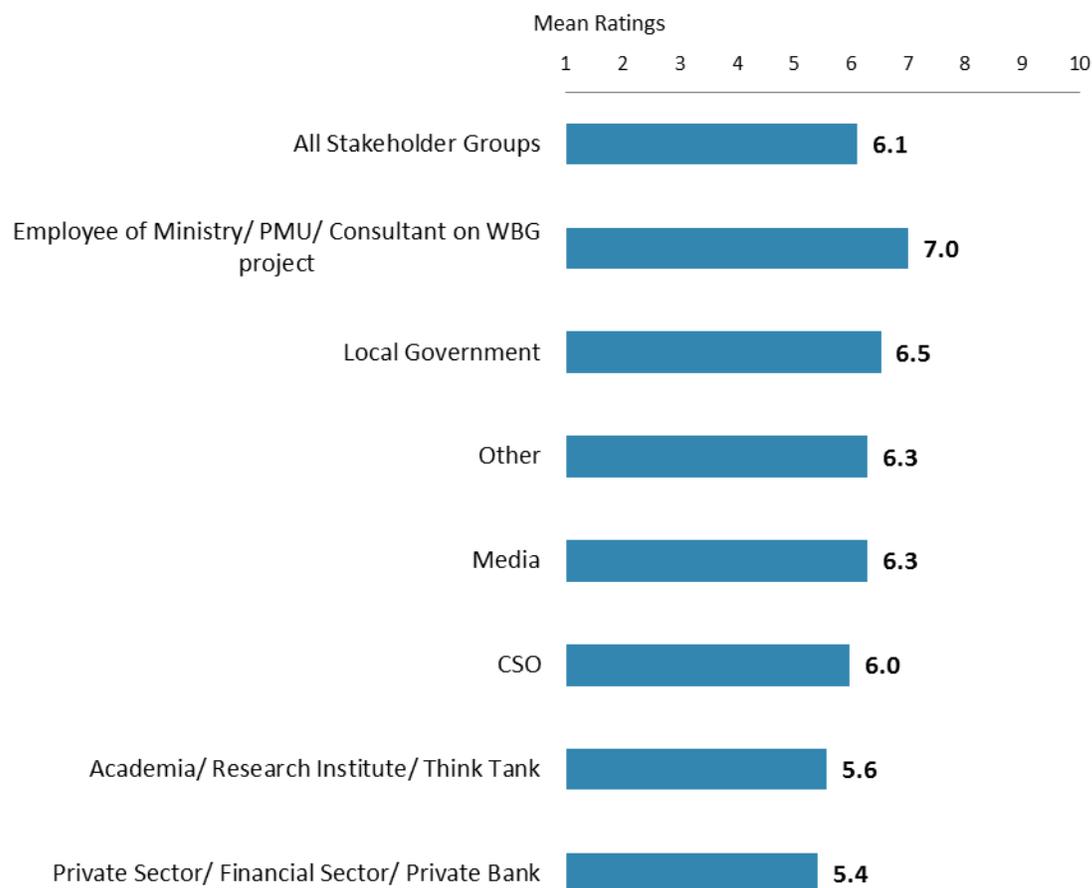


"To what extent do you believe the World Bank Group's staff is well prepared (e.g., skills and knowledge) to help Russia solve its most complicated development challenges?"

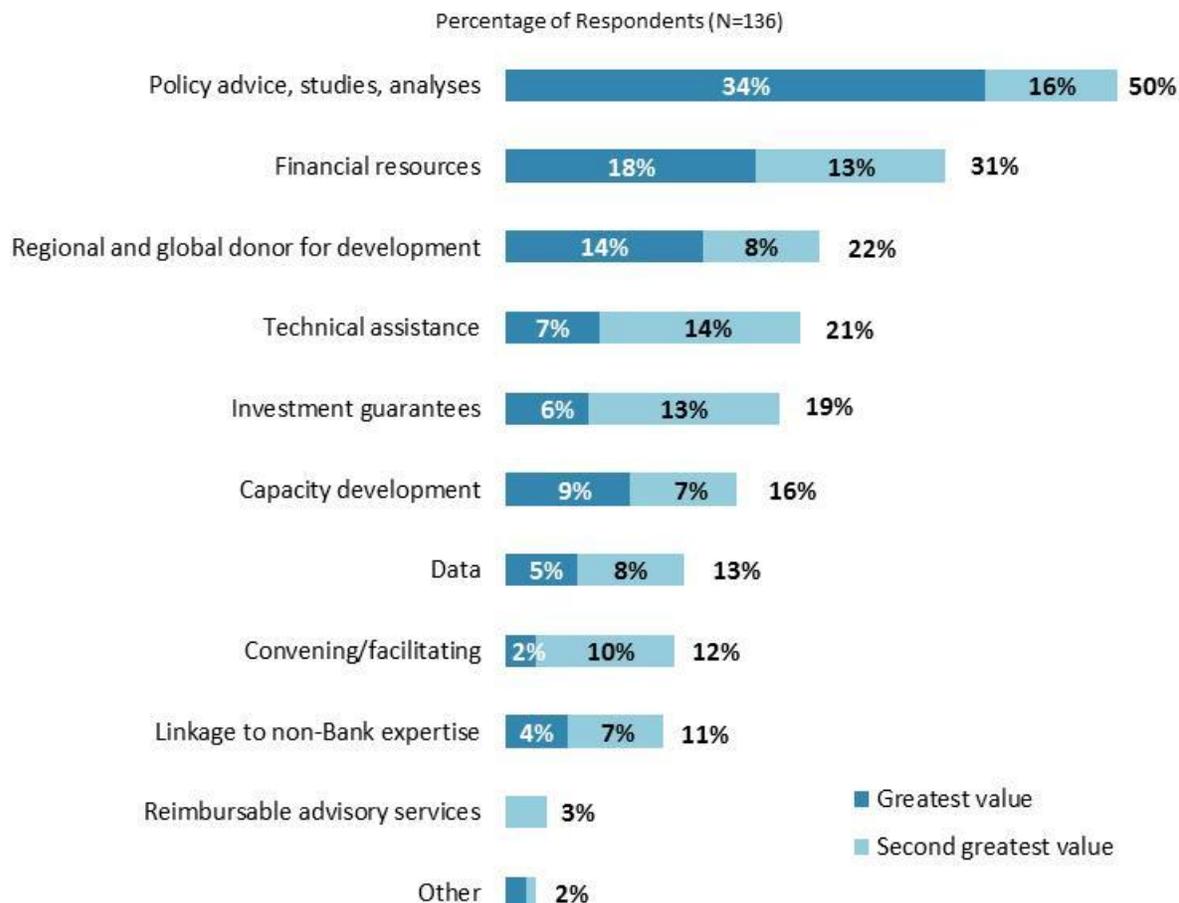
Mean Ratings for All Indicator Questions by Stakeholder Groups on a Scale from 1 to 10

WBG Activities: Greatest Value

- Respondents who collaborate with the WBG were significantly *more* likely to indicate that the WBG's greatest value to Russia was its financial resources compared to respondents who do not collaborate with the WBG.

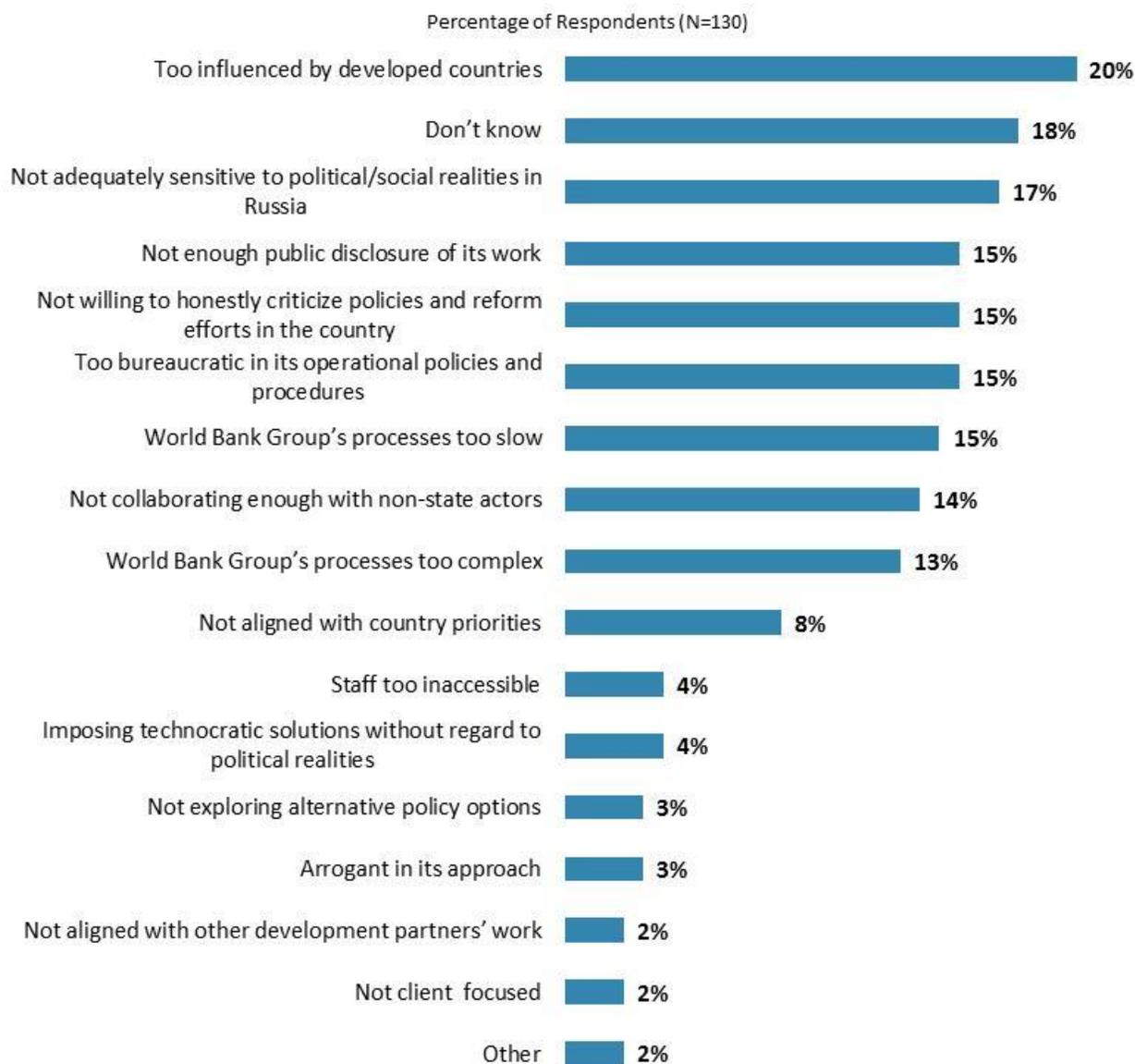


"How effectively do the World Bank Group's activities support Russia's efforts to achieve development results?" (1 - "Not effective at all", 10 - "Very effective")

Greatest Weakness

- Respondents from local governments were significantly *more* likely to indicate that the WBG's greatest weakness in Russia was the lack of public disclosure of its work; respondents from the media were significantly *more* likely to indicate that the WBG is not willing to honestly criticize policies and reform efforts in the country; and respondents from CSOs, academia/research institutes/think tanks, and the private sector/financial sector/private banks tended to indicate that the WBG is not collaborating enough with non-state actors.

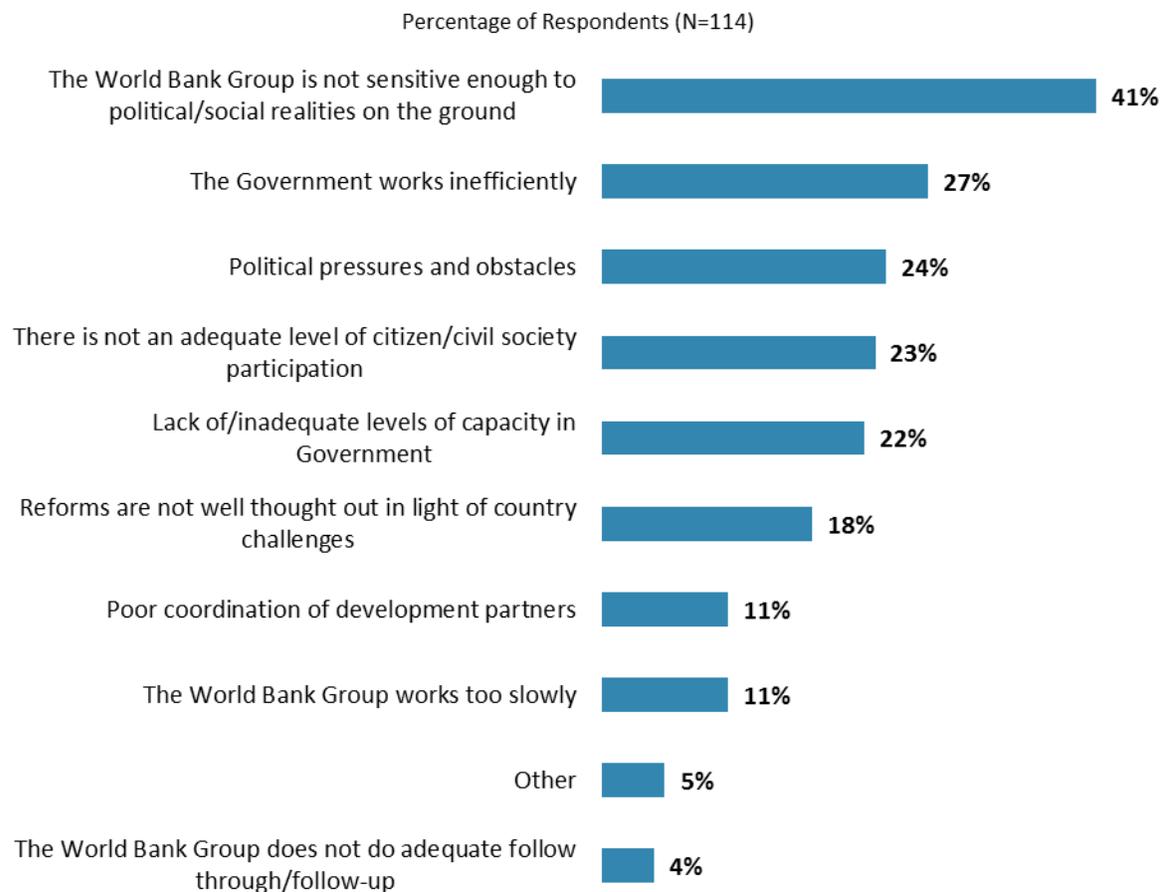

Attributing Slow or Failed Reform Efforts

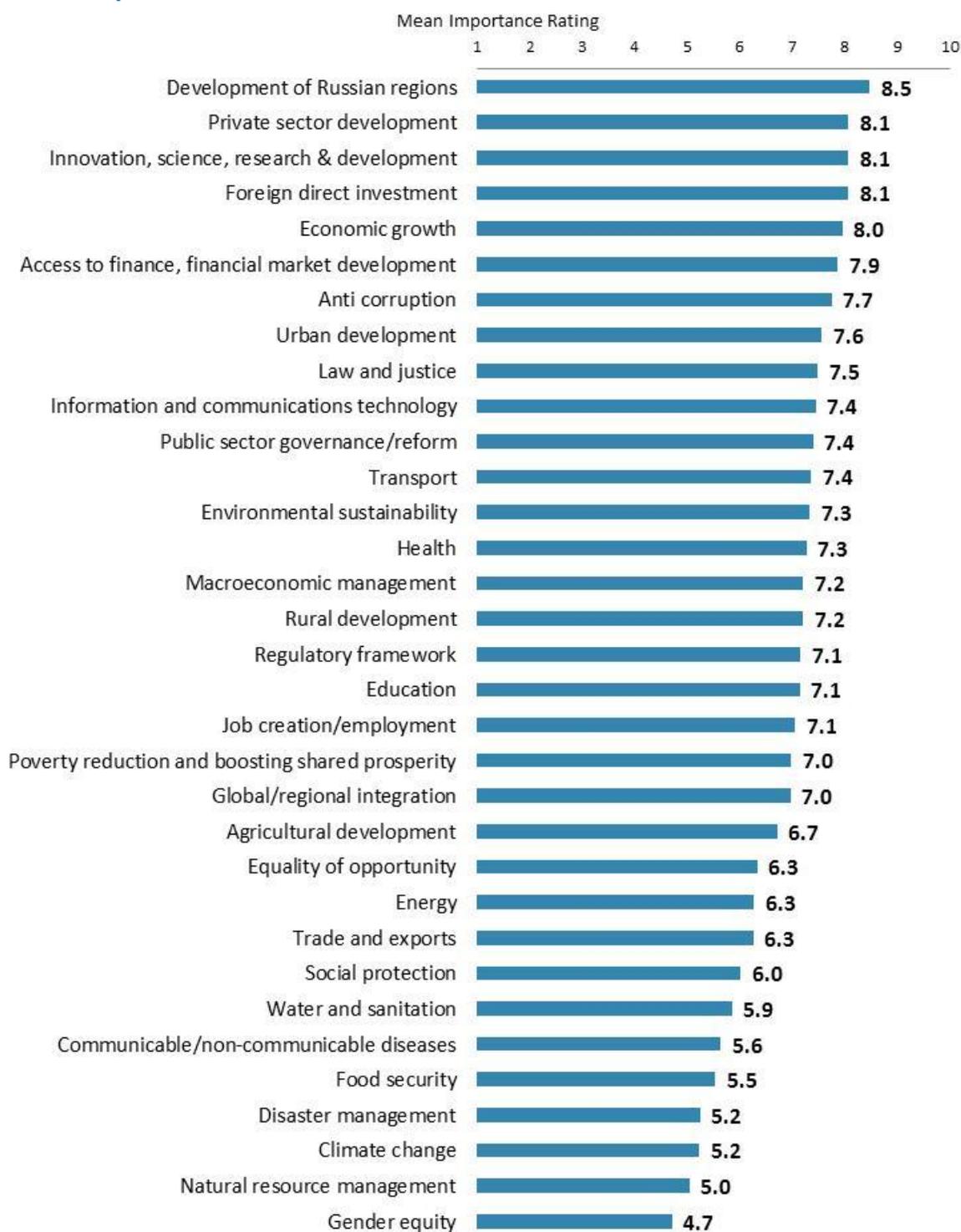
- Employees of ministries/PMUs/consultants on WBG projects, respondents from the private sector/financial sector/private banks, and academia/research institutes/think tanks were significantly *more* likely to attribute slow or failed reform efforts to the WBG being not sensitive enough to political/social realities on the ground compared to respondents from other stakeholder groups.

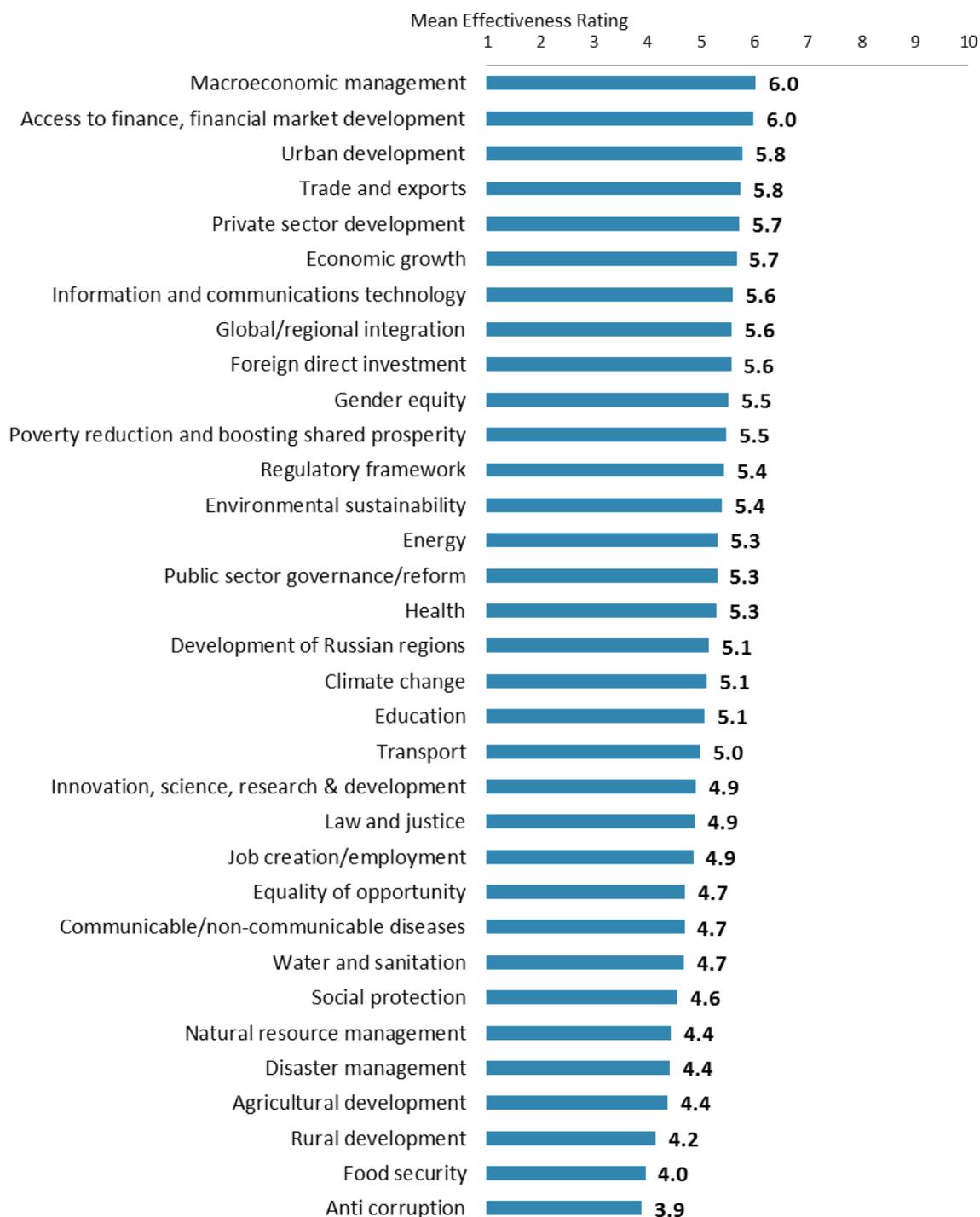
Sectoral Importance

Specific Areas of Effectiveness (continued)

- There were statistically significant differences across stakeholder groups in their ratings of the WBG's effectiveness across two of these thirty-three development areas in Russia: "Regulatory framework" and "Environmental sustainability". Respondents from local governments gave the highest ratings for the WBG's effectiveness in "Regulatory framework", whereas respondents from the private sector/financial sector/private banks gave significantly lower ratings. Employees of ministries/PMUs/consultants on WBG projects gave the highest ratings for the WBG's effectiveness in "Environmental sustainability", whereas respondents from the media gave significantly lower ratings. Ratings across all areas by stakeholder groups can be found in Appendix B (see page 76).
- Respondents who collaborate with the WBG gave significantly *higher* effectiveness ratings for "Urban development"; "Trade and exports", "Environmental sustainability", and "Education" compared to respondents who do not collaborate with the WBG. Ratings across all areas by collaboration can be found in Appendix D (see page 117).
- Note in the Appendix on the sectoral effectiveness (Appendix A, page 68) that primarily informed stakeholders responded to this question.

VI. Sectoral Importance and Effectiveness (continued)

Drivers of Effectiveness

To determine the key drivers of respondents' ratings of the World Bank Group's overall effectiveness and ratings of its ability to help achieve development results in Russia, bivariate correlational analyses were conducted using respondents' ratings of the fifteen specific areas of effectiveness.

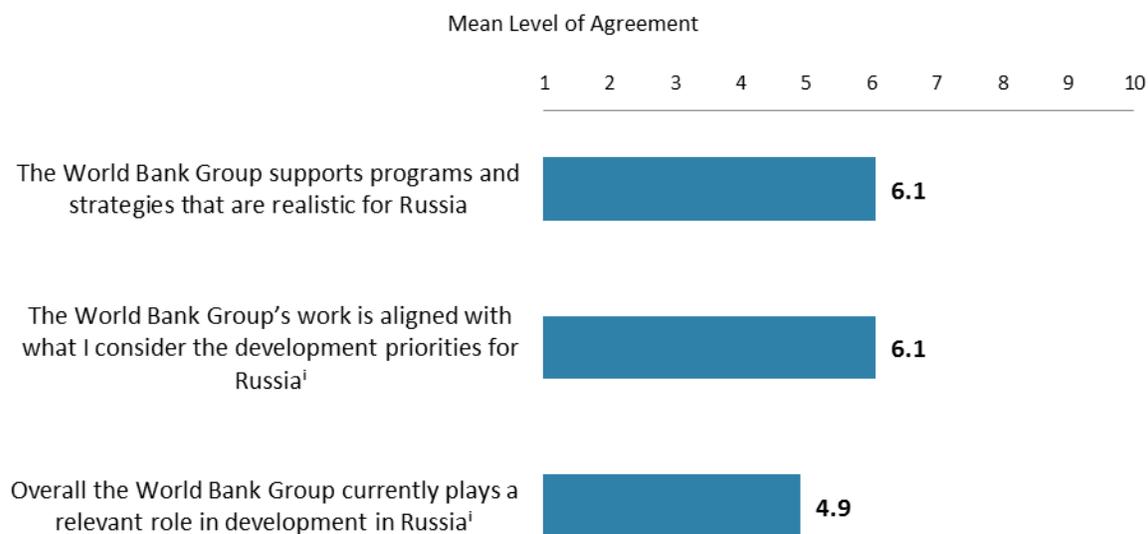
Correlational analyses, however, are not able to tell us exactly what is causing respondents' ratings of the WBG's overall effectiveness or ratings of its ability to help achieve development results. Rather, these analyses tell us that as ratings of effectiveness in one area increase, respondents' ratings of the WBG's overall effectiveness increase, or as ratings of effectiveness in one area increase, ratings of the WBG's ability to help achieve development results increase. Thus, it can be inferred that respondents' perceptions of effectiveness in one specific area are related to, or drive, respondents' perceptions of the WBG's overall effectiveness or perceptions of the WBG's ability to help achieve development results.

- **Overall Effectiveness:** Those specific areas with the highest Pearson Product-Moment correlations were determined to be the most closely related to perceptions of the overall effectiveness of the World Bank (IBRD) and the IFC, suggesting that ratings of effectiveness in those specific areas are drivers of perceptions of the World Bank's and IFC's overall effectiveness in Russia. The areas determined to be key drivers from these analyses were:
 - The World Bank's effectiveness at regulatory framework; and
 - The World Bank's effectiveness at macroeconomic management.
 - The IFC's effectiveness at water and sanitation;
 - The IFC's effectiveness at transport; and
 - The IFC's effectiveness at environmental sustainability.
- **Achieving Development Results:** Those specific areas with the highest Pearson Product-Moment correlations were determined to be the most closely related to perceptions of the WBG's ability to help achieve development results in Russia, suggesting that ratings of effectiveness in those specific areas are drivers of perceptions of the WBG's ability to help achieve development results. The areas determined to be key drivers from these analyses were:
 - The WBG's effectiveness at innovation, science, research & development; and
 - The WBG's effectiveness at transport.

VII. How the World Bank Group Operates

The World Bank Group's Work in Russia

- Respondents who collaborate/work with the WBG had significantly *higher* levels of agreement with all these three statements about the WBG's work in Russia compared to respondents who do not collaborate with the WBG.
- Respondents across all stakeholder groups and geographic locations had statistically similar levels of agreement with these statements (including the indicator questions).

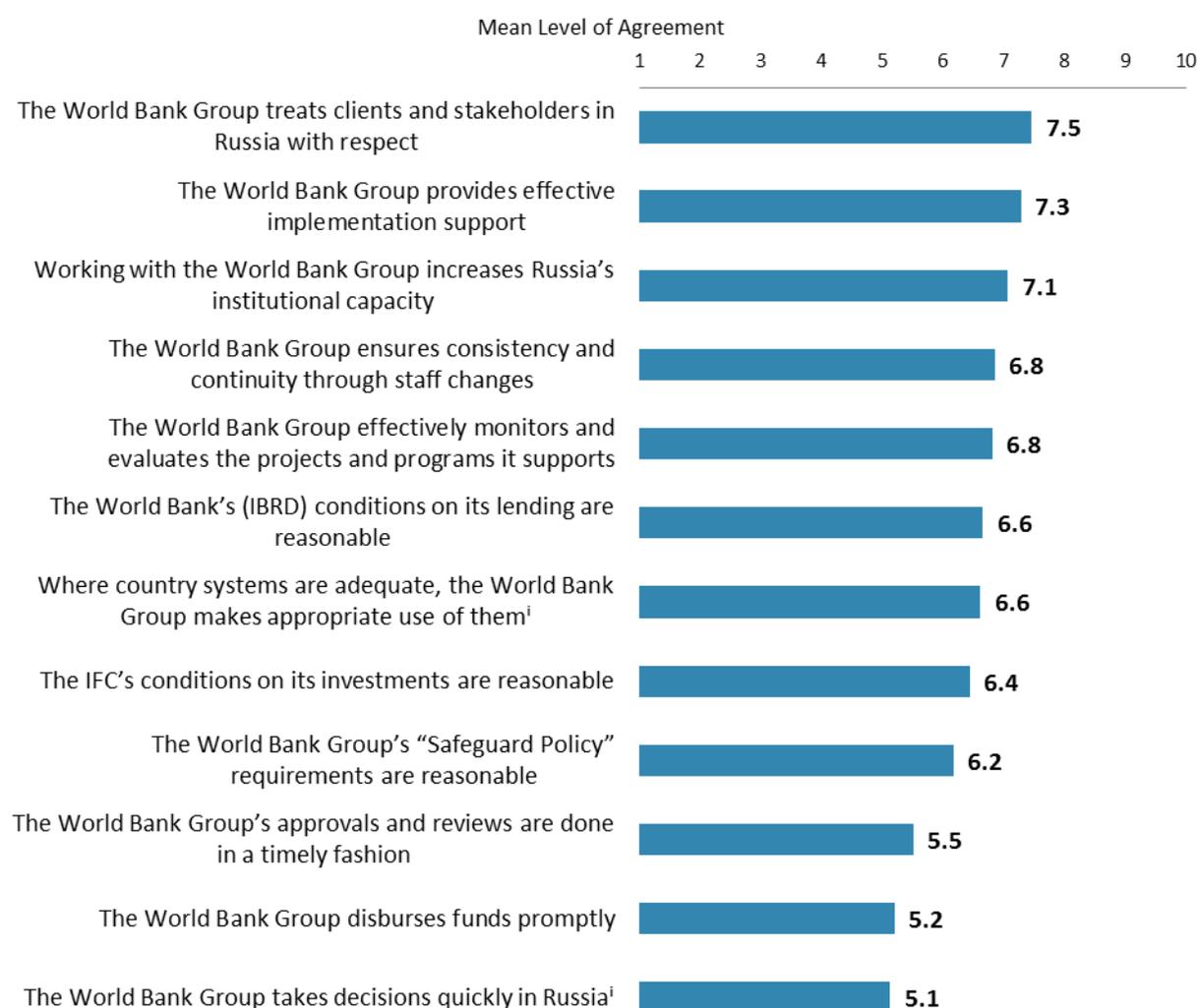


"To what extent do you agree with the following statements about the World Bank Group's work in Russia?"

Overall Perceptions

- Respondents who collaborate/work with the WBG had significantly *higher* levels of agreement with the following statements compared to respondents who do not collaborate with the WBG: “The WBG treats clients and stakeholders in Russia with respect”, “The WBG provides effective implementation support”, “Working with the WBG increases Russia’s institutional capacity”, “Where country systems are adequate, the WBG makes appropriate use of them”, “The World Bank’s (IBRD) conditions on its lending are reasonable”, and “The IFC’s conditions on its investments are reasonable”.
- Respondents across all stakeholder groups and geographic locations had statistically similar levels of agreement with the indicator questions.

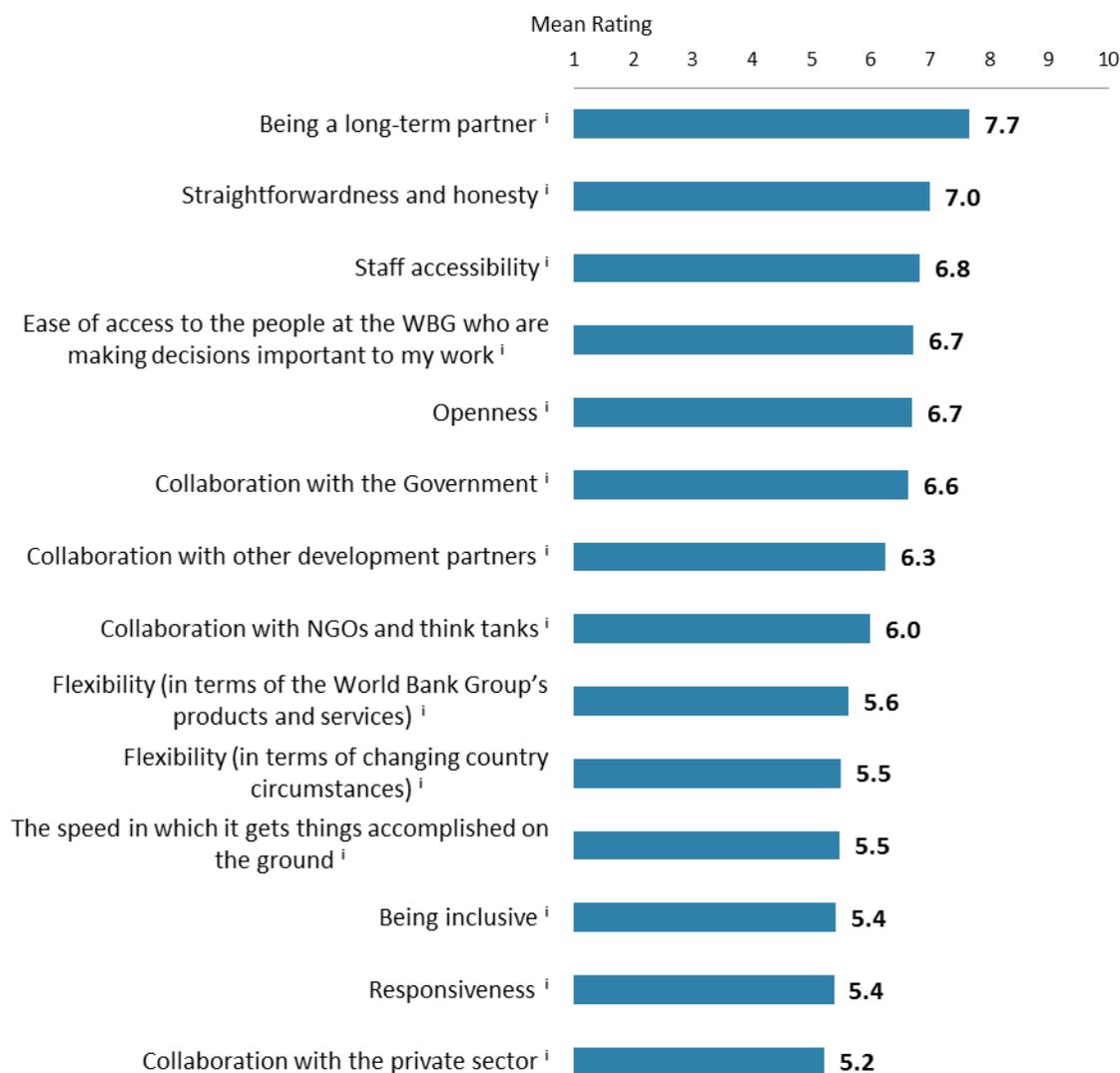


"To what extent do you agree/disagree with the following statements?" (1-"Strongly disagree", 10-"Strongly agree")

The World Bank Group as an Effective Development Partner

- There were significant stakeholder group differences in their ratings for only one of these aspects of the WBG as an effective development partner: WBG's collaboration with the Government. Employees of ministries/PMUs/consultants on WBG projects and respondents from local governments gave the highest ratings, whereas respondents from the private sector/financial sector/private banks and CSOs gave significantly lower ratings. 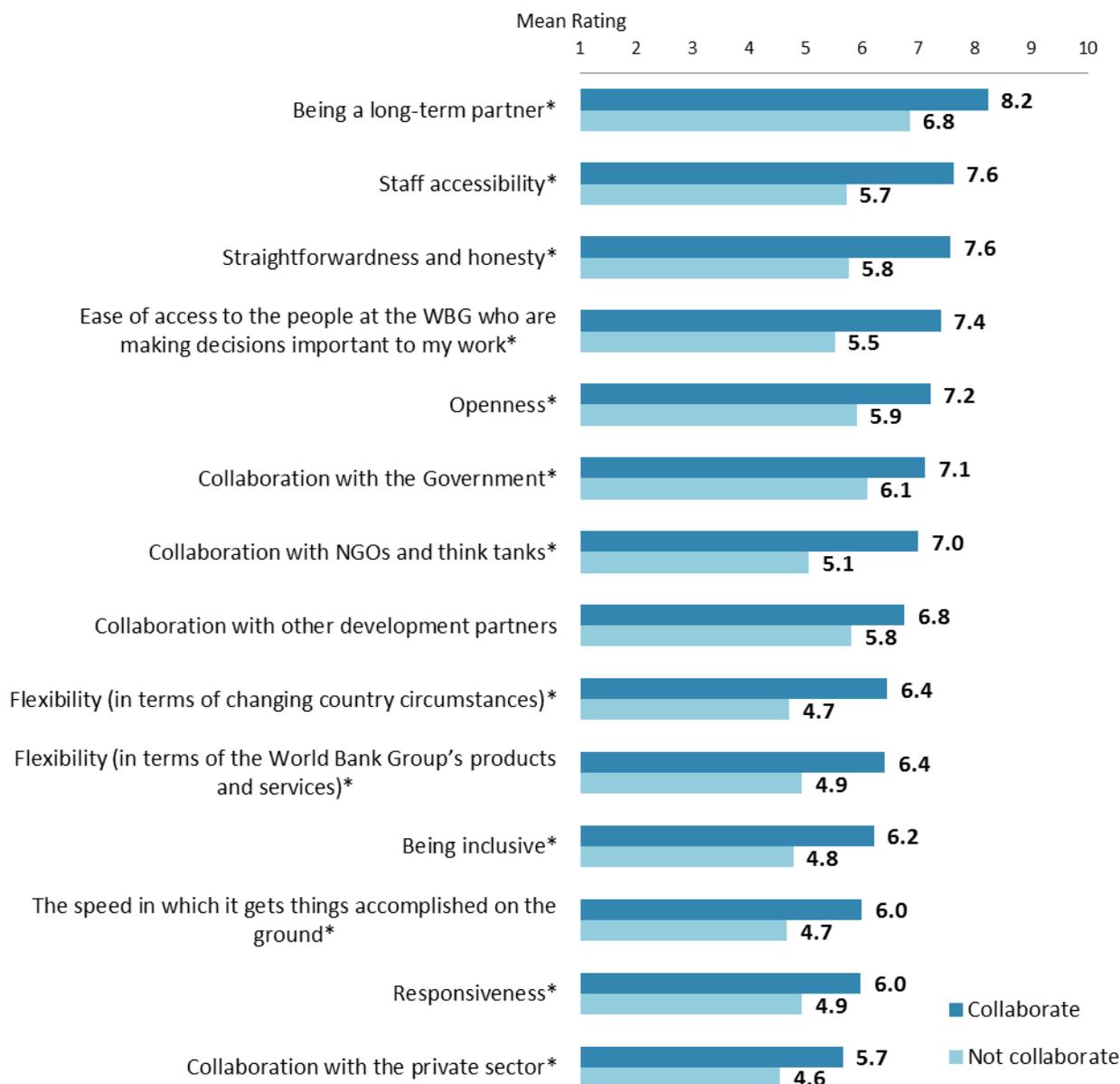
"To what extent is the World Bank Group an effective development partner in Russia in terms of each of the following?" (1-"To no degree at all", 10-"To a very significant degree")

The World Bank Group as an Effective Development Partner (continued)

- Respondents who professionally collaborate/work with the WBG gave significantly *higher* ratings for nearly all of these aspects compared to respondents who do not collaborate with the WBG. Statistically significant differences are noted in the chart.



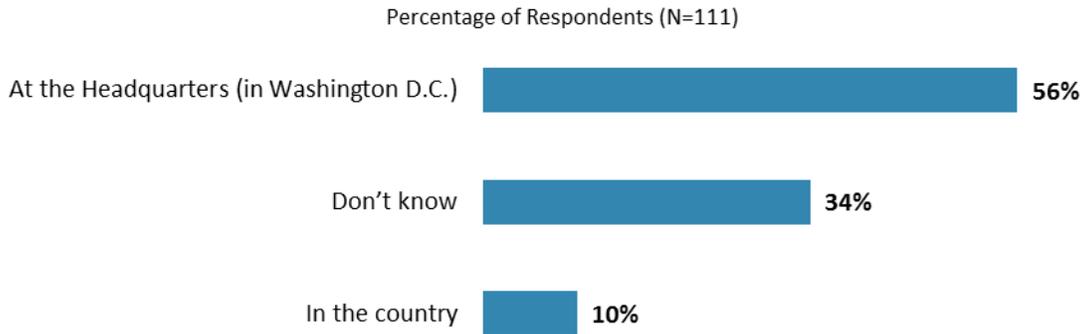
"To what extent is the World Bank Group an effective development partner in Russia in terms of each of the following?" (1-"To no degree at all", 10-"To a very significant degree")

Making Decisions about the WBG Program in Russia

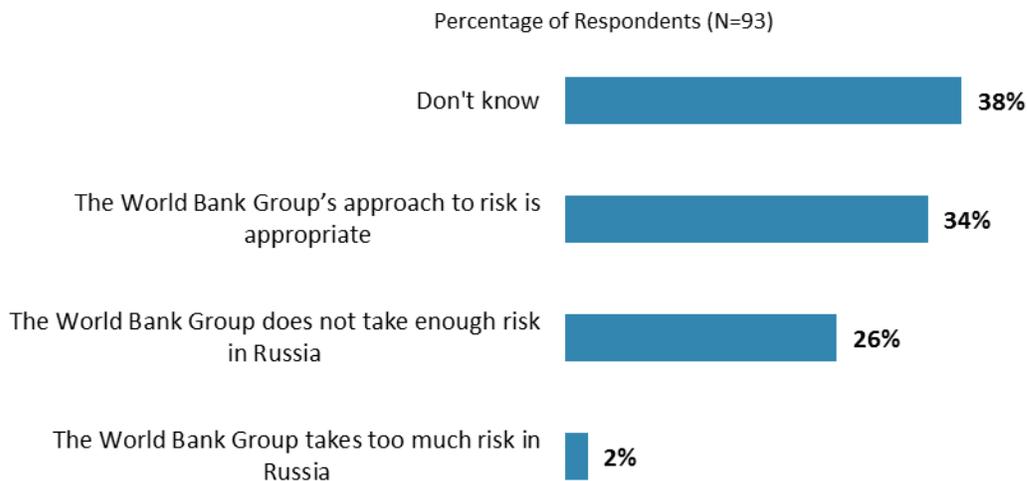
- Respondents who collaborate/work with the WBG were significantly *more* likely to indicate that the WBG's decisions that support the program in Russia are made primarily at the Headquarters compared to respondents who do not collaborate with the WBG.

- Respondents who collaborate/work with the WBG were significantly *more* likely to indicate that the WBG's does not take enough risk in Russia compared to respondents who do not collaborate with the WBG.

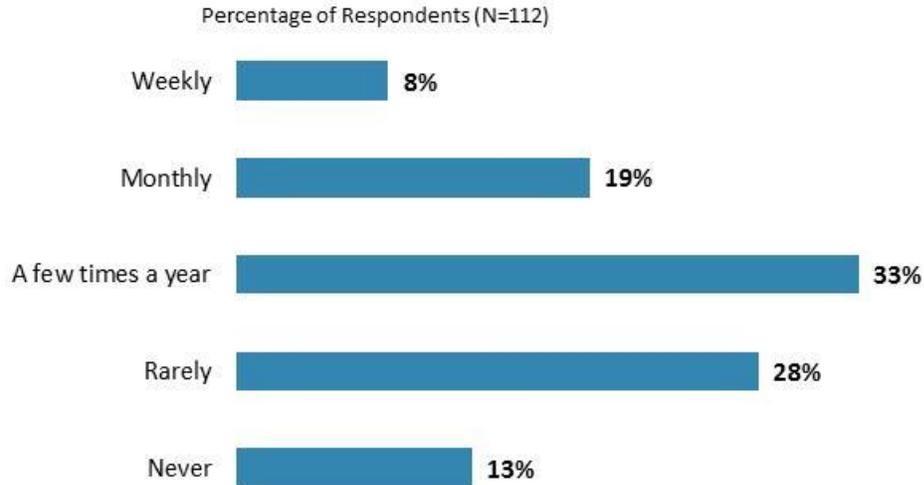


"Which of the following best describes the way the World Bank Group operates in Russia?"

Frequency of Consulting World Bank Group’s Knowledge Work and Activities

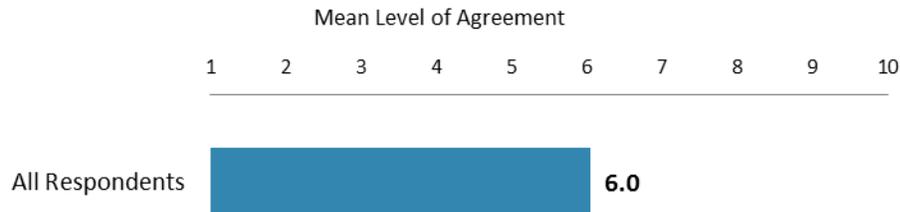
- Respondents who collaborate/work with the WBG were significantly *more* likely to indicate that they consulted WBG’s knowledge work and activities on a weekly/monthly basis than respondents who do not collaborate with the WBG.

Meeting Russia’s Knowledge Needs (*Indicator Question*)

- Respondents who collaborate with the WBG had significantly *higher* levels of agreement that the WBG meets Russia’s needs for knowledge services compared to respondents who do not collaborate with the WBG.
- Employees of ministries/PMUs/consultants on WBG projects and respondents from local governments had the highest levels of agreement, whereas respondents from the private sector/financial sector/private banks had significantly lower levels of agreement.

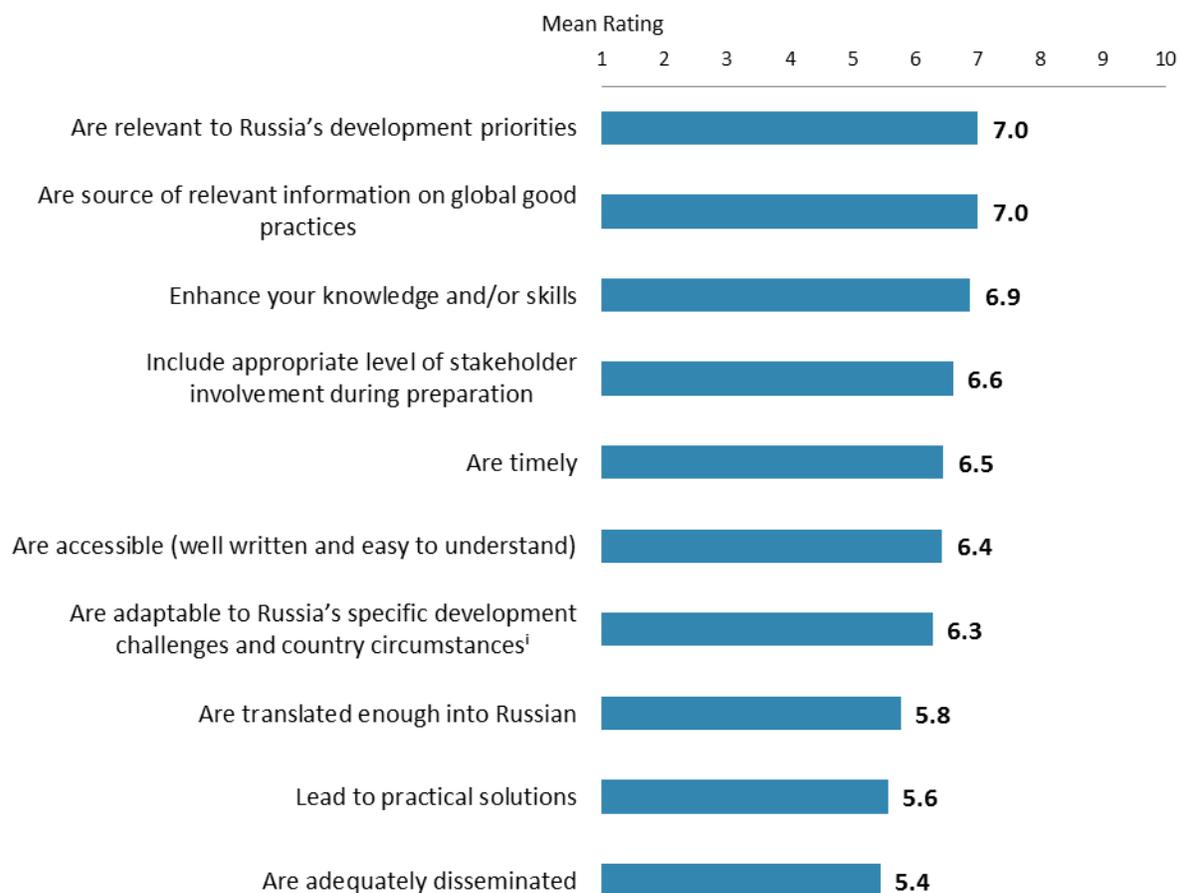

Qualities of the WBG's Knowledge Work and Activities

- Respondents who professionally collaborate/work with the WBG gave significantly *higher* ratings for nearly all of these qualities of the WBG's knowledge work and activities (including the indicator question) than respondents who do not collaborate with the WBG (see Appendix D for details).
- Respondents across all stakeholder groups and geographic locations gave statistically similar ratings for the indicator question.

Contribution of the WBG's Knowledge Work and Activities (Indicator Question)

- Respondents who collaborate/work with the WBG gave significantly *higher* ratings for the significance of the contribution that the WBG's knowledge work and activities make to development results in Russia compared to respondents who do not collaborate with the WBG.
- Respondents across all stakeholder groups and geographic locations gave statistically similar ratings.

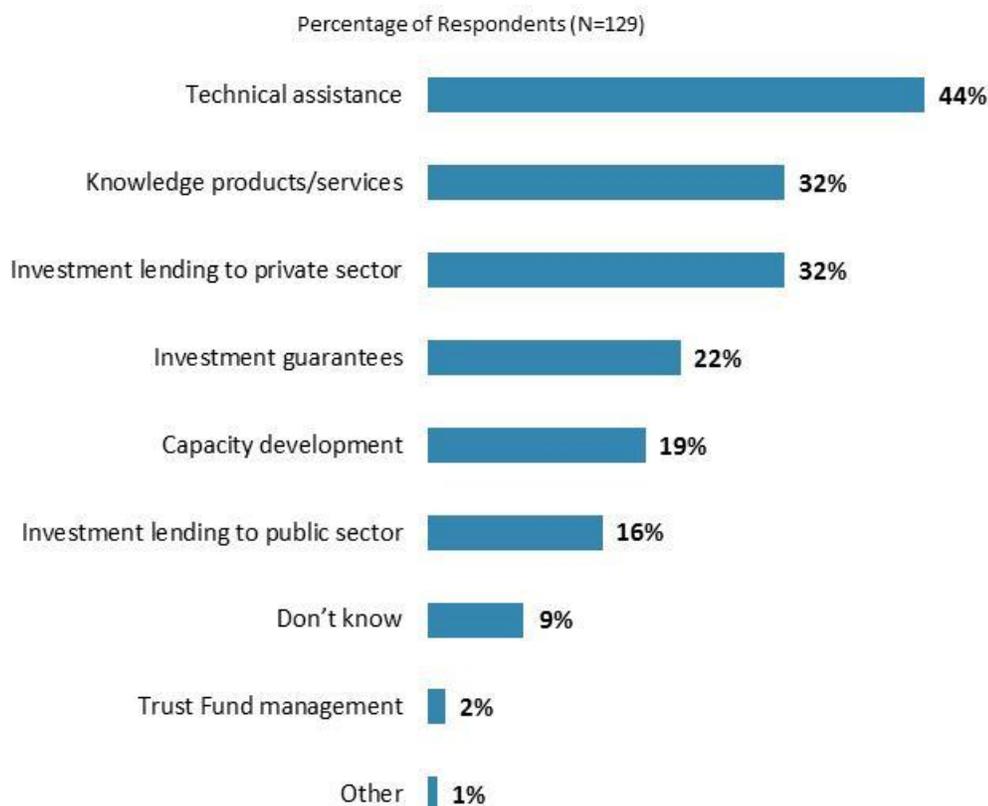


"Overall, how would you rate the technical quality of the World Bank Group's knowledge work and activities?" (1-"Very low technical quality", 10-"Very high technical quality")

Most Effective Instruments in Reducing Poverty

- Employees of ministries/PMUs/consultants on WBG projects and respondents from local governments were significantly *more* likely to indicate “investment lending to public sector” as the most effective instrument of the WBG in reducing poverty compared to respondents from other stakeholder groups.

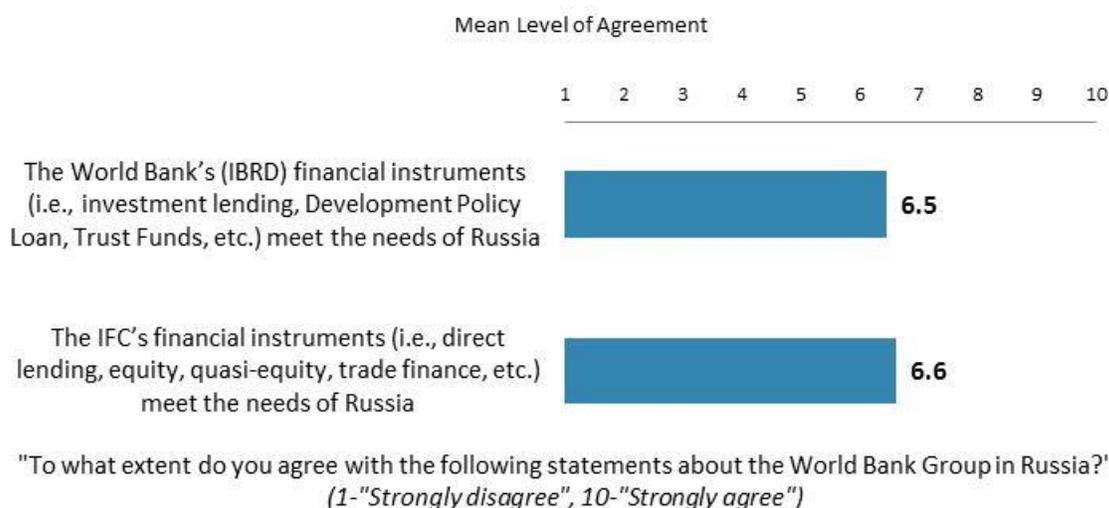


“Which World Bank Group's instruments do you believe are the MOST effective in reducing poverty in Russia? (Choose no more than TWO)”

- Employees of ministries/PMUs/consultants on WBG projects had the highest levels of agreement that the World Bank's (IBRD) financial instruments meet Russia's needs, whereas respondents from the private sector/financial sector/private banks and academia/research institutes/think tanks had significantly lower levels of agreement.
- Respondents across all geographic locations had statistically similar levels of agreement that the World Bank's (IBRD) and IFC's financial instruments meet Russia's needs.



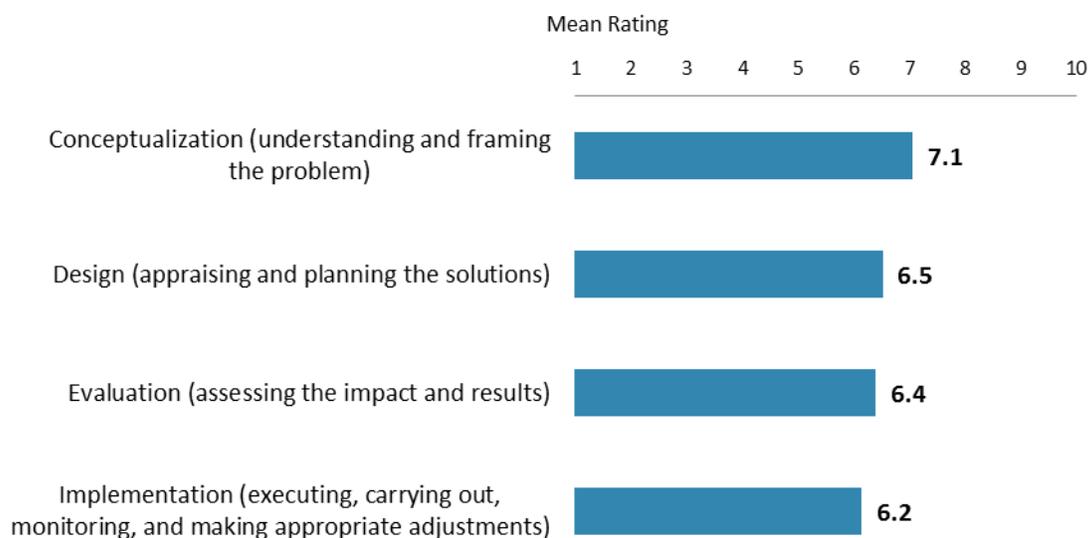
The WBG's Reimbursable Advisory Services

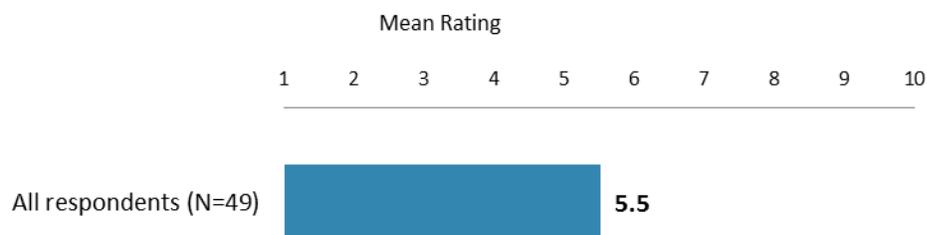

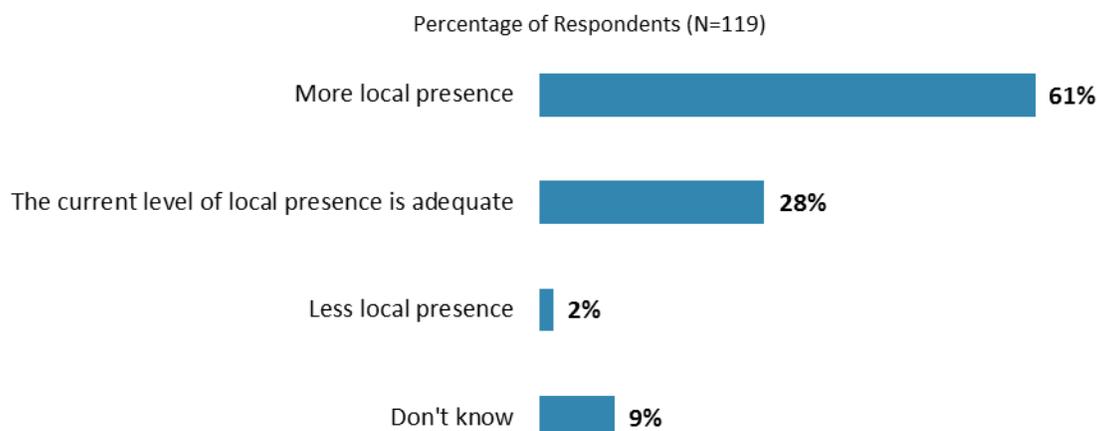
Measuring Results: WBG Internal Evaluation Mechanisms

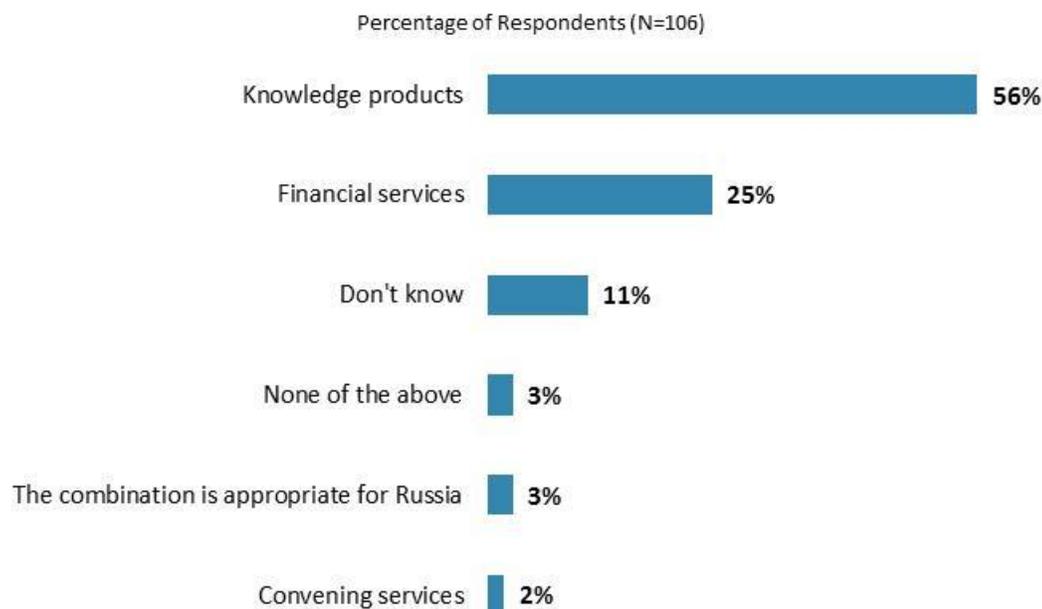

World Bank Group's Services in Russia

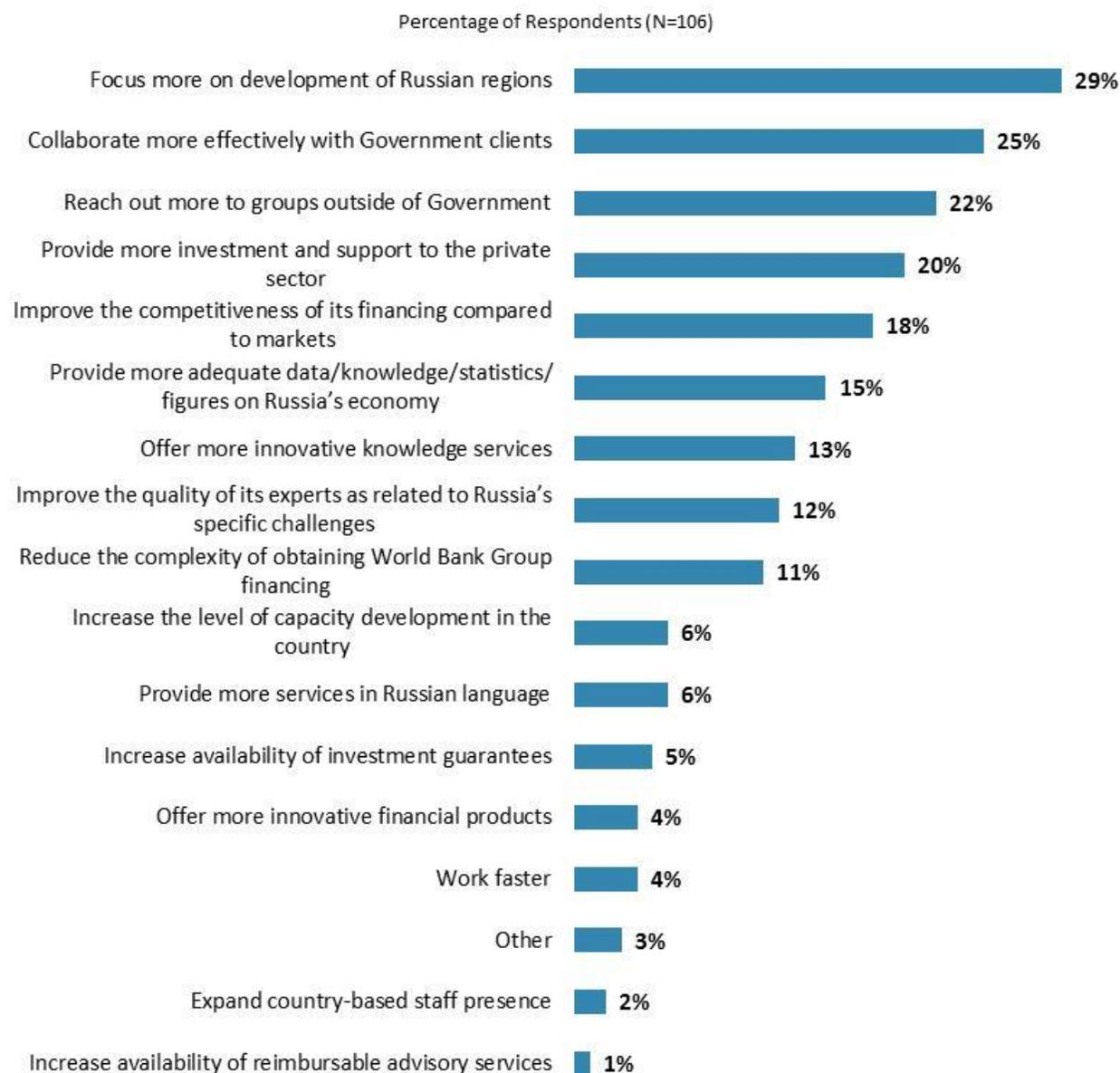

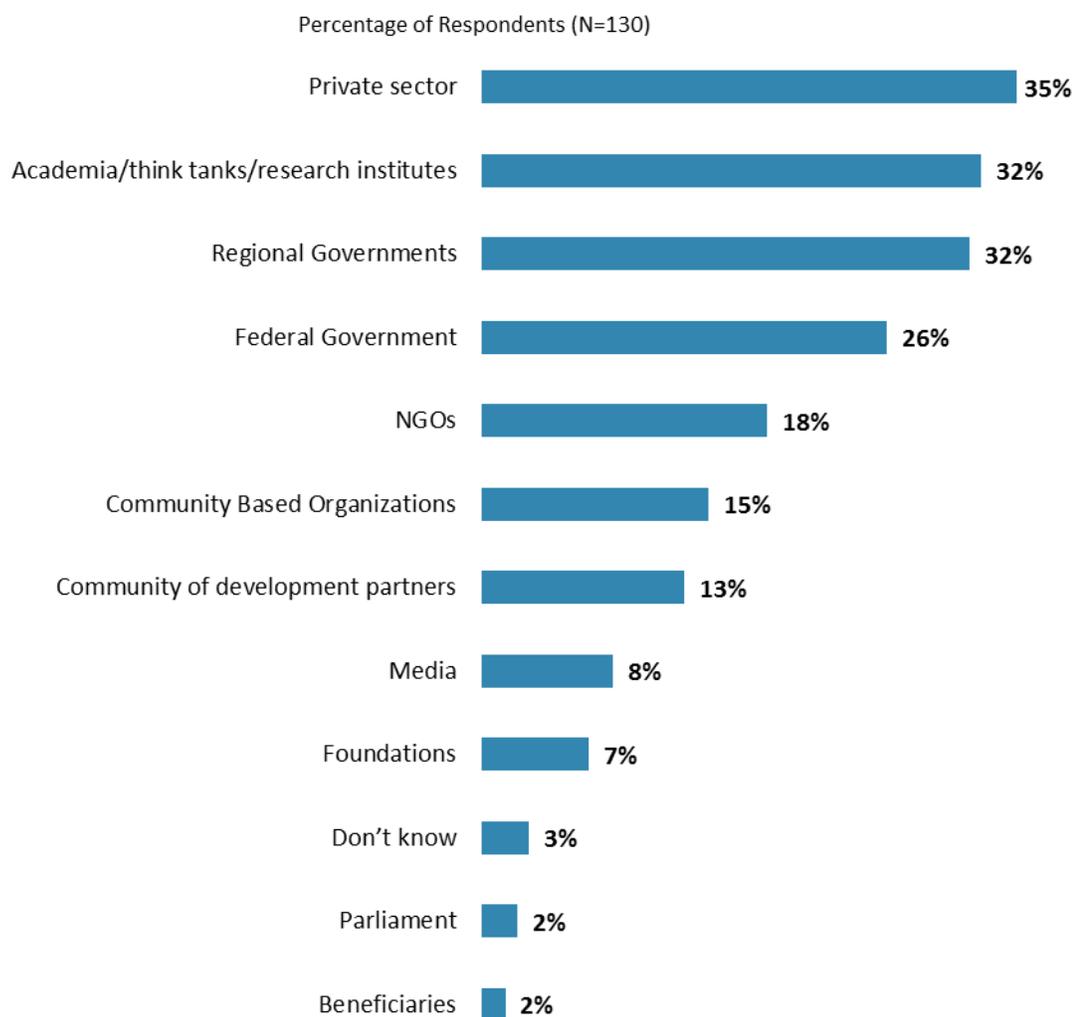

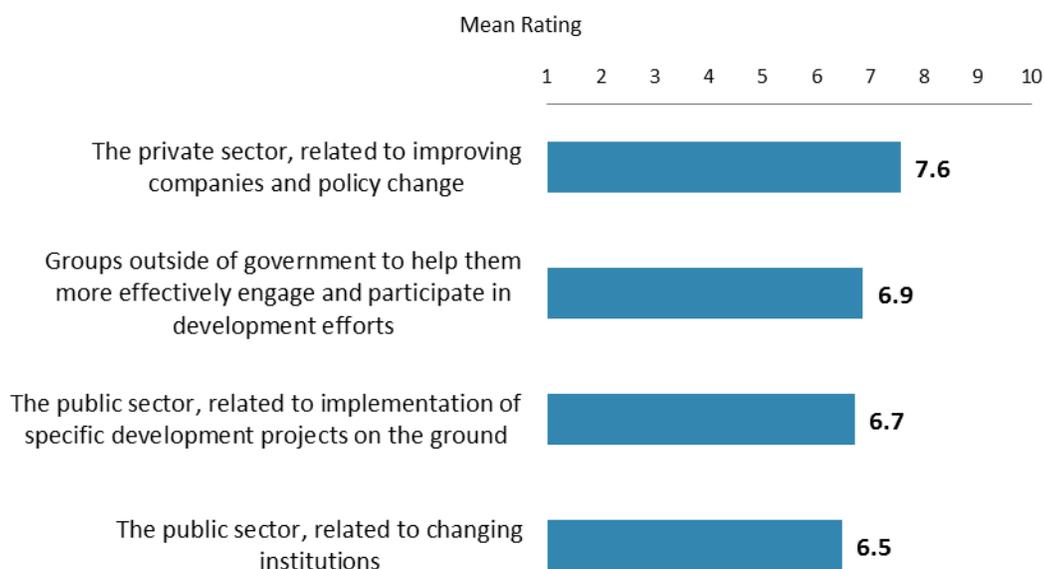

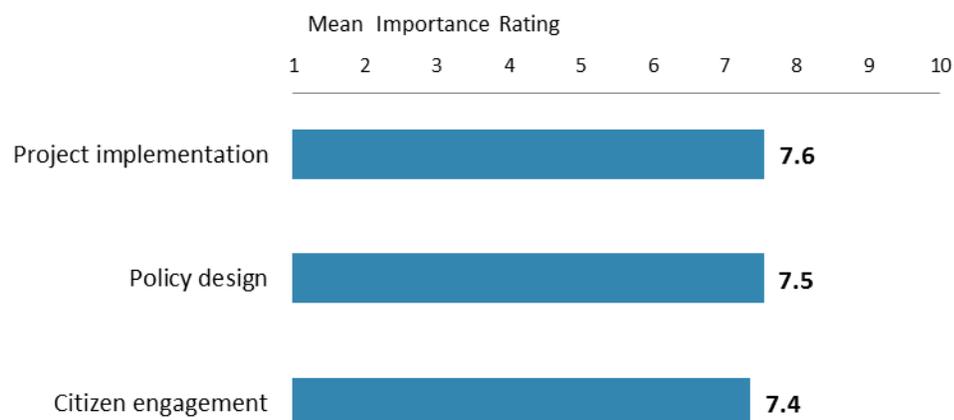
"Which TWO of the following groups should the World Bank Group collaborate with more in your country to ensure better development results there?" (Respondents chose from a list. Responses combined.)

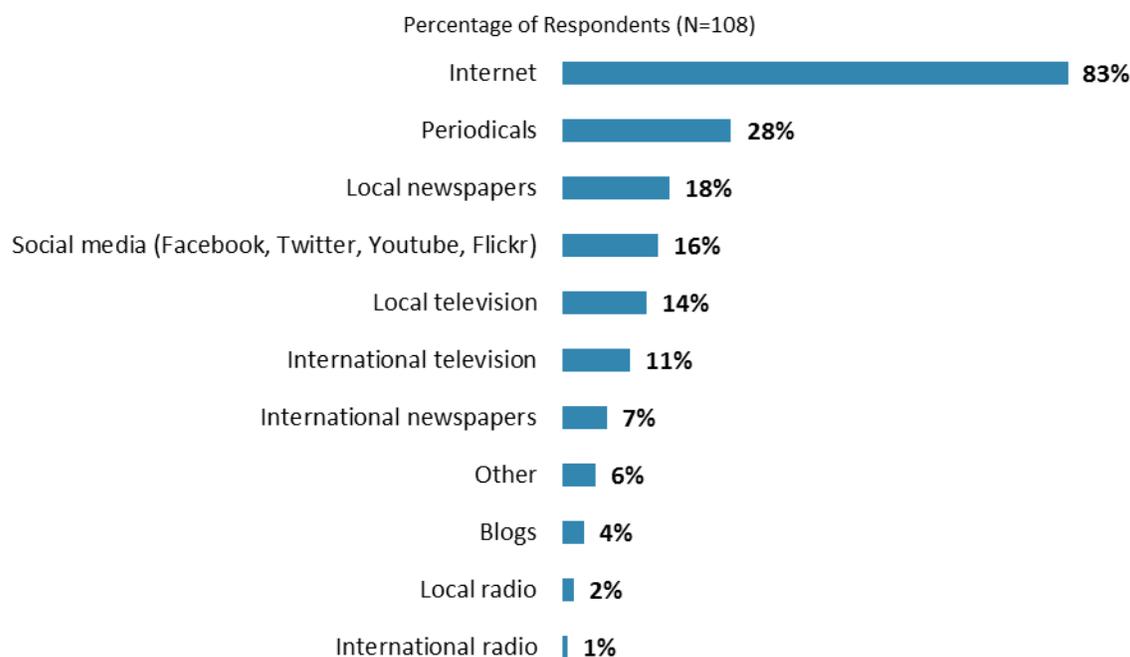
"The World Bank Group can provide capacity building support in a number of ways in Russia. To which degree would Russia benefit, if capacity building were to support...?"

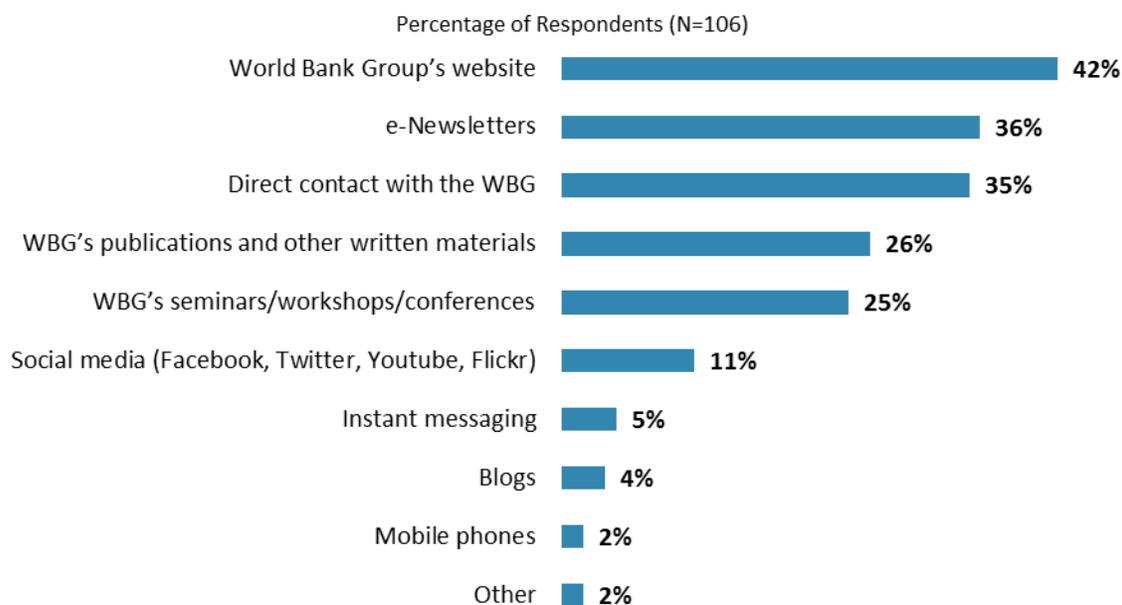

Preferred Information Sources



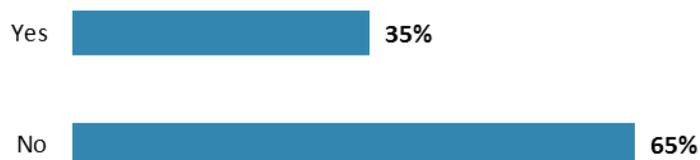

"Have you requested information from the World Bank Group on its activities in the past year?"

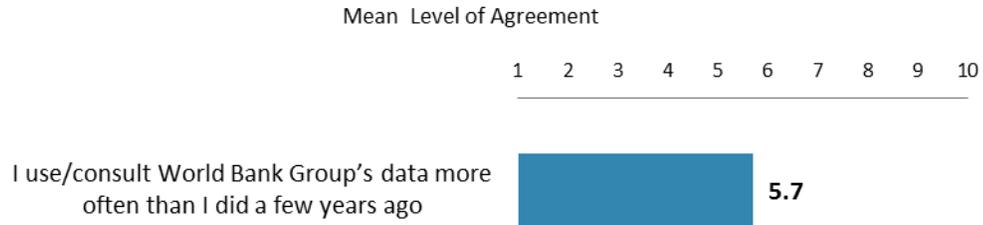

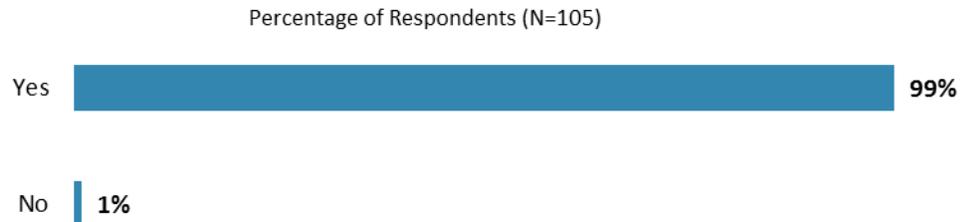

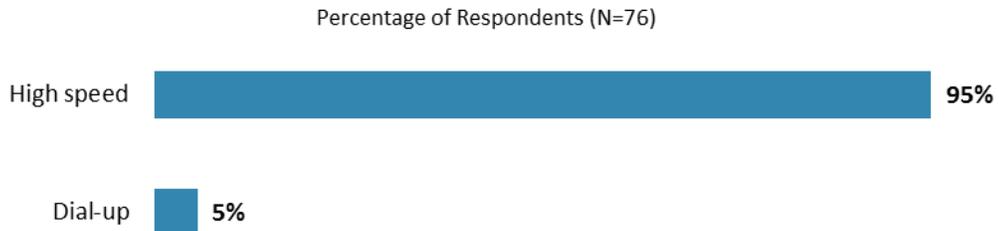

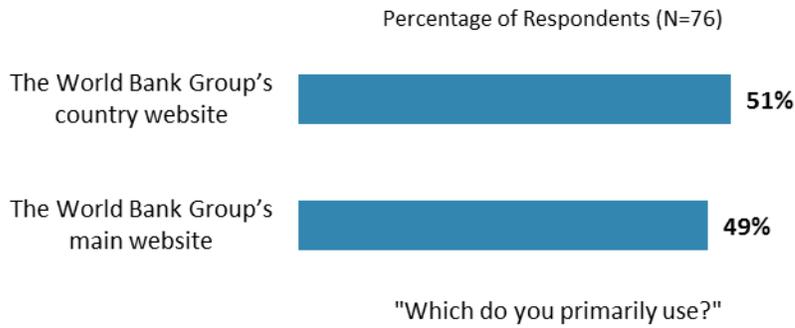

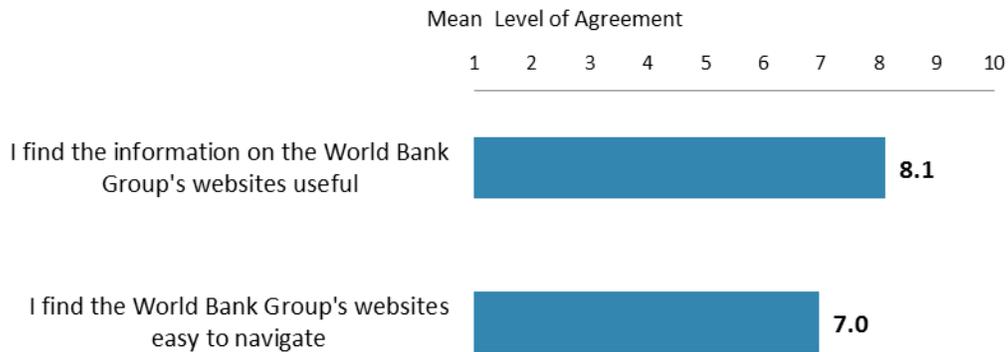
"Which Internet connection do you use primarily when visiting a World Bank Group website?"

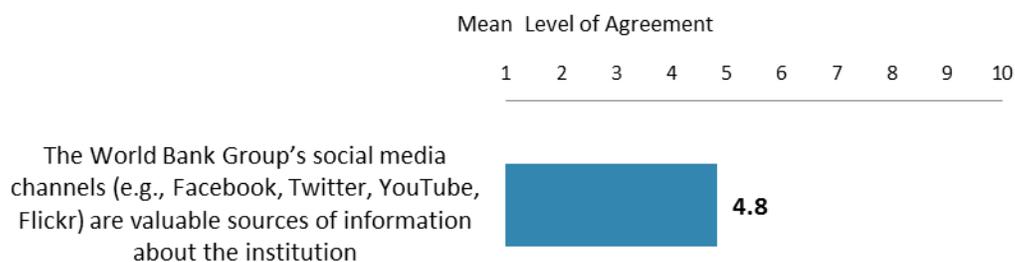

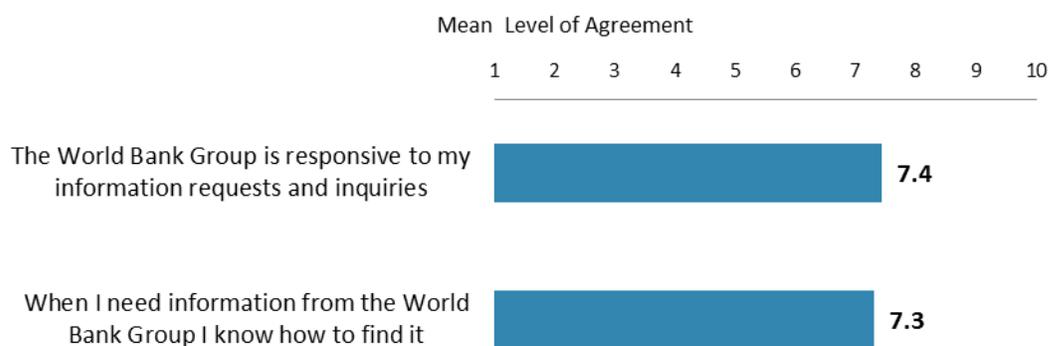

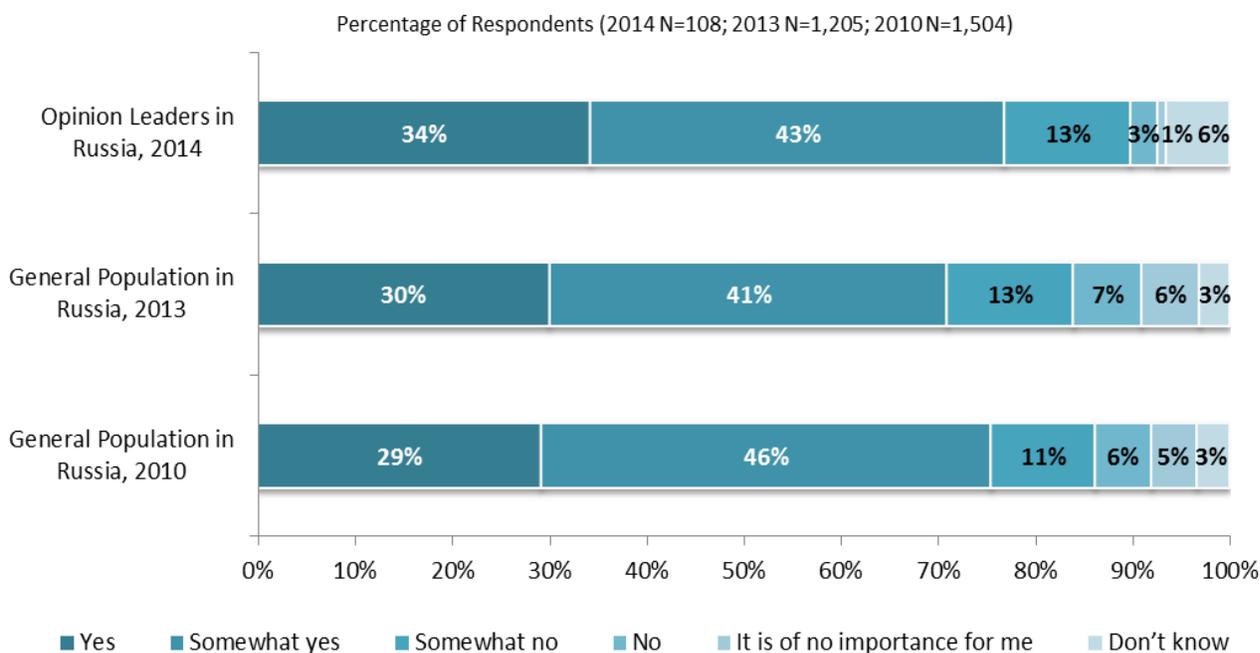

XI. Russia’s Role as a Global Donor for Development

This section presents the data on a number of questions regarding Russia’s role as a global donor for development. In 2010, the Russia country team explored opinions of the Russian general population about Russia’s development assistance to developing/poor countries through a nationwide public opinion survey as part of the Russia as a Donor Initiative (RDI). In 2013, a follow-up study was conducted in order to track opinions of the Russian population about Russia’s development aid efforts over time. For this section of the 2014 Russia Country Opinion Survey, selected key questions were chosen from the 2010 and 2013 nationwide surveys in order to compare the 2010/2013 data collected from the general public with the views of opinion leaders in Russia.

Support for Russia’s Aid to Developing/Poor Countries

- The views of opinion leaders in Russia were statistically similar to the views of the general population in 2010 and 2013: the majority of respondents approved of Russia’s development assistance to developing/poor countries.

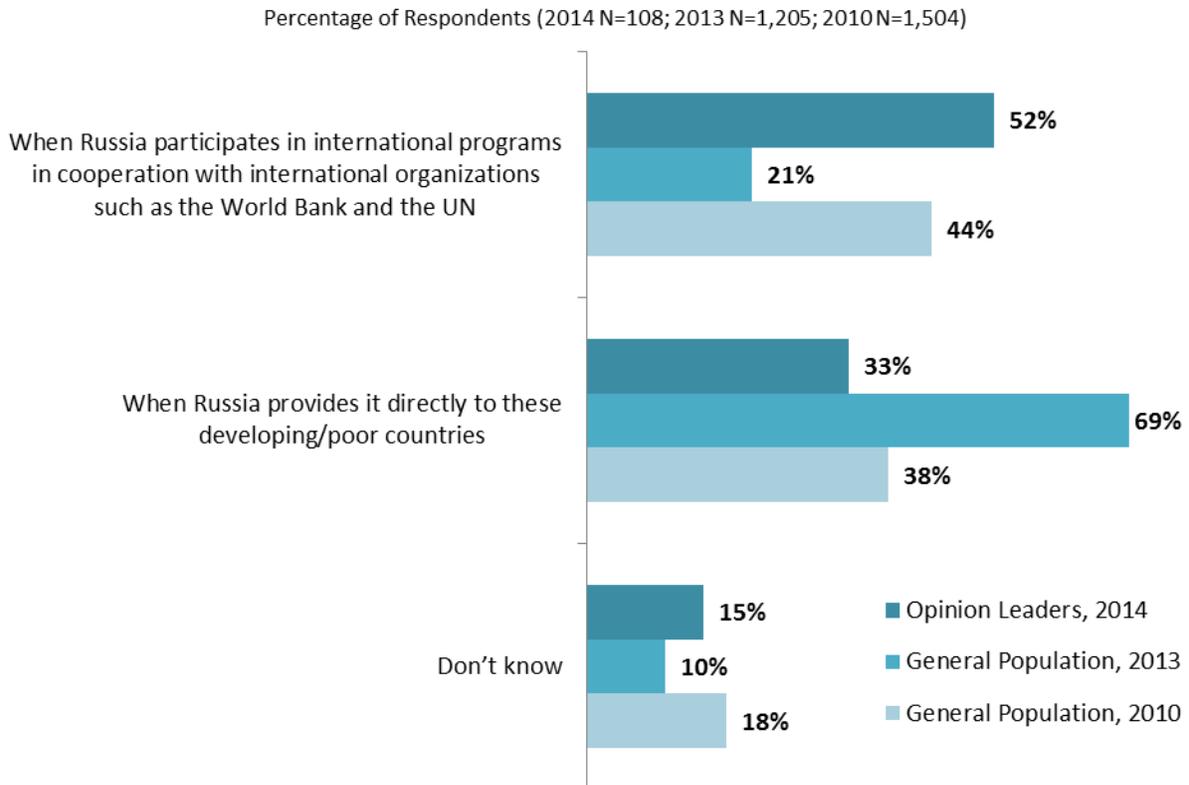


"In general, do you approve of Russia providing assistance to developing/poor countries?"

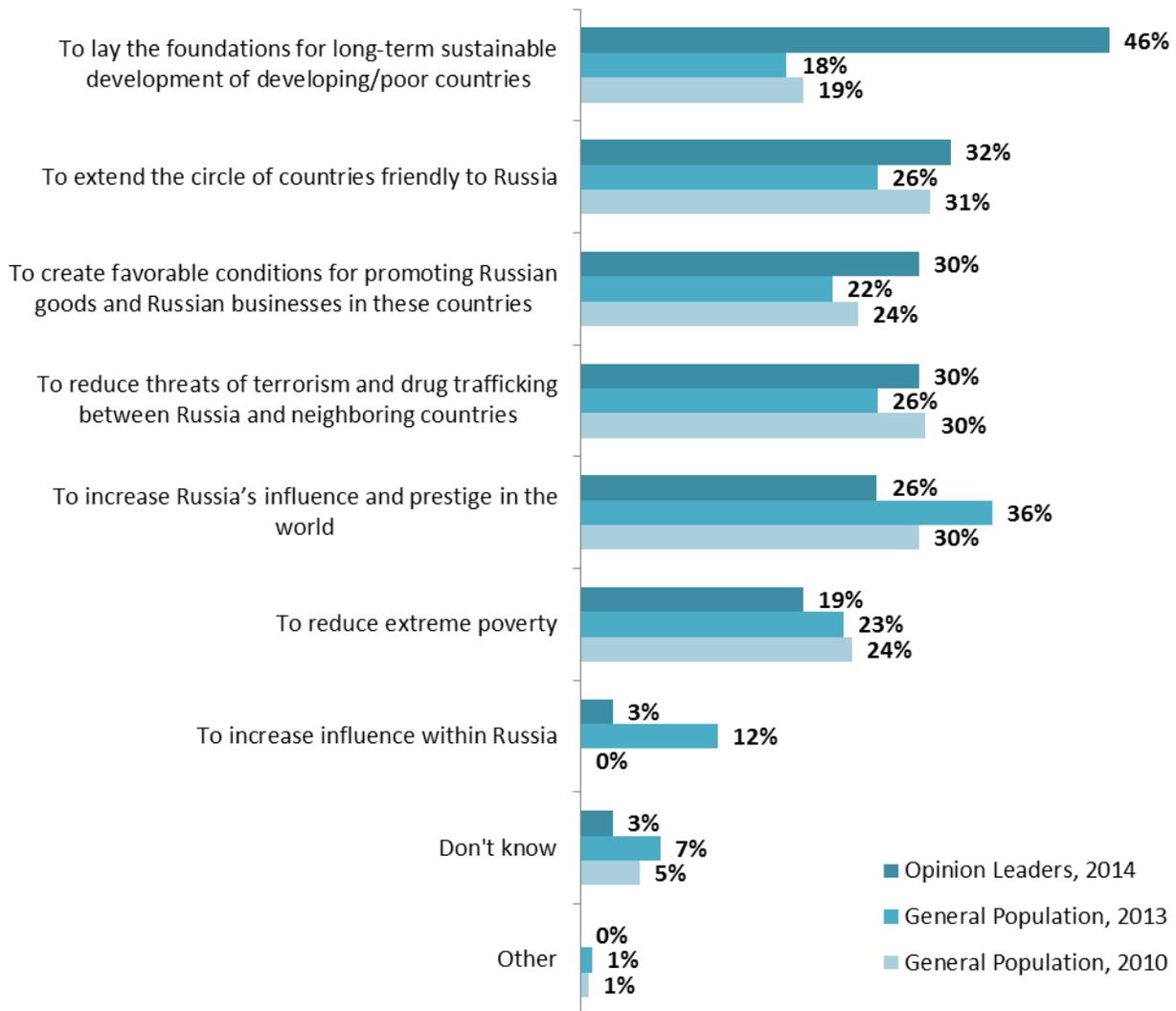
"In your opinion, which of the following is the most effective way for Russia to provide aid to developing/poor countries?" (Respondents chose from a list.)

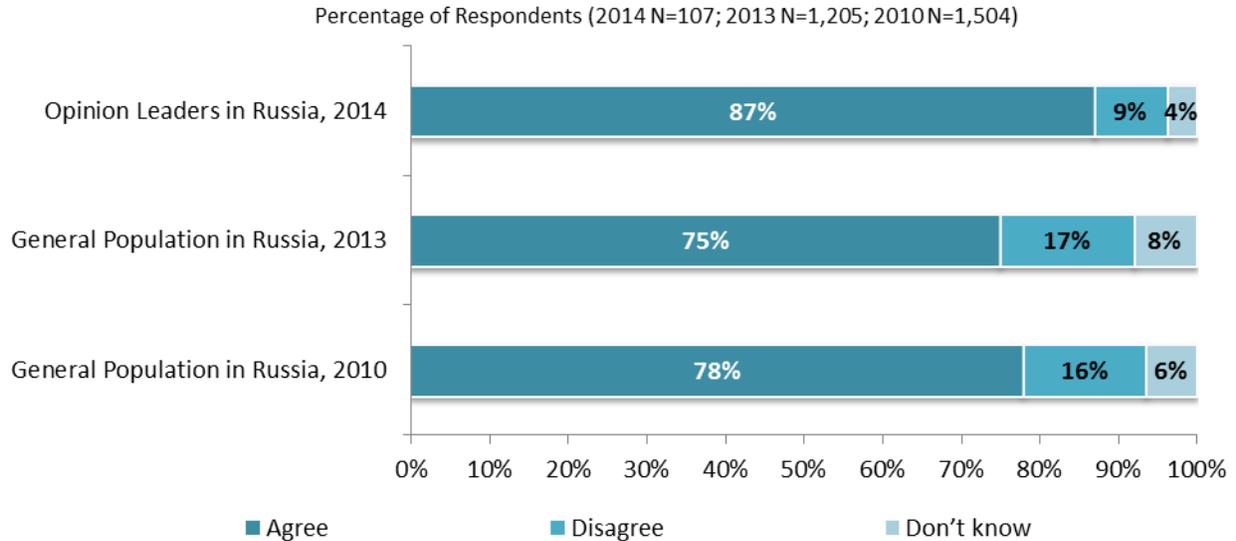
Percentage of Respondents (2014 N=108; 2013 N=1,205; 2010 N=1,504)

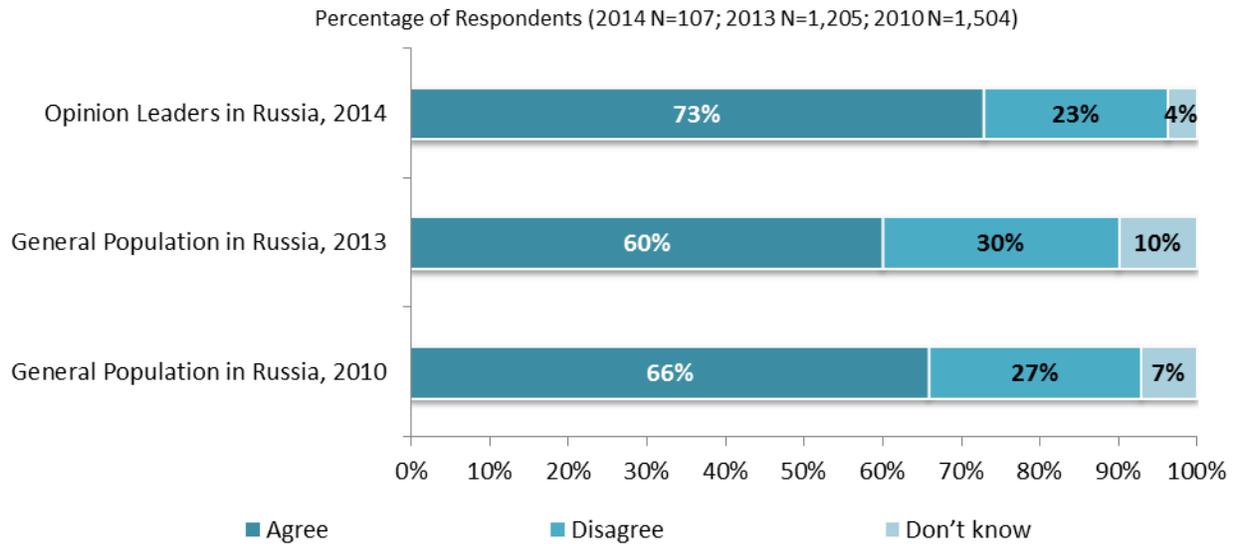

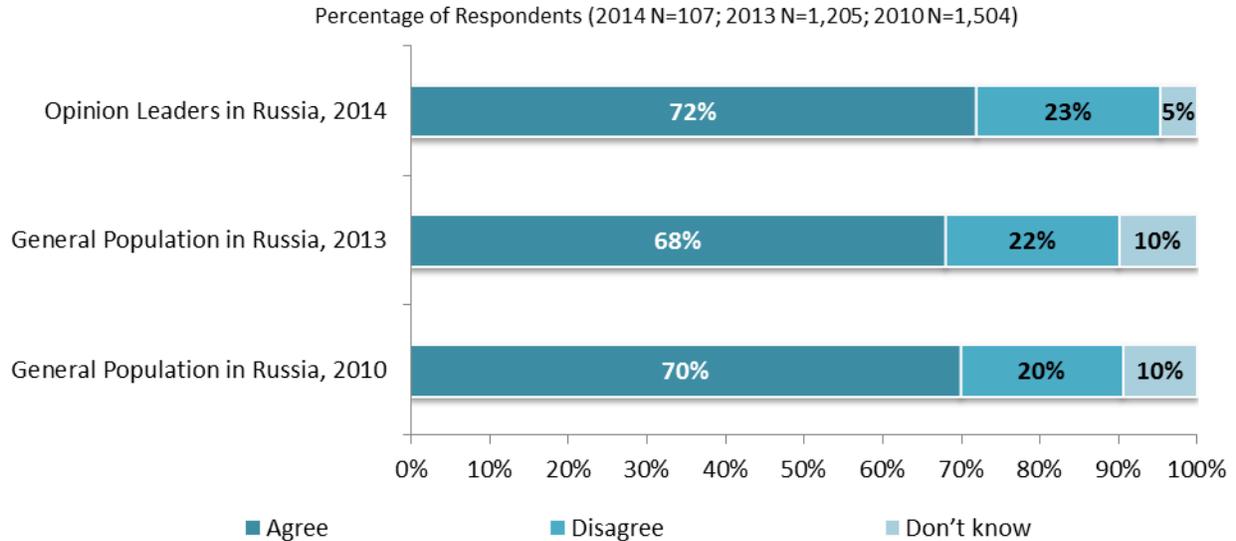


"By helping to improve living conditions in neighboring developing/poor countries, Russia can reduce the flows of migrants to its territory."

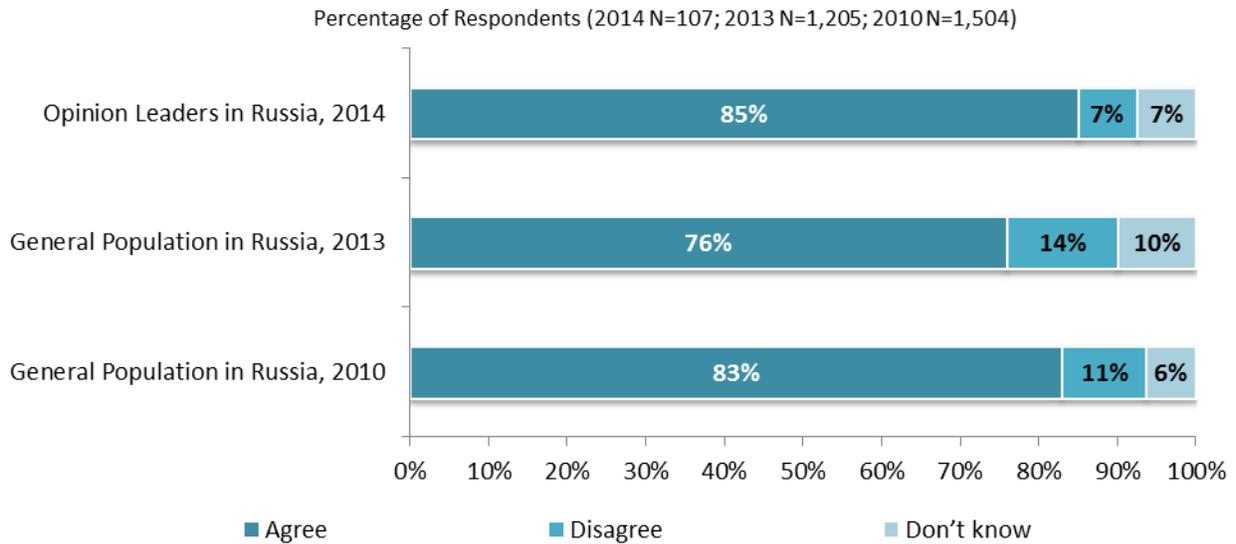

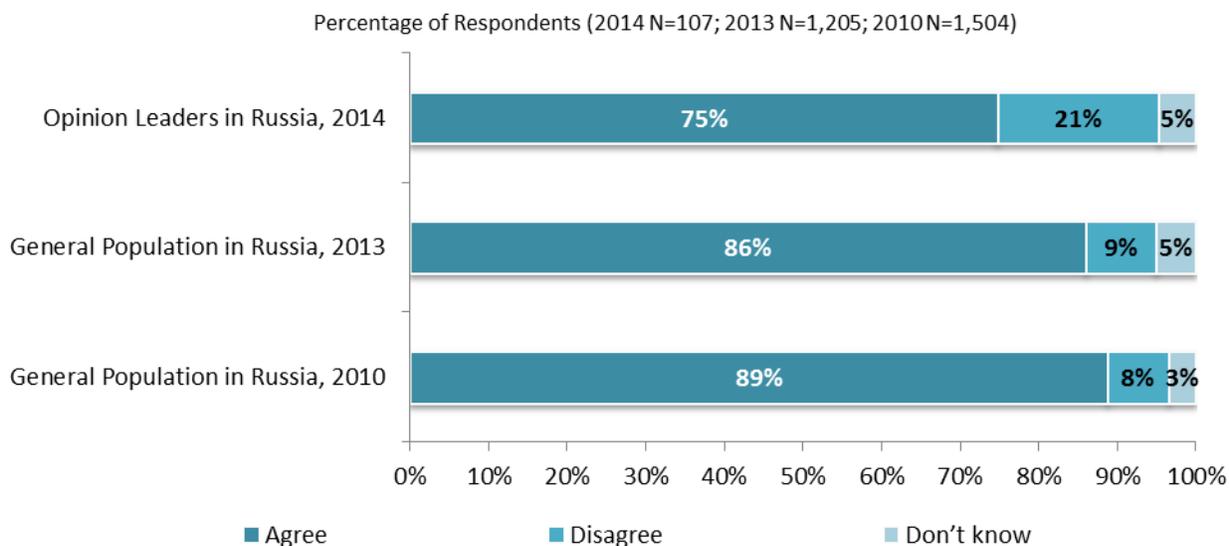

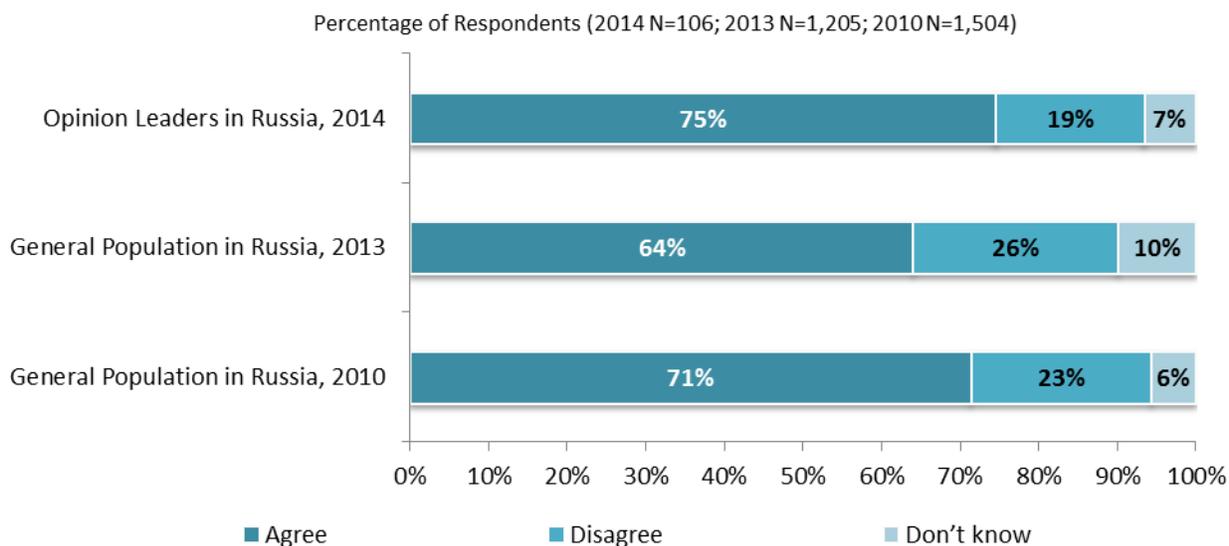

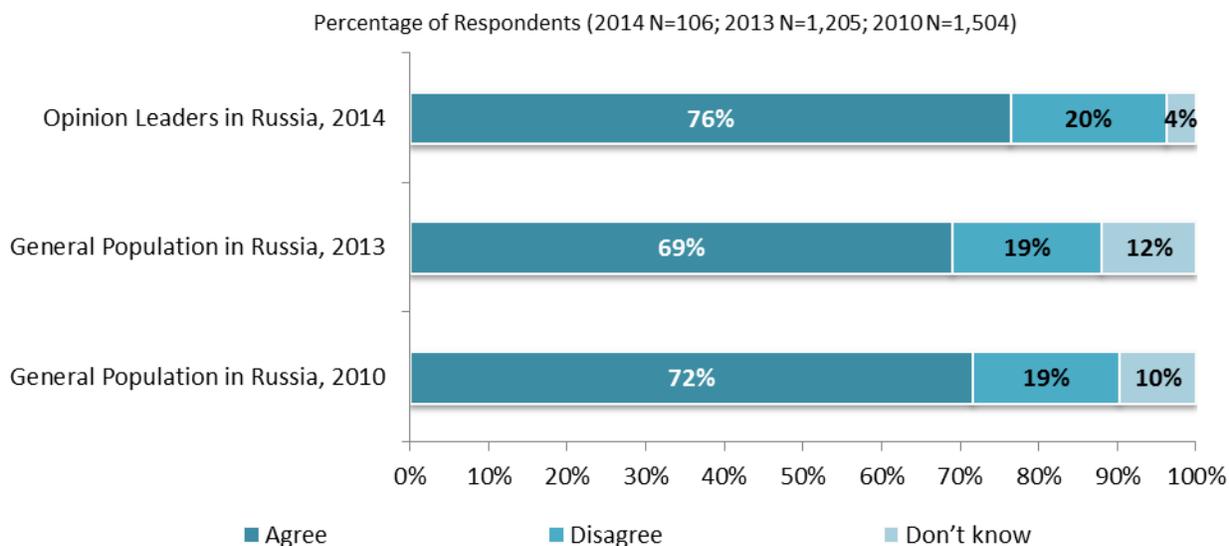

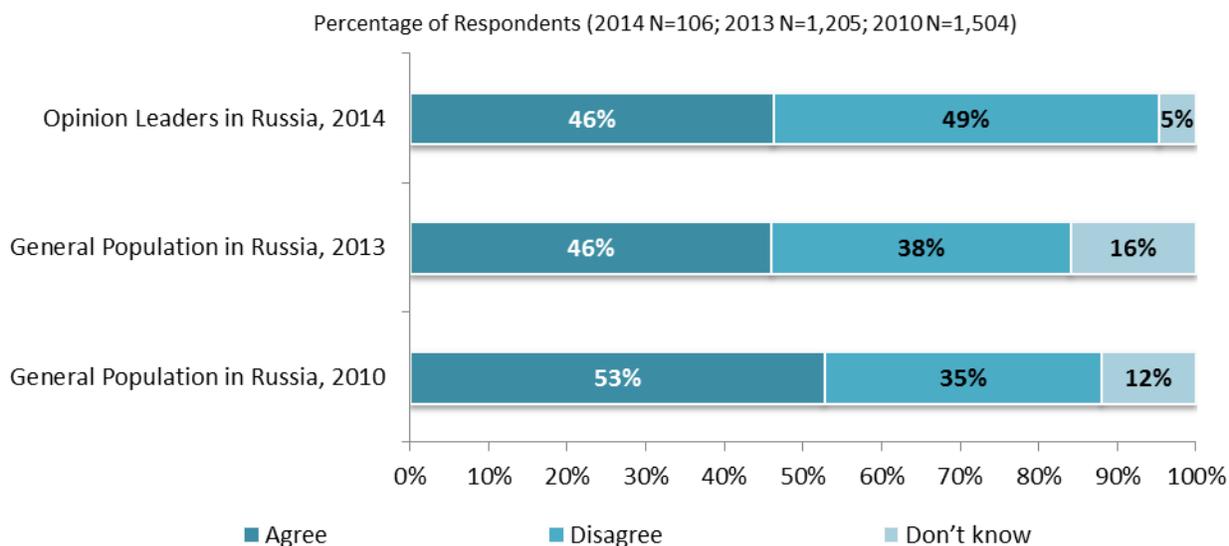
