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Quarterly Labour Force Survey

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1. Introduction

The Quarterly Labour Force Survey (QLFS) is a household-based sample survey conducted by Statistics South Africa (Stats SA). It collects data on the labour market activities of individuals aged 15 years and older who live in South Africa. However, this report only covers labour market activities of persons aged 15–64 years.

This report presents the key findings of the QLFS conducted from January to March 2018 (Q1: 2018).

2. Highlights of the results


The South African working-age population increased by 153 000 or 0,4 per cent in the first quarter of 2018 compared to the fourth quarter of 2017. The rise in both employment (up by 206 000) and unemployment (up by 100 000) over the quarter led to a rise in labour force participation rate (from 58,8% to 59,3%). The unemployment rate (26,7%) remained unchanged over the first quarter of 2018 compared to the fourth quarter of 2017.

Employment gains were recorded in the formal sector (111 000), informal sector (93 000) and private households (5 000), while Agriculture recorded job losses (down by 3 000) in the first quarter of 2018. The number of discouraged work-seekers increased by 249 000 while the number of other not economically active persons decreased by 403 000, resulting in a net decline of 154 000 (down by 1,0 percentage point) in the number of people not in the labour force between the fourth quarter of 2017 and the first quarter of 2018.

Compared to the same period last year, employment increased by 165 000 or 1,0 per cent while unemployment declined by 234 000 or 3,8 per cent. Between Q1: 2017 and Q1: 2018, the number of discouraged work-seekers grew by 510 000 (or 22,4 per cent) to 2,8 million persons.

3. Employment

Figure 1: Quarter-to-quarter changes in employment, Q1: 2013 to Q1: 2018



From an increase of 35 000 in Q1: 2013, the number of employed persons declined by 122 000 in Q1: 2014. A substantially significant decline of 344 000 in employment was observed in Q1: 2016 after an increase of 140 000 in Q1: 2015. It has since risen by 144 000 in Q1: 2017 and 206 000 in Q1: 2018.

Table B shows that the quarterly employment increase of 206 000 jobs in Q1: 2018 were driven by six of the ten industries. The contributors to the increase were the Community and social services (contributing 95 000 jobs), followed by Manufacturing (58 000), Construction (40 000), Trade (36 000) and Finance and other business services (30 000) industries. Employment declines were recorded in Transport (resulting in a loss of 41 000 jobs), and Mining (14 000), Utilities (6 000) and Agriculture (3 000).

Compared to Q1: 2017, employment gains of 165 000 jobs were largely driven by Community and social services (216 000), Trade (69 000) and Manufacturing (59 000). Construction, Mining, Private Households and Agriculture industries lost 75 000, 50 000, 45 000 and 28 000 jobs, respectively.

Figure 2a: Quarter-to-quarter employment changes in the formal sector, Q1: 2013 to Q1: 2018






Figure 2b: Quarter-to-quarter employment changes in the informal sector, Q1: 2013 to Q1: 2018



After employment losses in the fourth quarter of 2017, the number of employed persons in the formal sector increased by 111 000 in Q1: 2018. In the same quarter, the informal sector also created 93 000 more jobs compared to Q4: 2017.

The formal sector recorded employment gains of 111 000. This was mainly observed from Community and social services (90 000), Manufacturing (69 000) and Trade (40 000) industries. Transport, Finance and other business services and Construction recorded the most declines in employment in the first quarter of 2018.

Compared to the same period last year, the formal sector created 18 000 jobs. This was mainly from Community and social services (142 000), Trade (77 000) and Manufacturing (27 000) industries. Construction (111 000), Mining (47 000), while Transport (39 000) and Finance and other business services (32 000) industries recorded employment losses.

In the first quarter of 2018 employment in the informal sector increased mainly in Construction (59 000) and Finance and other business services (54 000) industries compared to the fourth quarter of 2017.

Compared to Q1: 2017, employment in the informal sector increased in five industries. The largest annual employment gains were observed in the Community and social services (74 000), Finance and other business services (56 000), Construction (36 000) and Transport (35 000) industries.

During the first quarter of 2018, quarterly employment gains were observed in six of the ten occupations. The largest gains in employment were recorded in the Sales and services (95 000), Clerical (89 000) and Craft and related trade (58 000) occupations. Employment losses were recorded in Technician (62 000), Professional (33 000), Domestic worker (24 000) and Skilled agriculture (21 000) occupations.

Year-on-year changes show that gains in employment were mainly driven by the Sales and services (214 000), Elementary (45 000) and Plant and machine operator (27 000) occupations. Between Q1: 2017 and Q1: 2018, employment declines were mainly recorded in the Managerial (26 000), Craft and related trade (24 000) and Professional (22 000) occupations.




The number of employed persons increased in six of the nine provinces between Q4: 2017 and Q1: 2018. The largest employment increases were recorded in KwaZulu-Natal (104 000), Gauteng (78 000) and Western Cape (38 000), while Mpumalanga (45 000) and North West recorded (7 000) employment losses in the same period.

Compared to Q1: 2017, employment increased in six of the nine provinces, with Western Cape recording the largest increase of 123 000 jobs, followed by Limpopo at 83 000 and KwaZulu-Natal (62 000). During the same period, employment losses were recorded in Gauteng (124 000), Eastern Cape (45 000) and Mpumalanga (20 000).

3.1 Conditions of employment for employees


Figure 5: Quarter-to-quarter changes in nature of employment contract**Figure 6: Year-on-year changes in nature of employment contract**

Irrespective of the nature of contract, the number of employees increased for all types of contract durations in the first quarter of 2018 compared to the fourth quarter of 2017.

Year-on-year, the number of employees with contracts of unspecified and limited durations increased by 128 000 and 79 000 respectively while there was virtually no change in the number of employees with contracts of a permanent nature.


4. Unemployment

After a decline in the number of unemployed persons in the fourth quarter, the first quarter usually shows an increase in unemployment. This is depicted by an increase in the number of unemployed persons in the first quarter of each year since 2013, with an increase of 100 000 recorded in Q1: 2018.

Figure 8: Percentage number of unemployed persons by duration of unemployment, Q1: 2018




Duration of unemployment is the length of time that an unemployed person has been without work, available for work and actively seeking work. Long-term unemployment refers to unemployment of a year and more. More than 60% of the unemployed have reported being unemployed for a year or longer. Women are more likely to be in long-term unemployment than men. At least two out of three unemployed women (67,2%) have been unemployed for a year or longer compared to 57,3% of their male counterparts.

The official unemployment rate remained unchanged at 26,7% in Q1: 2018 compared to Q4: 2017. The official unemployment rate increased in seven of the nine provinces. The largest increase in the unemployment rate was recorded in Mpumalanga (up by 3,5 percentage points), Northern Cape (up by 2,4 percentage points), and North West (up by 1,9 percentage points). Year-on-year the official unemployment rate declined by 1,0 percentage point with most provinces recording declines and increases observed in Eastern Cape (up by 3,4 percentage points) and Mpumalanga (up by 0,9 of a percentage point).


Compared to Q4: 2017, the expanded unemployment rate increased by 0,4 of a percentage point in Q1: 2018 to 36,7%. The largest increases were recorded in Mpumalanga (up by 2,8 percentage points), Eastern Cape (up by 1,2 percentage points) and North West (up by 1,1 percentage points). Compared to a year ago, the expanded unemployment rate increased by 0,2 of a percentage point.

Figure 9: NEET rates for youth aged 15–24 years by population group, Q1: 2017 and Q1: 2018

Between Q1: 2017 and Q1: 2018, the percentage of young persons aged 15–24 years who were not in employment, education or training (NEET) remained unchanged (at 32,4%). The NEET rate declined among the black African

and coloured males, while the rate increased among Indian/Asian and white males. Among females the NEET rate increased for three population groups with the exception of coloured females.

Figure 10: Year-on-year changes in total employment, Q1: 2011 to Q1: 2018




Figure 11: Year-on-year changes in formal-sector employment, Q1: 2011 to Q1: 2018





Figure 12: Year-on-year changes in informal-sector employment, Q1: 2011 to Q1: 2018



Figure 13: Unemployment rate by sex, Q1: 2008 to Q1: 2018

7. Quarterly Labour Force Survey (QLFS) and the Quarterly Employment Survey (QES)

There are two official sources of employment statistics, the QES which is establishment based and the QLFS (which is household based). Each survey has its strengths and limitations. For example, the QES cannot provide information on the following:


- Description of the employed, e.g. their demographic profile, education level, hours of work, etc.; and
- Unemployment and descriptors of the unemployed.

The QLFS is a survey of households that collects information from approximately 30 000 dwelling units and collects data on the labour market activities of individuals, whereas the QES is an enterprise-based survey that collects information from non-agricultural businesses and organisations from approximately 20 000 units. The numerous conceptual and methodological differences between the household- and enterprise-based surveys result in important distinctions in the employment estimates derived from the surveys. Among these are:

- The household survey includes agricultural workers, self-employed workers whose businesses are unincorporated, unpaid family workers, and private household workers among the employed. These groups are excluded from the enterprise-based survey.
- The household survey is limited to workers 15 years of age and older. The enterprise-based survey is not limited by age.
- The household survey has no duplication of individuals, because individuals are counted only once, even if they hold more than one job. In the enterprise-based survey, employees working at more than one job and thus appearing on more than one payroll are counted separately for each appearance.
- QLFS includes income tax, VAT and number of employees in determining the formal sector while QES uses only VAT with annual turnover greater than R300 000.
- QLFS allows for proxy responses (a household member responding on behalf of the other). This can introduce misclassification of items, e.g. formal/informal classification.

8.2 Survey requirements and design

The Quarterly Labour Force Survey (QLFS) uses the Master Sample frame that has been developed as a general-purpose household survey frame that can be used by all other Stats SA household-based surveys having design requirements that are reasonably compatible with the QLFS. The 2013 Master Sample is based on information collected during the 2011 Census conducted by Stats SA. In preparation for Census 2011, the country was divided into 103 576 enumeration areas (EAs). The census EAs, together with the auxiliary information for the EAs, were used as the frame units or building blocks for the formation of primary sampling units (PSUs) for the Master Sample, since they covered the entire country and had other information that is crucial for stratification and creation of PSUs. There are 3 324 primary sampling units (PSUs) in the Master Sample with an expected sample of approximately 33 000 dwelling units (DUs). The number of PSUs in the current Master Sample (3 324) reflects an 8,0% increase in the size of the Master Sample compared to the previous 2008 Master Sample (which had 3 080 PSUs). The larger Master Sample of PSUs was selected to improve the precision (smaller coefficients of variation, known as CVs) of the QLFS estimates.

The Master Sample is designed to be representative at provincial level and within provinces at metro/non-metro levels. Within the metros, the sample is further distributed by geographical type. The three geography types are Urban, Tribal and Farms. This implies, for example, that within a metropolitan area the sample is representative of the different geography types that may exist within that metro.

It is divided equally into four sub-groups or panels called rotation groups. The rotation groups are designed in such a way that each of these groups has the same distribution pattern as that which is observed in the whole sample. They are numbered from one (1) to four (4) and these numbers also correspond to the quarters of the year in which the sample will be rotated for the particular group.

The sample for the QLFS is based on a stratified two-stage design with probability proportional to size (PPS) sampling of PSUs in the first stage, and sampling of dwelling units (DUs) with systematic sampling in the second stage.

8.3 Sample rotation

For each quarter of the QLFS, a quarter of the sampled dwellings are rotated out of the sample. These dwellings are replaced by new dwellings from the same PSU or the next PSU on the list. Thus, sampled dwellings are expected to remain in the sample for four consecutive quarters. It should be noted that the sampling unit is the dwelling, and the unit of observation is the household. Therefore, if a household moves out of a dwelling after being in the sample for two quarters (as an example) and a new household moves in, the new household will be enumerated for the next two quarters. If no household moves into the sampled dwelling, the dwelling will be classified as vacant (or unoccupied).

8.4 Weighting

The sample weights were constructed in order to account for the following: the original selection probabilities (design weights), adjustments for PSUs that were sub-sampled or segmented, excluded population from the sampling frame, non-response, weight trimming, and benchmarking to known population estimates from the Demographic Analysis Division within Stats SA.

8.5 Non-response adjustment

In general, imputation is used for item non-response (i.e. blanks within the questionnaire) and edit failures (i.e. invalid or inconsistent responses). The eligible households in the sampled dwellings can be divided into two response categories: respondents and non-respondents. Weight adjustment is applied to account for the non-respondent households (e.g. refusal, no contact, etc.). The adjustment for total non-response was computed at two levels of non-response: PSU non-response and household non-response.

8.6 Final survey weights

In the final step of constructing the sample weights, all individuals within a household are assigned the same adjusted base weight. The adjusted base weights are calibrated such that the aggregate totals will match with independently derived (by Stats SA Demography Division) population estimates (from the Demographic Analysis Division) for various age, race and gender groups at national level and individual metropolitan and non-metropolitan area levels within the provinces. The calibrated weights are constructed using the constraint that each person within the same household should have the same calibrated weight, with a lower bound on the calibrated weights set at 50.

8.7 Estimation

The final survey weights are used to obtain the estimates for various domains of interest, e.g. number of persons employed in Agriculture in Western Cape, number of females employed in Manufacturing, etc.

8.8 Reliability of the survey estimates

Since estimates are based on sample data, they differ from figures that would have been obtained from complete enumeration of the population using the same instrument. Results are subject to both sampling and non-sampling errors. Non-sampling errors include biases from inaccurate reporting, processing, and tabulation, etc., as well as errors from non-responses and incomplete reporting. These types of errors cannot be measured readily. However, to some extent, non-sampling errors can be minimised through the procedures used for data collection, editing, quality control, and non-response adjustment. The variances of the survey estimates are used to measure sampling errors.

(i) Variance estimation

The most commonly used methods for estimating variances of survey estimates from complex surveys such as the QLFS, are the Taylor-series Linearization, Jack-knife Replication, Balanced Repeated Replication (BRR), and Bootstrap methods (Wolter, 2007)¹. The Fay's BRR method has been used for variance estimation in the QLFS because of its simplicity.

(ii) Coefficient of variation

It is more useful in many situations to assess the size of the standard error relative to the magnitude of the characteristic being measured (the standard error is defined as the square root of the variance). The **coefficient of variation** (cv) provides such a measure. It is the **ratio of the standard error of the survey estimate to the value of the estimate itself expressed as a percentage**. It is very useful in comparing the precision of several different survey estimates, where their sizes or scale differ from one another.

(iii) P-value of an estimate of change

The p-value corresponding to an estimate of change is the probability of observing a value larger than the particular observed value under the hypothesis that there is no real change. If p-value <0,01, the difference is highly significant; if p-value is between 0,01 and 0,05; then the difference is significant; and if p-value >0,05, the difference is not significant.

9. Definitions

Discouraged work-seeker is a person who was not employed during the reference period, wanted to work, was available to work/start a business but did not take active steps to find work during the last four weeks, provided that the main reason given for not seeking work was any of the following: no jobs available in the area; unable to find work requiring his/her skills; lost hope of finding any kind of work.

Economic activities are those activities that contribute to the production of goods and services in the country. There are two types of economic activities, namely: (1) Market production activities (work done for others and usually associated with pay or profit); and (2) Non-market production activities (work done for the benefit of the household, e.g. subsistence farming).

Employed persons are those aged 15–64 years who, during the reference week, did any work for at least one hour, or had a job or business but were not at work (i.e. were temporarily absent).

Employment-to-population ratio (labour absorption rate) is the proportion of the working-age population that is employed.

Informal employment identifies persons who are in precarious employment situations irrespective of whether or not the entity for which they work is in the formal or informal sector. Persons in informal employment therefore comprise all persons in the informal sector, employees in the formal sector, and persons working in private households who are not entitled to basic benefits such as pension or medical aid contributions from their employer, and who do not have a written contract of employment.

Informal sector: The informal sector has the following two components:

- i) Employees working in establishments that employ fewer than five employees, who do not deduct income tax from their salaries/wages; and
- ii) Employers, own-account workers and persons helping unpaid in their household business who are not registered for either income tax or value-added tax.

The **labour force** comprises all persons who are employed plus all persons who are unemployed.

Labour force participation rate is the proportion of the working-age population that is either employed or unemployed.

Long-term unemployment: Persons in long-term unemployment are those individuals among the unemployed who were without work and trying to find a job or start a business for one year or more.

Not economically active: Persons aged 15–64 years who are neither employed nor unemployed in the reference week.

Persons in **underemployment (time-related)** are employed persons who were willing and available to work additional hours, whose total number of hours actually worked during the reference period were below 35 hours per week.

Underutilised labour comprises three groups that are defined as follows: persons who are underemployed, persons who are unemployed, and persons who are discouraged.

Unemployed persons are those (aged 15–64 years) who:

- a) Were not employed in the reference week; **and**
- b) Actively looked for work or tried to start a business in the four weeks preceding the survey interview; **and**
- c) Were available for work, i.e. would have been able to start work or a business in the reference week; **or**
- d) Had not actively looked for work in the past four weeks but had a job or business to start at a definite date in the future and were available.

Unemployment rate is the proportion of the labour force that is unemployed.

The **working-age population** comprises all persons aged 15–64 years.
